

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99th Convention of the Michigan District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod June 28 – July 1, 2009 Ann Arbor, Michigan District President's Report



"Celebrate Jesus" is the theme that has been chosen for the 2009 Convention of the Michigan District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod. Throughout the past triennium, we have recalled the 2006 District Convention theme "Celebrating God's Faithfulness." We thank and praise Him as we have been blessed as His Redeemed people, Refreshed by the power of His Word, and Ready to undertake the ministry before us in the Michigan District. It is both humbling and exciting to think back over this past triennium and celebrate His presence. Now, in 2009, we celebrate in the midst of a challenging context in society. These times would seemingly not lead to celebration but rather to anxiety, fear, hopelessness, and a myriad of other descriptors that would drain any sense of celebration. However, in the face of such, we recall God's invitation to turn to Him, "Come unto me all you who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." The reference here is not only to

a momentary rest but an inner rest that provides peace, engenders hope, and grants joy as we look to the unfolding of Jesus' will. Therefore, this Convention shall focus upon the "basics" to simply *"Celebrate Jesus."* St. Paul in his letter to the Philippians in chapter two, verse five shares that "your attitude is to be the same as that of Christ Jesus ..." May He grant that to us as we look forward to the focus upon Him, as we gather in this 99th Convention of The Michigan District of the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod.

This report is presented with the hope and prayer that God will bless our mutual efforts as we review, remember, and anticipate a new triennium. May the attitude of Jesus referenced above lead us to greater understanding of "taking the very nature of a servant." May we serve one another and those who do not yet know the joy of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. May our mutual efforts enable many to *"Celebrate Jesus"* to His glory and good and the extension of His Kingdom in time and eternity.

District Mission and Ministry



As we are organized for ministry in the Michigan District, we are very thankful for the Spirit's guidance and direction in following a Mission Statement, Ministry Core Values, and Major Outcomes. Our unique mission statement is *To Bolster Congregations and Congregational Leadership*. This has continued to be the focus throughout this past triennium. In accomplishing His mission, we operate according to our Ministry Core Values. You will note that the reports throughout this Convention Workbook have been organized around our Ministry Core Values toward accomplishing our **Major Outcomes**. What follows is a review of those Major Outcomes as they have set the course for ministry activities in the past triennium.

The first Major Outcome is to develop an **Outreach Mindset**. The goal is that "*Michigan District congregations are* sensitive to those without Christ within their communities and beyond and actively share Christ's love with them, integrating them into the body of Christ." This highlights care and concern for the communities in which our congregations are located. We seek to reach out to others having been nurtured through the Word and Sacrament ministry. As the congregation is so strengthened from within, it is then enabled to reach and enfold others into the body of Christ. Our congregations, through the Spirit's blessings, are the "Church homes" for all of us in our individual congregations. May our congregations be winsome in attracting others to the joy of the fellowship in Christ.

The second Major Outcome recognizes the critical importance of the well-being of all who would function as **Servant Leaders** in the church. It is recognized that our Ministers of Religion – Ordained and Commissioned, are a gift of our Lord in His Church. May God be praised for them. Therefore, the Michigan District has focused on a second Major Outcome to the end that the "Michigan District has a sufficient number of Ministers of Religion – Ordained and Commissioned to meet the needs of its congregations and ministries. These workers have a personal relationship with Christ and are filled with integrity and joy, and are well respected and supported financially." We currently have 148 Michigan District students preparing for professional church work.



The third Major Outcome of the District widens the circle of consideration in our fellowship together in the Church of our Lord Jesus. It is one thing, as in Outcome #2 above, to provide church workers for the District. As they serve and function in the congregations of the District, it is vital to recognize the **fellowship into which we have been called** with our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Corinthians 1:9). Thus, Outcome #3 states that *"Michigan District congregations and professional church workers demonstrate respect, trust, and support for each other and for District and Synod as they engage in interdependent ministries."* We need one another in His service. We need the awareness of a deep, God-given fellowship with individual church workers and congregations. There needs to be collegiality and collaboration among us. We build upon one another's strengths and strengthen one another in Law and Gospel ministry. This is done for the sake of effective witness in a dying world. This unity and spirit of fellowship and friendship is vital.

Thus, as we recognize that we are to be inviting congregations celebrating the presence of Jesus, it is necessary that our congregations are **resourced for ministry**. Therefore, Outcome #4 states that *"Michigan District congregations recognize, use and share innovative, effective resources the Spirit grants to His church for service to Christ and to people."* The work of our District staff, inclusive of those located in our Ann Arbor office and those out in the District, has this focus on resourcing.

It follows then, as the District focuses upon these four Major Outcomes, that we organize to accomplish them. All of the work that is done by the staff of the Michigan District fits under the Ministry Core Values and Major Outcomes. As the Annual Work Plan of the District is prepared, every inclusion of the budget must be related to one of the Outcomes. A series of measurements of these outcomes is used by the Board of Directors to review ministry. Reports of the accomplishment of the Outcomes are presented at each of the Board of Directors' meetings. That which follows will report how the District staff, organized into departments, works together to achieve the Outcomes.

District Organization and Structure - Part II

In addition to the ecclesiastical supervision and administration of the President's office, there are three other departments. The three departments are Mission Services, Member Services, and General Services.

Mission Services Department

We celebrate the presence of Jesus through the work of the Mission Services Department of the Michigan District. This department is led by Pastor Roosevelt Gray Jr., Mission Services Director. During this past triennium, seven **new missions** have been established and one is currently in process of calling a mission planter. Continuing in the planning process, as we enter this triennium begun in 2009, there are 10 other mission sites that are in varying stages toward implementation. We praise God for those that were begun and have a sense of eager anticipation of God's creative Spirit working towards the goal of planting mission congregations.



In addition to planting mission congregations, there is also a focus upon "**specialized ministries**." Specialized ministries include attention to those among us who are benefitted by ministries for the blind, the deaf, the urban contexts, the ethnic groups, and campus ministry. In all of these specialized ministries, the desire is to be winsome in witness as faith in the Lord Jesus Christ is shared. In this time, matters of the clear Word of God and absolute truth are often relegated by some to simply "one among many" value systems. There is a very pointed need to explain the grace of God in Jesus Christ. We pray for many to "seek and ask" that we might be given the opportunity to give answer. This area of ministry is inclusive of the *Ablaze!* initiative in our Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod. Its goal is to reach 100,000,000 people with the Gospel by the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation in 2017. With this goal in mind, two Torch Relays have occurred in the past triennium. The first relay was from Hell, Michigan to Paradise, Michigan, entitled "Hell to Paradise." In 2008, the Torch Relay was entitled "Coast to Coast" which traveled from

the east side to the west side of Michigan. For 2009, the Torch Relay is entitled "For the Heart of Michigan." This Torch Relay will end on Concordia's campus immediately prior to the opening of the District Convention, June 28th. It is hoped that many will gather to celebrate the completion of this witness undertaking. The runners, their sponsors, and the rallies at congregations throughout the District are focused on witnessing to the lost that they may come to *"Celebrate Jesus."*





In accomplishing the goal of the Mission Department, attention is given to the **provision of Church Workers**. In the past, there have been different ethnic tracts to enable men of various ethnic groups to become pastors. There has been a new undertaking in this past triennium, which was initiated and is now being implemented. This program is entitled the Specific Ministry Pastor (SMP) Program. It was passed at the 2007 Convention of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod. The training is being provided by our seminaries. This approach to developing pastors for service within The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod will enable contextual seminary education as

they train to become pastors. They continue to live and serve "at home" and yet receive a seminary education. These men will have the title "Specific Ministry Pastor." After Ordination, they will be recognized as Pastors of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod, subject to some limitations of type of ministry and place of ministry. It is a great joy to notice the energy, the excitement, and the commitment of these prospective SMP pastors in their love for the Lord Jesus and their desire to serve Him. It is absolutely critical for our Church that these outreach ministries, in particular ethnic and other specialized ministries, be begun. May we celebrate and serve effectively together.

There also has been in this past triennium, a development of focus on **urban ministry in cooperation with other nearby districts**. Districts working together are located around the Great Lakes and are inclusive of South Wisconsin, Northern Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and the two non-geographic districts of our Synod – SELC (Synod of Evangelical Lutheran Churches) and the English District. This program is titled "Joint Urban Ministry Project (JUMP)." This ministry seeks to revitalize urban congregations in ministry to the communities in which they exist. This is done in collaboration and cooperation with the LCMS World Mission and the Center for U.S. Missions.

Member Services Department

Among the departments of the Michigan District, the focus now turns to the Member Services Department. Pastor Richard Wolfram is the Director of Member Services. The particular emphasis of the Member Services Department is upon the "members" of Synod. The definition of members, according to the Handbook of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod, includes the Ministers of Religion – Ordained and Commissioned and the congregations of the District and Synod. In other words, the members of Synod are **professional church workers and congregations**. From the previous review of the four Major Outcomes, the Member Services Department focuses most heavily in Outcomes two, three, and four. Thus, many conferences are provided for church workers and congregations for equipping, resourcing, and networking for effective ministry.

A critical aspect of the Member Services Department is carried out by the Michigan District Commission on Ministerial Growth and Support. This Commission meets regularly to provide **care for the workers of the District**. The Michigan District Sower's Fund has been a tremendous blessing in providing for counseling and other needs of our church workers in times of crisis. We thank and praise God for the continued strong support for the Sower's Fund, and for the kindness of all who contribute. Aid is necessarily offered confidentially. It is heart-warming to see the ways in which those faced with crisis in their ministry have been helped. Stop-gap and other emergency situations can be met to relieve the stress and difficulty that our workers face in such times. We thank God.



In the day-to-day life of our churches, their members, and their staffs, **conflict** occurs. In the past triennium, it seems, there has been an increase in the amount of conflict in the congregations of our District. The question is whether we are doing a better job of discovering those conflicts or that there are simply more conflicts. Suffice it to say that conflict is being discovered through the help of Congregation Ministry Facilitators and our Circuit Counselors and hopefully can be dealt with before it escalates to split congregations and impair ministry. To meet that need, the Michigan District in the past triennium has developed **Unity Ministry** led by Pastor Peter Larsen. Unity is a ministry of mediation that works toward reconciliation and provides a practical, workable way of dealing with conflict and plan for future ministry. Additionally, the Michigan District has Synodical Reconcilers. Currently, there are three who are able to help in congregational and worker conflict.

You may recall from the 2006 Michigan District Convention the presentation of "**Partners in Ministry**" for both congregations and professional church workers. These two documents regarding ethical conduct between and among professional church workers and congregations were to be studied throughout the District and then presented again at this 2009 District Convention. During this triennium, that task has been accomplished. Thanks are due to all! Included in the Workbook are the finalized Principles of Conduct for Professional Church Workers and Congregations for accepting by the District in Convention. May the Lord bless this effort to build and to nurture strong relationships among us as members of the Michigan District and The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod.

It is also a continuing effort of the Michigan District to provide better resources in helping congregations to acquire and retain professional church workers. The effort continues as we meet with congregations experiencing a vacancy in the pastoral office. The Circuit Counselor, the Congregation Ministry Facilitator, and yours truly have continued to meet with congregations as they seek to fill the pastoral office. These congregation vacancy visits build fellowship and heighten awareness of the wonderful congregations in our District!

During the past triennium, the service of the **Congregation Ministry Facilitators** (CMF) has continued as they resource congregations throughout the District. The District has existed for a portion of the triennium with only two full-time Congregation Ministry Facilitators, Pastors Galan Walther and Rick Wolfram. Pastor Roosevelt Gray, Jr. also provides CMF ministry to those of the Mission Department. It is a joy to share that recently an additional half-time Congregation Ministry Facilitator, Pastor Gary Bender, who also serves at St. Lorenz, Frankenmuth, has been added to the staff. He is in position and provides service to the smaller congregations of the District.



Several other ministry areas are also covered by the Member Services Department. A major amount of staff time in the person of the Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Bruce Braun, continues to focus upon the **schools of our District**. The need of our schools and our congregations for funding of mission and ministry is particularly acute in these times of economic stress. There is also considerable focus in the area of **Family Life** led by Pastor Galan Walther. The need has led to a partnership between the District and Concordia University Ann Arbor in developing the Family Friendly Partners Network. It has grown to a number of congregations

in the District and finds a number of congregations waiting to begin involvement in the Family Friendly Partners Network.

Member Services also provides the opportunity for attention to Disaster Relief. Help has been organized and includes financial support, personal involvement, and many other aspects of meeting the needs of those involved in disasters. In this triennium, the southern portion of our country, after Hurricane Ike, has received aid in the aftermath of this disaster.

There is also attention to Intentional Interim Ministry and Chaplaincy led by Pastor Warren Paulson who also serves as Executive Chaplain of the District. Pastor Paulson also works with those involved in Deacon ministry. Another aspect of service is the development of Parish Nurses who serve very effectively across the congregations of the District. Member Services also provides attention to Stewardship development. Mental Illness, via the Mental Illness Task Force, is another need addressed. We thank God for all involved who give of themselves to help others.

General Services Department

The General Services Department provides wonderful support in accomplishing the Outcomes of the District as previously referenced. The involvement of this Department touches, in many ways through the District staff, the congregations, and the ministries of the entire District. The work of the General Services Department often goes unseen but is absolutely critical to the accomplishment of all that proceeds in this report.

The General Services Department is designed to be a support department for the other departments, offices, and commissions of the District. Mr. Chad Woltemath, Vice President of Finance, coordinates the department's three offices of Communications, Development, and Business.

The **Communications** office keeps the congregations, church workers, and laity informed of the mission and ministry that is done on behalf of the congregations of the District as well as provides information on the resources it provides back to its members. In addition, news from sister congregations and other relevant ministry information is also shared through the District's bi-monthly publication *Michigan In Touch*, the weekly e-bulletin, and the District website (www.michigandistrict.org). Changing technology continues to provide opportunities and challenges for the communications office as it seeks to embrace the latest and most cost-effective means of communication while providing information to those who have not yet adopted newer technology.

The main focus of the Development office this past triennium has been on the quiet phase of the **District's 125th Anniversary Thank Offering**, *The Future is Now*. While the two main objectives of the Thank Offering have been Michigan mission starts and support for Michigan students preparing to be professional church workers, a third leg has been added in 2009 in support of the International

Ministry goals of the national Synod campaign *Fan into Flame*. The Development office is led by Mr. Ray Zavada, Vice President of Development, as he regularly visits congregations, thanks them for their support of the District's work at large, and communicates the need for continued support.

The Business office provides various support to District mission and ministry including accounting, budgeting, human resource management, contract review, and property management. The business office also provides event coordination services to assist the various committees with logistical aspects of conferences and events.

Concluding Thoughts

As follows from the bylaw provision for Presidential term limits, this fourth triennium of service marks my final triennium. The glance back over this fourth triennium is as exciting and encouraging as have been the previous three! It is a great joy to focus on the faithfulness of our Lord, His love for us, and His provision of Word and Sacrament ministry that enables The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod to exist. It is humbling as He lays before us His mission and extends to us the invitation to participate with Him in its accomplishment as fellow servants. The joy of service is that which I pray for all who work together to face the challenges and the opportunities as we walk together on the way to heaven.



The mission and ministry of the District exists only because the congregations of the District exist. The congregations exist only because of God's call into existence as He gathers them around Word and Sacrament ministry. May the Lord be praised for all who serve in the congregations of our District. We thank and praise Him for the **Michigan District Board of Directors** who work together so cooperatively and collegially, for our **elected officers**, and for our **Circuit Counselors** as all labor behind the scenes without a lot of public recognition. We also are moved to be thankful for the various task forces, committees, and other organizations and entities

throughout our District. There are so many who do so well in looking beyond themselves to the service of others. May God be praised for them! It is a particular blessing of yours truly to contemplate the partnership that has been shared throughout this past triennium with the **Vice Presidents** of the Michigan District. It is a privilege to serve together with them. May God be praised for First Vice President David Maier, Second Vice President Wayne Wentzel, Third Vice President Michael Roth, and Fourth Vice President K. Frank Graves. The District has been well served both regionally and collectively by these men.

Another source of great joy that is both humbling and exciting is that of our **District staff**. Each morning is begun with the staff gathering in devotion. Our devotion and prayer always includes a congregation or ministry, four church workers of the District by name and picture and the name and picture of one of the Michigan District professional church work students. Gathering around the Word at the beginning of each day brings the sure promise of the Spirit's working in and among us as a team. What a joy it is to work together in His service!

Another reflection that eventuates in prayer and thanksgiving to our good and gracious God is directed toward Julie Strobl. Julie began her service in this triennium as my Executive



Assistant. Julie began with a sense of ministry, has served wonderfully effectively, and is a tremendous blessing. It has been and continues to be a joy to work together as a team with Julie. May such service bring her joy.

Finally, it is my great joy to seek your permission of sharing, also, a personal word with regard to God's gift of Barb. She is a blessing in my life in so many ways that I cannot count them all. Her partnership, not only in my life but in aspects of District ministry, for these last 12 years has brought me blessings of love, support, partnership, commitment, strength, and encouragement in carrying out this ministry. Whatever yours truly has been able to offer in service to the Lord and His Church has been only positively impacted by Barb. I thank and praise God and ask your prayer for Barb, especially as she begins to put up with me full-time in retirement!

A final reflection is that the theme for this Convention is so appropriate. As the Lord leads, my whole-hearted support, in transition and beyond, will continue for the sake of His Church and His District. We are privileged by Him to serve. May it have been done to His glory, the lifting high of His cross, and the building and extending of His Kingdom. May God bless the ministry of the Michigan District through our congregations that many others will come to *"Celebrate Jesus."*

Education being offered in the Circuit: St. John, Rogers City: K-8 Day School; Holy Cross, Onaway: Pre-school; St. John Cheboygan: Pre-school and Kindergarten.

This, the northern most circuit in the Michigan District, continues to be a vibrant group of congregations that more and more are receiving members of the southern congregations of Michigan as summer residents and permanent retirees. We welcome the opportunity to provide spiritual care for all of these new members as well as the visiting vacationers along with our nucleus of permanent 'up-north' residents.

Circuit #2-- Alpena Circuit Rev. Robert L. Mikkelson, Counselor

Circuit #2 is in Northeast Michigan. Because of our proximity and common concerns, Circuit #2 works closely with Circuit #1 which is the northern most circuit of the Michigan District. Circuits #1 and #2 hold Winkel meetings together that are held on the first Tuesday of each month from 10am till 2:30pm. They alternate host congregations between the Circuits with the congregations' ladies groups providing the noon meal. Even though attendants travel long distances, they look forward to an encouraging time together. Morale is good at Winkels. Yearly, congregations in the circuits strive to cooperate in holding joint Reformation and Ascension services. Some pastors and congregations organize and staff a yearly confirmation retreat held at Loon Lake Retreat Center in Hale, MI. The Alpena Mackinaw Straits Mission Action Council (TAMSMAC) has been active since 1987 when there were 15 congregations in the two Circuits. The number of congregations has grown to 22 now. TAMSMAC is an amalgamation of all the LCMS churches in these two northern circuits binding themselves together for the sake of spreading the Gospel of Jesus in the North.

St. John's Lutheran Church, Hillman - St. John's has been serving the northeast portion of Montmorency County since 1888. Rev. Jason Mandley has served the congregation since 1999. Despite an aging population, migration and difficult economic times, the congregation continues to hold its own while faithfully proclaiming God's Word and administering the Holy Sacraments. Some significant events of the past three years include the purchase of the new hymnal Lutheran Service Book, the purchase of a new organ and putting a new roof on the church. The Early Childhood Center, which opened in 2004, has expanded to offer Kindergarten and First Grade as well as Preschool. The director, Mrs. Debbie Miller, has over 20 years of experience teaching in Macomb County. St. John's and her members have also been active and visible in the Hillman community. The congregation conducts church services on a regular basis for the residents of the local nursing home. The church opens its doors to the community by allowing community members to use the gym and some of the school teams hold practice in the facility. The congregation hosts benefit dinners for causes in the community that are consistent with congregational values. St. John's realizes that all blessings come as a result of God's goodness and they look forward to the church's 125th anniversary in 2013.

St. Paul Lutheran Church, Posen - St. Paul is an historical congregation founded in 1873. Due to failing health, Pastor Harold Molzan retired and Rev. David Spaeth is serving as Vacancy Pastor. St. Paul is a worshipping congregation and strives to maintain the integrity of the Gospel.

Living Water Lutheran Church, Mio - Rev. Carlo Sgambelluri is serving Living Water Lutheran Church along with the Faith, Glennie and part-time vacancy duties at Bethlehem, Lewiston. Living Water is a church in mission which reaches out, holds Bible Study, and is organizing to become more stable and to grow.

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Ossineke - Pastor Arthur Reich retired and Intentional Interim Minister, Pastor Barton Gray, helped the congregation adjust to Pastor Reich's absence and set goals for growth. With the ordination and call of Pastor Dennis Neigh, Good Shepherd shares the services of Pastor Neigh in a dual parish agreement with Faith in Harrisville. Good Shepherd is the larger of the two congregations with average worship attendance of 40-45 weekly. Good Shepherd has active boards, lay involvement, Bible Studies and children's programs. They respond to needs, strive to serve and reach out that others may be won for Christ.

Faith Lutheran Church, Harrisville - Dennis Neigh has been a servant in Word and Sacrament Ministry of Faith for approximately eleven years. He was ordained and installed as Pastor in 2008 after serving Faith as a Deacon. Although Northern Michigan is suffering greatly because of the economy, the congregation has remained viable. They have a membership of 20+ and worship an average of 15 this past year. The congregation finds the Lord in all things. They are loving and active. They maintain their building and grounds and continue to be a close knit group while caring about the community as well. Recently, Dale Job, a member of the congregation, started his studies through the Deacon Training Program of the District with Pastor Neigh's support.

Immanuel Lutheran Church, Alpena - Rev. William Morris is serving as an Administrative Pastor and Rev. James Erickson as Associate Pastor. The Pastors are involved in community concerns, radio ministry, writing religion articles in the newspaper, and are active in the school. The congregation hosts a Good Friday Treore Service that is well attended by visitors in the community and is the most frequent host of circuit joint Reformation Services and larger conferences. They are very active in youth programs and evangelism outreach. Immanuel is the largest congregation in Circuit #2 and is a good "big sister" congregation to other LCMS churches in the area. The congregation operates a Lutheran Elementary School with seven full and part time teachers along with Mrs. Pam White who serves as Principal.

Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Lewiston - Rev. Carlo Sgambelluri and Rev. David Spaeth continue to share duties as Vacancy Pastors at Bethlehem after Pastor Bob Butler took a call to Wisconsin. Bethlehem has started a training program for young men of the congregation who may become elders of the church one day. They also hold a Vacation Bible School program which is blessed with exceptional attendance of 100 children from the church and community. They are an active and involved congregation who addresses itself to ministry, purity of doctrine and evangelical outreach.

St. Paul Lutheran Church, Hubbard Lake (Formerly of Herron) - St. Paul is served by Rev. Robert L. Mikkelson. In September 2004, the congregation voted to build new facilities. As time lapsed, a public school six miles away that was forced to close became available and was purchased by St. Paul in 2007. The building is under renovation and has enough space available to carry out its ministry until a new church building can be added. The congregation has been worshipping in the school since January 4, 2009. Architects plans for building a new church are being completed and the congregation will approve a date for ground breaking. They intend to use the new space to expand its ministry to serve and reach more people with the Gospel. St. Paul is supportive of Christian education programs in its congregation and financially assists families whose children attend Immanuel Lutheran School in Alpena. It also has aid and scholarship funds for those who pursue fulltime church work.

Circuit #4 – Gladwin Circuit Rev. William C. Winter, Counselor

The Gladwin Circuit is made up of six congregations in the gateway to the northern counties of the Lower Peninsula. We minister, we serve, we play with great thanks to God as we welcome the people of God who seek relaxation from the faster pace of the metropolitan areas 'down below'.

The congregations of the Gladwin Circuit are as follows:

Prince of Peace, Clare is served by the Rev. Kevin Leidich who was installed in October of 2005 from the state of Wisconsin.

Our Savior, Gladwin is served by the Rev. Matthew Schulz, who graduated from our seminary in St. Louis in the spring of 2006. He was installed as pastor on July 23rd of that year.

St. John, Houghton Lake is served by the Rev. William Winter who has been blessed to serve God's people at St. John for over 33 years.

St. Luke, Harrison has been served by the Rev. Michael Schaedig since his installation in 2003, which was his first parish since graduation from Ft. Wayne as a second career pastor.

Hope Lutheran Church, St. Helen is served by the Rev. Rodney Morrison who was installed just last spring, in 2008, having graduated from our seminary in Ft. Wayne.

St. John, West Branch is served by the Rev. Howard Travis, a second career pastor from Ft. Wayne. Pastor Travis was installed at St. John in the summer of 2006.

We meet monthly for Winkel, on the last Tuesday, except during the summer months. We rotate serving as host among the congregations of the Timberline and Gladwin circuits. We have been meeting jointly with the Timberline Circuit for the past year or more. We meet for Holy Communion and casuistry, ending with lunch at a local watering hole.

A significant event for our northern region was when the four circuits of the north played host to a "Peacemakers" Seminar, led by Dr. Ted Kober from Ambassadors of Reconciliation. The one-day seminar was attended by laymen and clergy from the four northern circuits of the Michigan District at the fellowship hall of St. John Lutheran Church of Hillman, MI. We must always remember to give thanks to God for the great gifts with which He has blessed our Church through her laymen, teachers and pastors.

God has truly blessed the Michigan District and the Gladwin Circuit with quality men of God in the pastoral offices of her member churches. All of the pastoral offices in Circuit #4 are filled, for which we give great thanks.

Circuit #5 – Midland Circuit Rev. Paul Young, Counselor

The Lord continues to be gracious to Circuit 5. Our eleven churches, counting Christ the King Chapel at CMU, continue to gather from our own unique settings to support each other. We make note of the Circuits continued support of missions, particularly student outreach and support at Christ the King. Each of our Pastors brings experience, knowledge and the love for God's Gospel in Christ Jesus from different walks and settings. Two of our Pastors celebrated 25-years in the ministry: Rev David Reed and Rev Sam Reith. One Pastor (retired) celebrated 40-years in the ministry: Rev Bob Koeppen.

The Lord continues to be gracious to Circuit 5 for our walk together in Word and Sacrament, common faith and encouragement to each. While there are challenges to meet in each of our congregations, and those with schools in maintaining enrollments, our Lord strengthens and guides. To our Lord be all praise, honor, power and glory.

Circuit #6 - Bay Circuit Rev. William Allwardt, Counselor

Our churches in Bay City and Bay County include: Faith (Bay City), Immanuel (Bay City), Pilgrim (Essexville), St. John (Amelith), St. John (Pinconning), St. Paul (Frankenlust), Trinity (Monitor) and Zion (Bay City). We normally meet and enjoy our collegiality on the third Tuesday morning of the month from September through May.

Events that have taken place during these past three years or are taking place include the following.

Faith, Bay City had the privilege to welcome in August of 2008, Associate Pastor George Morris to its staff. Teacher Dwain Grimpo served as interim principal for two years until August of 2008 when Dan Stoelting was installed as called principal/teacher. Ministry emphasis "Expanding Our Faith" provided for facility updates in the sanctuary, fellowship space, restrooms, offices and classrooms.

St. Paul, Frankenlust was also privileged to add in August of 2007 an Associate Pastor, Rev. Corey Grunklee. A new ministry began in December of 2008 known as Angel Ministry. Angel Food Ministries is a non-profit, non-denominational organization dedicated to providing food relief and contributing to benevolent outreaches in communities throughout the United States.

Trinity, Monitor completed the remodeling of its school and the addition of a gymnasium/fellowship.

St. John, Amelith expanded and modernized its school in the summer of 2006 with a 15,000 sq. ft. addition that was built in large part by Laborers for Christ and St. John members. The new facility has been in use since September of 2006 with increasing enrollments each year since its construction. The addition rebuilt the educational portion of the 1955 school by adding four 30 x 30 foot classrooms for double classes in grades 1-8 and two 30 x 45 foot classrooms for the preschool and kindergarten programs. The old school was remodeled into an administrative wing with a faculty/meeting room, expanded church/school office area with work room, offices for pastor and assistant as well as a chapel/meeting room, confirmation room/meeting room and library/cafeteria/meeting room. Phase 1 of St. John's Master plan for growth was financed by St. John members and a loan from Church Extension Fund. Of course, a school is much more than bricks and mortar and we at St. John praise God for its fine principal and faculty. The modernized and expanded facility has surely been a drawing card for prospective parents. The stewardship challenges within the parish remain great in light of Michigan's economy and our nation's financial woes. Yet, in spite of such things, we thank and praise God for His ongoing faithfulness and allencompassing grace. In 2006, St. John-Amelith also received Synod's new hymnal, Lutheran Service Book, with thanksgiving for use in worship and it has been a blessing to the parish. Staff milestones celebrated in 2008 included Mr. Ed Opel's 50th anniversary in the teaching ministry, Pastor Stephen Starke's 25th ordination anniversary, and Mrs. Cindy Rauschert's 10th anniversary as teacher at St. John Lutheran School-Amelith. To God be all glory!

Immanuel, Bay City – Pastor Leslie Tyvela is currently serving the Immanuel congregation. Baptized membership – 2484; Communicant membership – 1767; Average Worship Attendance – 403.

Pilgrim, Essexville – Pastor Carl Trosien is currently serving the Pilgrim congregation. Baptized membership – 653; Communicant membership – 512; Average Worship Attendance – 155.

Zion, Bay City – Pastor William Allwardt and Pastor John Wernecke are currently serving the Zion congregation. Baptized membership – 1985; Communicant membership – 1520; Average Worship Attendance – 464.

St. John, Pinconning – Pastor David Jung is currently serving the St. John congregation. Baptized membership – 465; Communicant membership – 378; Average Worship Attendance – 147.

General Circuit News:

- Thumb East Circuit meets with Thumb West Circuit for monthly Winkels, consisting of worship, an exegetical or sermon study, lunch, a topical presentation and time for casuistry.
- Also, the pastors and wives of the two Circuits get together annually for both a Christmas party and a summer cookout and picnic.
- The Rev. Henry Hales became pastor of St. John, Palms and the Rev. David McCloskey became pastor of Zion, Harbor Beach during this last triennium.

Congregational Activity:

St. Peter, Kinde – The congregation has been undergoing renovation of its facilities, making major improvements. The congregation is involved in several outreach programs in the community, and the Ladies' Aid continues to raise money for missions, help for local families and assistance to nursing home residents. Its pastor led the first Memorial Day Service held in Kinde, working with local veterans. Their 2008 Mission Festival included the Rev. Robert Rahn of Lutheran Heritage Foundation as the preacher.

St. John, Port Hope - St. John celebrated its 140th anniversary in 2008. Its pastor also celebrated his 10th anniversary in the ministry. It operates a Day School that runs Preschool through 8th. Through Word and Sacrament, church membership and attendance at worship has risen in these last three years.

Zion, Harbor Beach₋ The congregation completed its year-long celebration of its 125th anniversary. It continues to maintain a Christian Day School (grades Preschool through 8th). They installed their new pastor, the Rev. David McCloskey. The congregation is currently updating its broadcast facilities to allow a more professional broadcast of its weekly Services over cable TV. It also has a ministry to the hearing impaired, has established a Day Care ministry, and are in the planning stages for a new day care facility. It is in the process of evaluating how Zion interacts with the community to see what steps can be taken for greater interaction with it.

Trinity, Forestville - The congregation celebrated its $125^{\rm th}$ anniversary in 2007.

St. John, Port Sanilac - Formed in 1857, St. John is 152 years old. Though small, St. John has expanded its ministry to offer weekly services at the local retirement home, and through last year's VBS program, baptized three children.

St. John, Palms - The congregation is over 90 years old. In this last triennium, they celebrated the installation of their new pastor, the Rev. Henry Hales.

Peace, Sandusky - During this last triennium, Peace completed ev. work on its facilities, making it handicapped accessible District Reports Page 10 - throughout. The congregation also installed new pipes for its pipe organ.

Our Savior, Marlette – The congregation is continuing to work toward its goal of offering a Lutheran School in Marlette with grades preschool through 8th. They are up to Grade Four as of now.

Our Savior, Bad Axe - In August of 2007, the congregation completed Phase One of its building program which includes a new gathering area, offices, nursery, conference area, handicapped facilities and elevator. Phase Two of the expansion will include a fellowship/recreation hall. We are also in the process of renovating our Preschool facilities, and have completed work on a new playground area. The congregation also celebrated the Ordination and Installation of the Rev. Ray Sting as its Assistant Pastor who, up until that time, had been serving the congregation as a licensed Deacon. The congregation also hosts a weekly radio broadcast, "On Solid Ground," reaching Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac counties. In this last triennium, our Missions committee has hosted our annual Missionfest, which has included representatives from POBLO, Lutheran Heritage Foundation and MOST Ministries. This fall's Missionfest will host the organization, "Food For the Poor." We will also be one of the rally points for this summer's Ablaze Torch Relay Race. We continue to periodically offer various events for the community, such as an Advent Concert with David Paul Britton, and the film series, "The Truth Project."

Circuit #8 – Thumb West Circuit Rev. Gerald Meyer, Counselor

St. Peter, Bach (Sebewaing) - Shortly before the 2006 convention, St. Peter Congregation had formed a dual parish with St. John's, Kilmanagh. The two congregations have worked together in the last three years to implement the agreement. St. Peter, Bach continues to support an average of 6-8 students yearly by paying in full tuition at Christ the King Lutheran School - \$3250 per student each year. The congregation has also supplied Lutheran World Relief and local county homeless shelters with approximately 500 quilts. The congregation is looking forward to celebrating the church's 100th anniversary in 2012. While there have been some difficult and trying times, the doors remain open, the Gospel is preached and the Sacraments are administered according to Christ's institution. Pastor Allen Stoll who is currently serving in the capacity of Intentional Interim Pastor has been well received and his visitation to the sick, shut-in and others is greatly appreciated. Finally, the congregation purchased the Lutheran Service Book and uses it regularly in worship.

Good Shepherd, Caseville – Over the past three years, Good Shepherd has seen some growth in its Sunday School. The congregation has also seen some growth in financial support which has allowed them to purchase a Clavinova which is used to lead singing for worship. The congregation also was able to purchase new seating for the nave. They enjoy Sunday morning Bible study and appreciate the Children's message that became part of the Sunday morning worship. Unfortunately, their much beloved Pastor Jim Nihiser accepted a call to serve on the other side of the state, so the congregation is currently in the process of calling a pastor to serve them in the years to come.

Good Shepherd, Cass City – Good Shepherd is blessed with three good organists and so it was with great joy that we dedicated our new organ on June 11, 2006. The congregation joined Synod's "Adopt a Missionary" program and currently supports Missionary Matthew Heise who works in Russia and other areas of the old Soviet Union. We purchased the Lutheran Service Book and dedicated the hymnals in September of 2007. We celebrated the 40th anniversary of the dedication of our present sanctuary in December of 2007 and the 60th anniversary of the founding of our congregation in January of 2008. Currently, the pews in the church are in the process of being refinished, a new tile floor has been installed and the interior of the church has been repainted.

Grace, Fairgrove - Without accruing any debt, we paved our parking lot and replaced the church's sidewalks, making them handicap accessible. We engaged, with the assistance of Thrivent, in a campaign in late 2006 to clean up the landscaping of a number of our community's shut-ins, our community's cemetery, and our town park. In the summer of 2007, seven people (two teams of five adults) embarked on a short term mission trip to the Shoshone people of the Wind River Indian Reservation in Wyoming. These people assisted the called pastor in conducting Vacation Bible School, making a number of repairs to the facility and painted the interior of the church. In 2008, we raised money to send a number of youth and youth leaders to the Higher Things youth gathering in Pennsylvania. Also in 2008, the women of the parish began to make quilts for cancer victims of the parish and community.

St. Paul, Linkville (Pigeon) - God has richly blessed this small rural congregation since our last report. Our Vacation Bible School continues to draw many children from the community. The average attendance is around 60 children, many of whom have never heard the Gospel. We pray for the Holy Spirit's blessing upon them. We have averaged 15 new adult confirmands over the last three years, some of whom are relatives of existing members but many who have been invited to our services by friends and relatives. We rejoice that one of our own, Josh Errer, has begun his studies to enter into the Office of the Holy Ministry at our seminary in St. Louis. He is the first son of our congregation to do this. We continue to support him with our treasures and prayers as he pursues his studies leading to ordination. We give praise and thanks to God for giving us the privilege of proclaiming His marvelous deeds here in this small corner of the Thumb.

St. John's, Kilmanagh (Sebewaing) – St. John's congregation has been working with St. Peter, Bach at implementing the joint parish agreement between them. The agreement has allowed the congregation to continue to serve its members as it has done for 133 years, without having to worry about how to meet expenses. The congregation has been able to make some needed repairs and renovations, including work on its organ. Currently, the congregation is being served by Pastor Allen Stoll as an Intentional Interim Pastor. His outgoing personality, diligent care for the sick and shut-ins, and strong proclamation of the Gospel are appreciated by the people and attendance at worship services is increasing.

Immanuel, Sebewaing – Having the vision of seeing "Jesus in every Heart, and Head, and Hand," Immanuel continues to experience God's grace and share the Savior's love. To equip God's saints, we extended a call in 2007 to the Rev. Michael Boyer to serve as Associate Pastor. In 2008, we extended a call to our new school administrator, Mr. David Kumm.

St. Paul, Unionville – St. Paul Lutheran Church continues to support its members through the lively preaching of the Gospel and faithful attention to the sick and shut-ins. It continues, in partnership with Immanuel, Sebewaing, to operate Christ the King Lutheran School, providing the facilities for the lower grades and calling the teachers for those classrooms. This is no small expense to the congregation, but the members continue their long tradition of commitment to supporting Lutheran elementary education.

Circuit #9 – Frankenmuth Circuit Rev. Dale C. Ahlschwede, Counselor

"As the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return to it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish, so that it yields seed for the sower and bread for the eater, so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." Isaiah 55: 10-11.

What a wonderful and exciting promise God gives us. As a result of God's faithfulness to His every promise, I can report most assuredly that God's divine will and purpose are being realized throughout the congregations and communities that comprise Circuit #9 in our Michigan District which include Immanuel, Frankentrost - St. Lorenz, Frankenmuth - St. Michael, Richville - St. Paul, Caro - St. Paul, Millington - Trinity, Reese - and Trinity-St. James, Munger. Twelve congregations comprise the Michigan District's Saginaw Circuit #10.

1) Bethlehem, Saginaw is served by the Rev. Michael R. Korte, Administrative Pastor, and the Rev. Charles F. Buckhahn, Associate Pastor.

 2) The Rev. William W. Hessler ministers to Faith, Bridgeport, and also serves as the Circuit Counselor.
 3) The Rev. Mark P. Buckert serves Good Shepherd, Saginaw. The congregation also participates in the Synod's Vicarage program.

4) The Rev. James F. Krueger was installed as Pastor of Holy Cross, Saginaw in January, 2009. The Rev. Luther Werth served Holy Cross as its Intentional Interim Pastor after the Rev. Timothy Loewe completed his ministry in July, 2007.

5) After the Rev. M. Samuel Sherouse accepted a Call out of the Circuit in March, 2008, the Rev. Robert Schultz began serving Messiah, Carrollton as Interim Pastor.6) Deacon Richard Mallory continues to provide Word and Sacrament ministry to the saints at Nativity, St. Charles.

7) Peace, Saginaw continues to be served by the Rev. C. William Weis, Senior Pastor, and the Rev. Paul R. Hinz, Pastor.

8) Redeemer, Saginaw saw the Rev. J. Robert Herrod accept a Call out of the Circuit in November, 2007. The Rev. John Mueller from Valley Lutheran High School provided pulpit supply until the Rev. Stephen Schilke became Redeemer's Intentional Interim Pastor in November, 2008.

9) St. Mark, Saginaw continues to be served by the Rev. Edward Meyer. St. Mark also honored Deacon Roy Luplow upon his retirement following many years of faithful service.

10) The Rev. Martin J. Hagenow, Senior Pastor, and the Rev. Richard E. Mundt, Associate Pastor, continue serving the saints at St. Peter, Hemlock.

11) St. Philip, Owosso is served by the Rev. Brian Heidt.12) The Rev. Paul A. Hauser continues ministering to the good saints at Zion (Hemlock).

The Circuit enjoys a close working relationship with Saginaw's Valley Lutheran High School where the Rev. John Mueller ministers as Pastor on Staff. The Circuit also enjoys the experienced input of several Emeriti: the Rev. Paul R. Beck (Good Shepherd), The Rev. Bert Eggers, the Rev. Edward L. Kast, and the Rev. Charles Smith (Peace), and the Rev. Robert Koeppen and the Rev. Edward Pankow (St. Peter). The Saginaw Circuit meets monthly from September – June, except for those months where there is a district conference. Generally the Circuit meets jointly with the neighboring Frankenmuth Circuit every other month. It was also the Circuit's privilege to host the Spring 2009 North & East Region Pastors' Conference. The Rev. Dr. James A. Waddell, LCMS Pastor and Instructor in the Department of Near Eastern Studies at the University of Michigan, led the pastors in his presentation: "Looking Forward in Harmony: Reintroducing the Conversation about Worship in the Lutheran Congregation."

Circuit #11 – Flint North Circuit Rev. Clifford F. Bira, Counselor

Christ the King, Flint began Deaf mission under District Missionary at Large Pastor Tom Dunseth and also hosted the Church Interpreter Training Institute from the Ft. Wayne Seminary who gave a weekend workshop to help train the interpreters in churches all over Michigan. With thanksgiving to God, willing workers from St Lorenz, Frankenmuth graciously provided needed repairs and renovations to the church roof, barn, and sanctuary chancel area. Since adding Deaf Ministry, congregation membership has increased from 8 to 35.

Christ, Birch Run - no report.

Holy Cross, Flushing continues to provide leadership in its community by assisting to found and lead a brand new Flushing Community Outreach Center ministry in partnership with six other community congregations to jointly meet the needs of the poor and needy. Holy Cross continues to be a training center for church workers as they serve with the members of the congregation toward certification as a Director of Christian Education and another as Director of Christian Outreach. Our DCE, Carolyn Bira, has recently contributed authorship to a portion of a new book on Confirmation Ministry from Concordia Publishing House. Rev. Clifford Bira, Senior Pastor, has made two mission trips to Latvia, doing leadership training and connecting with Latvian Lutheran Church leaders as a team member concerning Pastoral Leadership Institute International leadership training for its leaders. He has also completed certification as a "Mission Coach" to work with church planters and also to work with Michigan District coaches who are part of the new District Ablaze Effort of revitalizing many congregations in the District. The congregation, while welcoming home one of its international missionary couples, continues to support ongoing international mission work in Latvia and Central Africa.

Messiah, Clio celebrated the ministry and retirement of its founding Pastor, Rev. Erv Kostizen and the addition of a new Associate Pastor, Rev. Eric Cloeter.

Our Savior, Flint celebrated the 80th anniversary of its congregation and continues to reach out to the neighborhoods in the north end of Flint with a Food Bank and after school reading program. St. Martin, Birch Run has enjoyed the Lord's many blessings as they devote themselves to "Reaching, Bringing and Touching." They completed a successful Capital Stewardship Campaign "One Faith-One Future" to reduce debt; installed Randy Bickel as their new Director of Family Life & Youth; joined the Ablaze movement; and increased lay involvement. Outreach efforts include their 4th Comedy Night, Offering the Truth Project and Financial Peace University for teaching; as well as hosting the testimony of Biggest Loser contestants Shellay & Amy. The congregation has set a goal of 1000 members by 2012 and has supported a second Homes of Hope mission trip in Mexicali, Mexico.

St. Paul, Flint celebrated the ministry and retirement of Senior Pastor Rev. Roger Kilponen and has called Associate Pastor Rev. Steven Maske to become their new Senior Pastor. 2007 saw the addition of Deacon Bill Storm to the staff and in 2008, the addition of Chris Garcia as Director of Family Life. During the past three years, the congregation has engaged in two significant and in depth mission and ministry studies to aid the plan for the future work of God through their congregation. In 2009, the congregation is celebrating its 100th Anniversary.

United In Christ, Flint celebrated the retirement of its first pastor, Rev. Gilbert Mabry in 2007 who had brought them together as one congregation from Mt. Olive & St. Andrew Lutheran Churches. On July 1, 2007, they ordained and installed Rev. David E. Daniel as their second pastor to serve United In Christ. October 12, 2007 saw the celebration of their 10th Anniversary as a merged congregation. New outreach and service efforts are being launched such as "Trunk or Treat" outreach into nearby neighborhoods, food baskets for the needy, and collecting medicine, clothing and other items for international mission work in Haiti. The congregation is an active participant with Love, INC. of Genesee County servicing the food and clothing needs of these requiring such aid.

Circuit #12 – Flint South Circuit Rev. Larry Eckart, Counselor

Trinity, Fenton - Trinity is midway through a campaign to pay off the CEF mortgage on their future site. The congregation has a diverse array of ministries with a strong focus on local and foreign missions. They continue to be a solid congregation led by Pastor Dean Dumbrille.

Redeemer, Flint - Redeemer solidified its Adult Bible Study ministry and improved their music ministry with the addition of a full time organist. They continue to look for ways to strengthen their overall ministry under the leadership of Pastor Tim Speckman.

Peace, Flint – Peace had a significant change in October, 2008 as Pastor Jim Wilber retired after spending almost his entire ministry as the congregation's pastor. The congregation is now served by Intentional Interim Pastor, Paul Boerger. Together, Pastor Boerger and the people of Peace, Flint continue their ministry on Flint's south side.

Christ, Goodrich - Christ Lutheran has been reaching out - District Reports Page 13 -

to the lost through various Bible Studies. They are holding their own in the difficult economy. Some families in the congregation have significantly increased their regular church attendance. Pastor Kelly Todd continues his faithful leadership.

Pilgrim, Burton - In spite of the Flint economy pitching downward in the last three years, Pilgrim continues its Word and Sacrament ministry. In addition to his normal duties, Pastor Dan Wonderly offers his advanced training as a counselor to both congregation and community.

Faith, Grand Blanc - Faith had the interesting experience of switching their Associate and Senior Pastors in the last year. They are focusing on family ministry and gearing their total ministry mix toward building the Christian family. Marriage and family ministry is also used specifically as an outreach to the community. As of March 2009, they are in the process of calling a new Youth Pastor whose ministry will help young people be leaders in family ministry today. Faith is led by Senior Pastor Todd Biermann and Associate Pastor Wayne Wentzel.

New Life, Swartz Creek - New Life is a growing congregation. 90% of their members come from people previously disconnected from the church. Like so many congregations in Genesee County, New Life took a huge hit financially in the last part of 2008. The congregation is currently re-tooling to minister more effectively given the economic landscape. The congregation is served by Pastor Brad Yops.

Prince of Peace, Ortonville - Prince of Peace, Ortonville continues to minister to the community along Grange Hall Road.

Hope, Linden - Hope has enjoyed the development of its Family Ministry, Women's Ministry and Men's Ministry in the last three years. The congregation continues to have a strong connection with the local school system, annually hosting the high school Baccalaureate service and co-hosting with the school system, an annual benefit dance for needy families in the area. 200 kids regularly come to Hope's VBS in June. The congregation voted in January to add a 5,700 square foot addition. Hope is led by Pastor Larry Eckart.

Circuit #13 – Lapeer Circuit Rev. David H. Hensler, Counselor

St. Paul, Lapeer - St. Paul, Lapeer, operates a three to four year old pre-school and an early five through eighth grade day school. In 2008, St. Paul celebrated its 135th Anniversary of serving the Lapeer community. St. Paul operates a Food for Families program which feeds about 80 people every Friday. The congregation also conducts a food distribution program that gives food to about 700 needy people each fall. The congregation also partially sponsors Vicar J.P. Cima, a LCMS missionary in Vietnam. We have also taken on a project of building a community health clinic in Vietnam in the Phuong Vien province. The congregation also participates in the Refuge. This is a cooperative effort by the churches in Lapeer to provide food and shelter to the homeless people of our community during the cold months. This year, for the first time, St. Paul sponsored a community garden by making garden plots

available on the churches' land to families of the community who wanted to grow their own garden food. There were over 20 garden plots. It was a wonderful tool for creating goodwill in the community.

St. Timothy, Otisville - St. Timothy continues to experience God's blessings of spiritual and unit growth. We have been blessed with Bible study leaders and weekly attendance has grown to over 70 adults. We continue our Food Bank program serving Otisville and surrounding communities. A festive Sunday School Rally Day and a Trunk -n- Treat festival are recent additions to church and local community activities. The last two years we have also contributed financially and physically to the Habitat for Humanity program. All praise to God!

St. Mark, Flint – Our congregation operates a day school, consisting of pre-school through eighth grade. It's a blessing to teach God's children with God's Word. To watch them grow in their Christian faith and life is a joy! In 2006, St. Mark changed its governance to policy-based. This structure streamlines the decision-making process and involves more people in ministry and less in attending meetings. In 2007, nineteen members went on a week-long mission trip to Agua Viva Children's Home in Guatemala. Another trip is planned for this July. Also, closer to home, approximately 20 members of St. Mark have renovated seven rooms at the Lutheran Boys Home in Bay City. More ways of reaching out with the love of Jesus are being sought.

New Life in Christ, North Branch - was served by Deacon Bill Storm (2006-2007). On April 24th 2008, Joseph Schierlinger became a licensed deacon and is now serving New Life. Many thanks to the Lord for the retired pastors, Rev. Ed Narr and Rev. Marvin Ramthun, that helped us through the beginning of 2008. Our fellowship hall is completed and works out great for large events. In 2007, we started three new projects to get our community involved with us. First is the Father/Son dinner which is held in the winter. The first speaker was a local man who wrote Christian children's books, the following year we had former Detroit Lion player, Eric Hipple. In the spring we have the Biker's Blessing. There is Christian music, a sermon and then the blessing of the bikers for a safe season. In the summer, we have a local Golf Outing that involves most of the area businesses. All events were very successful. Even though we regret to say we have lost seven members over the past three years, by death or moving on, we can thank the Lord for the 27 new members of New Life. Sunday School registration still averages in the mid-30's, with seven more to be confirmed in 2009. V.B.S. is always successful, averaging 50, with more than half being non-members. May God continue to bless His little church on the corner.

LCMS Trinity, Davison – God has copiously blessed Trinity during the past three years. Even though Trinity had been vacant during two of the past three years the congregation experienced growth and her members made strategic plans for future kingdom work. During the final two years of the extended vacancy, funity nunity Trinity sold its former office building and relocated the church offices to the main church building. A small office building near the church was acquired and remodeled to serve the church's -District Reports Page 14youth ministries. Trinity brings Christ to the local community through it's growing Mothers of Preschoolers, Vacation Bible School, and seasonal events and activities. In late 2008, the congregation made a significant investment in sound and video projection as these technologies are now part of all worship services. God has been good.

Calvary, Flint - In August of 2006, we changed pastors. Rev. Henry Wesenberg started serving as our pastor. We celebrated our 75th Anniversary on October 29, 2006. In January and February of 2007, we looked at different possibilities for Calvary's future. It was decided to continue with Pastor Wesenberg as a part-time pastor. In the fall, the parsonage next to the church was demolished, since it had not been used as our parsonage for over ten years and was in very bad shape. We are involved in several social ministry projects. We work with Love, Inc. to help provide some of the personal products that people need. We also make donations to some of the local food banks. We helped sponsor a food bank giveaway where over 200 people each got two bags of groceries. Our ladies also make hundreds of quilts each year. We also have a food collection for the Ft. Wayne seminary each year. Though we are a very small congregation in a very disadvantaged neighborhood, we are able to proclaim the Gospel every Sunday.

Holy Redeemer, Dryden – Since the last Michigan District Convention, Holy Redeemer has worked with Rev. Galan Walther, our Congregational Ministry Facilitator, to renew its core values, mission and vision statements. Based on this effort, the congregation's ministry boards are now implementing various strategies to work toward our shared vision. In June of 2009, the congregation will also dedicate a meditation and prayer garden for use by the public and the members of Holy Redeemer.

Circuit #14 – Port Huron Circuit Rev. Gerhardt Doroh, Counselor

During the last triennium God's people move boldly forward in outreach and mission. The Lord continued to bless the ministries of Circuit 14.

After a time of extended vacancy First Lutheran, Algonac received Pastor Robert Herrod into their midst. Not only did Pastor Herrod arrive, but shortly thereafter his new bride Lynn joined him in ministry. During the vacancy, the congregation gained a new sense of mission and outreach to the Algonac area.

At this same time a group from First Lutheran felt the Lord leading them to establish a mission congregation. Through prayer and the study of God's Word, this group formed Living Faith in Marine City. In 2008, Living Faith Lutheran Church called Pastor Scott Roberts (Terri), a 2008 Concordia Seminary graduate to serve as their first resident Pastor. Family of Christ has been a member congregation since 2006. The congregation averages about 84 in worship every week.

Faith Tamil, Troy – Currently served by Vacancy Pastor, Rev. Arul Alexander Sundaradhas Faith Tamil became a member congregation in 2007. They are currently averaging 64 in worship each week.

Circuit #17 – Oakland North Circuit Rev. Michael P. Schulz, Counselor

Circuit congregations include St. Trinity, Clarkston; Good Shepherd, Lake Orion; Holy Cross, Oxford; Crown of Life, Rochester Hills; Gethsemane, Rochester Hills; Living Word, Rochester; St. John, Rochester; St. Stephen, Waterford; and Incarnate Word, Rochester Hills. The mission work at St. Paul Community Lutheran site in Pontiac continues under the guidance of Dietrick Gladden.

Our circuit meets with the Circuit #26 - Kensington Circuit for Winkel conferences on the second Tuesday of September, November, December, January, February, March, and April.

St. Trinity, Clarkston - Vacant

The congregation is in the process of calling a pastor to serve this vibrant congregation, which continues to carry out its mission statement "As we grow in Christ's love and Word, we will share Christ's love with the world."

Good Shepherd, Lake Orion – Rev. Eric Tritten and Rev. James Van Dellen

At Good Shepherd, Lake Orion we have been blessed by God to continue to grow in ministry opportunities and service for the sake of the Kingdom. Some of the highlights include:

• We have maintained a ministry presence in Haiti. Having built Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Carrefour Declos, Haiti, we continue to financially support the ministry of that congregation by funding their lay-pastor, supporting a large community garden, assisting their orphans, and helping fill needs during mission trips.

• We brought Reitte Joseph, a young Haitian woman with a bone tumor on her jaw to the US for surgery. Reitte lived with us and participated in our congregation for about a year, and we were blessed through her presence.

• More locally, we have sought to partner with St. Paul, Pontiac by supporting their food bank, providing meals for special events, and providing needed supplies.

• There are also three students from a local mission in Pontiac who are in enrolled in our elementary school, their tuition being covered through donations and mission funding.

• Good Shepherd has committed to partnering with Thrivent Builds with Habitat for Humanity, and helped to build several homes with man-hours. We also financially supported to the level of half a house each of the last three years.

• We also helped to build a new home for the Schrauger Family, a local family that lost two of their sons in a single car accident, while another son was severely wounded in Iraq.

There were a couple significant anniversaries celebrated at Good Shepherd.

• 2008 – Pastor Eric Tritten celebrated his tenth year in the ministry.

• 2009 – Marks the Thirtieth Anniversary of the God Squad Puppet Ministry.

A significant change also took place in the ministry of Good Shepherd as Pastor James Van Dellen announced his plan for retirement. Looking ahead to July, 2010, Pastor Van Dellen will retire near his fortieth anniversary in the ministry. In October 2008, under Pastor Van Dellen's leadership, the Voter's Assembly approved a transition plan appointing Pastor Tritten to serve as the Senior Pastor providing a smooth transition for the congregation into the future.

Holy Cross, Oxford - Rev. Michael P. Schulz

Holy Cross continues to minister to the community through its preschool which began its 44th year under the guidance of its current director, Cynthia Macks. The congregation has also been supportive of the St. Paul, Pontiac mission, helping with its food bank as well as with monetary support. Several of our members have become involved with Thrivent Habitat for Humanity and we will continue to support their work. Our M.O.P.S. ministry continues to prosper and our worship life was greatly enhanced with the purchase of a new Allen organ.

Crown of Life, Rochester Hills - Vacant

During the past three years, Crown of Life was affected by the retirement of its long time beloved pastor, The Rev. Terry Rebert. Emeritus Pastor William Otten conducted worship services and has been instrumental in keeping the church focused on the mission of the church. During the pastoral vacancy Crown of Life continues its service with Motor City Ministries, continuing to serve dinner on Sunday once a month, Thanksgiving with turkey, and Christmas with ham and all the trimmings. In February of 2007, Crown of Life signed a contract with the Michigan District Intentional Interim Program. Rev. Albert I. Prouty began serving, to see the congregation through a period of transition and with God's help began to recover and march ahead. Pastor Prouty in cooperation with The Rev. Galan Walther, Michigan District Congregation Ministry Facilitator, will serve until such a time that the new pastor is on board. Crown of Life has rebounded and is looking ahead to a new and exciting future. The church has many dedicated members who have made a supreme effort to keep their church a viable and thriving congregation. Property manager, Jerry Grimes with the assistance of many willing workers, has improved the appearance of the facilities. Hard work cleared out many trees and brushes to make the church visible. The building was painted and stained so its new appearance is visible once again from the roadside. During the Interim ministry, Rev. Dr. Richard Wolfram conducted a highly successful Consecration Sunday. As a result the annual commitment was increased by some 41 percent. During 2008, Crown of Life was able to commit \$18,000 to the Michigan District Missions effort. The congregation once again has a small but quality choir, with a gifted choir director, two pianists, a guitarist, a flutist, and several young violinists. In February 2009, Rev. Galan Walther conducted a Share life seminar which was attended by a good number of members. A new and concerted effort to rebuild the Sunday School has been very rewarding. In March 2009, Rev. Roosevelt Gray conducted a Friendly Church workshop, followed by a Friendship Sunday. A number of

dedicated people work at the Palace and serve at other events to raise some funds for special projects. Crown of Life has submitted an application for a convertible vicar who hopefully will begin working in June of 2009 and prayerfully be the new pastor of Crown of Life in 2010. To God alone be the glory.

Living Word, Rochester - Rev. John Kassen

Living Word Lutheran Church in Rochester is now 18 years old, having been founded by Pastor John Kassen in 1991. Living Word has developed from a small mission focused Bible study group of 6 families into an established congregation worshiping 350 each weekend with a school enrollment of 190 students and a summer ministry enrollment of 140 students. During 2007, Principal Stacy Hoeft and Music Director Terry Baughman began their ministry at Living Word. Stacy has provided strong leadership to the early childhood center, elementary school, and summer programs, while Terry has been instrumental in developing both traditional and contemporary music ministries which are meeting the spiritual needs of members and visitors alike. The integration and use of projection technologies into the worship and visual arts ministries of the congregation has helped foster vibrant and winsome weekly worship. The congregation has also been blessed by the ministries of Deacon Mark Pretznow and Deacon Steve Smith, each providing the congregation with a variety of unique talents. These individuals, along with the 30 other full and part-time workers at Living word, are "teaching people to know and share God's grace in Jesus Christ" in unique and engaging ways.

St. John, Rochester – Rev. Dr. Karl Galik, Rev. Luke Timm and Rev. Gregory Sawyer

With the mission of "inviting everyone we know to experience the heart of God":

• St. John conducts five weekly worship services ranging from Traditional to Contemporary with attendance of 900-1200 worshipers.

• St. John continues to be a "tithing" congregation supporting our Michigan District, Synod, and mission outreach to "Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8) with our tithe.

• Members have teamed up and traveled to New Orleans the past two summers to assist with Hurricane Katrina clean-up and rebuilding efforts. St. John also "experiences the heart of God" by its involvement with the Family of God Detroit Mission, the Detroit Rescue Mission, Crossroads Pregnancy Center, Christmas Gifts for all God's Children, the Detroit Urban Lutheran School, and other local service organizations. We also support a mission project in Kenya, Africa.

• MEAP scores for St. John School students are consistently above the average of community schools. St. John students participate in the Future City regional and national contests and have been recipients of top awards for the past 15 years. They finished first in the State this year and were invited to Washington, D.C., to compete in the national competition.

• For the past 18 years, St. John has supported a viable Stephen Ministry program that serves our members and the Rochester community. To date, more than 150 members have been trained as Stephen Ministers.

• St. John established a new tradition by hosting a Valentine Concert the past two years featuring all of St. John's music groups plus choirs from Lutheran High School Northwest. Installations:

• The Rev. Dr. Gregory Sawyer was installed as Associate Pastor of Adult Discipleship and Leadership Development in August, 2008.

• Mr. James Marriott was installed as Director of Worship in September, 2007. Retirements: Mr. Thomas Weiss, Principal of our Day School, retired in May, 2007. Anniversaries and Ministry Milestone Celebration(s): The Rev. Dr. Karl Galik, Senior Pastor, celebrated his 25th Anniversary in the Ministry (May, 2008).

Gethsemane, Rochester Hills – Rev. Thomas Fischer Baptized Membership – 197; Communicant Membership – 158; Average Worship Attendance – 89.

Incarnate Word, Rochester Hills – Vacant Incarnate Word became a member congregation of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod on February 17, 2008. They are currently worshipping at Lutheran High School Northwest in Rochester Hills.

St. Stephen, Waterford – Rev. Douglas Stowe Baptized Membership – 915; Communicant Membership – 687; Average Worship Attendance – 334.

Circuit #18 – Birmingham Circuit Pastor Alan Eisinger, Counselor

Circuit 18, the Birmingham Circuit, is primarily located in south Oakland County. The Circuit covers an area bounded on the south by Hazel Park, Troy on the north, Warren on the east, and Bloomfield Hills on the west. In the ten congregations, there are 6,800 baptized souls, 5,300 communicant members, two Christian Day Schools, and six pre-schools.

Word and Sacrament ministry is carried out at Trinity Lutheran Church in Berkley. The congregation is served by the Rev. Dr. David Prout.

Our Shepherd Lutheran Church, Birmingham is the largest congregation in the circuit. It is served by Rev. Carl Gnewuch and Rev. Ray Scherbarth. Congregational member, Steve Woodfin, is participating in the first class of the LCMS Specific Ministry Program. A new narthex has been added that includes a visitor center and coffee bar, a bookstore opened, and small group ministry implemented. OSLC has also seen their Early Childhood Program experience rapid growth with the addition of an infant program.

The Lutheran Church of the Redeemer also serves the Birmingham community. Rev. Randy Schlak and Rev. Cary Richert are the pastors. Redeemer is in the early stages of a multi-million dollar fundraising campaign to enlarge their sanctuary. Cross of Christ Lutheran Church in Bloomfield Hills is served by Rev. Jon Reusch, with the help of Rev. Jim Ackerman, Emeritus. Cross of Christ's Sunday School, titled "Sonlight City" continues to grow in popularity and numbers. The congregation also has sponsored a number of workshops and retreats on contemporary topics.

Hazel Park Lutheran Church in Hazel Park is served by Rev. Cory Fanning.

Rev. Peter Nickel is Pastor of Huntington Woods Lutheran Church in Huntington Woods. As the only church in Huntington Woods, the congregation continues to play a unique role in the city. The congregation operates a large pre-school that serves both congregation and community. An elevator has also been added to make the sanctuary handicapped accessible from the education wing.

Our Savior – Deaf has found a home at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Birmingham. The congregation is served by Rev. Thomas Dunseth. It continues to reach out to the deaf of the tri-county area.

St. Paul, Royal Oak is served by Rev. Jeremy Schultz. Family Life Interns from Concordia University Ann Arbor and Church Family Nights have helped draw people together for learning and service opportunities, as well as a shared meal. Worship has been enhanced with addition of a new Minister of Music, LSB hymnals, and a Grand Piano. Significant improvements have been made to the campus buildings and grounds such as repaving all of their parking lots, updating the school stage, putting in new gym windows, painting the interior and exterior of school, and much more.

St. Augustine Lutheran Church in Troy is served by Rev. Paul Monson. Rev. Monson is a son of the congregation and followed his father as its pastor. Their "Kings Court" children's ministry has tripled in size over the last three years. A projection system has been incorporated into Sunday worship as well as a contemporary format for worship.

Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Warren is served by Rev. Alan Eisinger and is the only congregation in the circuit that is not in Oakland County. Holy Cross continues to operate New Hope Ministries, a food pantry that provides groceries on an emergency basis. New Hope also distributes baskets to those in need at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. Holy Cross also participates in "MCREST", a program whereby congregations shelter the homeless one week out of the year. Every August, the congregation sponsors a "Back to School Blast" in which backpacks are filled with school supplies and distributed to families who need them. Sports physicals and haircuts are also made available. The congregation is looking to celebrate its 50th anniversary in 2010.

Calvary, Lincoln Park - There have been a number of changes at Calvary in 2008. Calvary was blessed by the ministry of Rev. Karl Fuhlbrigge, its Intentional Interim pastor, for the past five years and Rev. Albert Prouty, who has served as Calvary's Visitation Pastor since 2001. Pastor Fuhlbrigge retired in August of 2008. The congregation has moved forward with the installation of a new vicar, Mark Arendell, who arrived with his lovely wife Cherrie, at the beginning of September. Pastor Prouty retired from service at Calvary at the end of September. Vicar Arendell will be eligible for his first call in September, 2009. The congregation is looking forward to calling a full time pastor. Calvary has been blessed with an increase in worship attendance with the new adult members joining the congregation. The church has had an increase in the number of infant baptisms as well. The church's Bible Study attendance has increased. The English as a Second Language program which began in 2006 continues and the Food Bank ministry has been expanded to help people with financial and lodging needs. Calvary's VBS was again up and running in the summer of 2008 and will continue in 2009. Calvary's Childcare Center started a preschool program, and Calvary continues to be blessed with the Detroit Downriver

Christ, River Rouge - A small group of 15 to 20 faithful worship regularly at Christ Lutheran.

Christ The King, Southgate - Christ The King Lutheran Church was challenged by our Lord in 2006 with the blessing of new property of 47 acres with existing buildings, still in the city of Southgate. They renovated a gymnasium/fellowship center and conduct Sunday worship, Bible Class and Sunday school every Sunday at 10:30am. An early childhood center costing a million dollars was completed at this Pennsylvania Campus opening in 2008. Construction of a new sanctuary seating 900-1000 worshippers begins when their present property is sold. Despite the economic downturn, their mission offering continue to be over 180,000 dollars. And weekend, adult Bible studies connected to worship are attended by 350 people. They have also received 900,000 dollars for the new sanctuary fund above tithes and offerings. Our Lord is so powerful and so gracious, "Thanks be to God!"

Community, Flat Rock - Since the last Michigan District convention, CLC, Flat Rock continued its history of growth and community involvement. Early in 2004, the year that it observed its 25th anniversary, Community was recognized by the LCMS as one of Synod's top 30 congregations in confirming adult members. In 2006 CLC was recognized as one of Synod's top five congregations in confirming adults. Over 200 adults joined the church in the past two years necessitating the moving of Sunday worship into the church's Life Center. Community's Helping Hands ministry experienced record demand for individual and family assistance. During this time, its Creative Learning Campus preschool program grew from 25 students to over 50.

Mt. Hope, Allen Park - Over the last three years God has truly blessed us with the resources to obtain our goals as stated in Mount Hope's Mission Statement Revitalize Within-Reach Out. We "revitalized within" by increasing enrollment with our new full-day Preschool Program. In addition, through generous donations of beloved congregation members and their families, we installed state-of-the-art Audio Visual Equipment in our sanctuary and a security system for our building. Also, we enhanced our Praise Worship by adding Youth instrumentalists. In 2008 "we reached out" to our neighbors through an evangelizing tool called "Are You Thirsty?" Another way we are "reaching out" to the downriver community is by becoming a '50/50' partner with the "Fish and Loaves Pantry ministry."

Our Redeemer, Taylor - On January 3, 2009, the Our Redeemer congregation reached a milestone of having served the LORD for 100 years. On January 3, 1909, a group of 25 Slovak immigrants gathered in the Delray neighborhood of Detroit to form a congregation. "First Slavish Evangelical Lutheran Congregation" was incorporated later that month. Over the years the congregations named changed to "First Slovak" (1939) and finally to "Our Redeemer" (1957). The congregation moved from Delray to Taylor in 1966. The parish joined the Missouri Synod in 1912, moved to the Slovak Synod in 1928, and returned to the Missouri Synod in 1966. Pastor Andrew Daniel served as synodical president of the Slovak Synod for 10 years. The congregation hosted a day of commemoration on May 17, 2009. Also during the past triennium, the Rev. Erwin M. Hutter was called and installed as the pastor of Our Redeemer on July 16, 2006.

St. John's, Taylor - The community of Taylor, as part of the Detroit metropolitan area, has been losing jobs and population. 131 year-old St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church struggles amid these trends, yet constantly finds joy in the Lord's work. An important part of this joy is our partnership with our sister Confessional Lutheran Churches, particularly the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, for those who receive the seed of the Word in our ministry often bear fruit in other Christian churches where they find employment and a settled home. A review of members no longer active in the last 4 years revealed that 75 (13% of the congregation) had moved out of the area; this included a large percentage of members received and/or baptized in the previous 5 years, younger families or individuals particularly dependent upon the job market. An important ministry continues to be our K-8 school. For the last three years it has had 30 pupils in three rooms, regarded as undesirable by some, but ideal for individual attention, knowing students' needs well and interacting with families. Since the school has become smaller, it has proven more fruitful in yielding adult baptisms and confirmations than in many years when it was larger. Emphasis on stewardship, with intentional pledging of time talent and treasure (presented as our tribute on Christ the King Sunday) has been pursued with the emphasis on training all members to give intentionally to the Lord. Emphasis on outreach has also been implemented through an Evangelism committee of six who visit visitors, elder visits, and a deacon-in-training. A telephone survey of Taylor was performed in the Fall suggesting that 40% of respondents recognized the church and how to find it, 32% had some idea as to what ministries/activities were offered, and 20% were open to learning more about the church. This suggests that while St. John's enjoys high visibility compared to most churches, there is still ample opportunity among the 60% who do not know of the church's existence. 8,000 postcards inviting new-moves to Christmas, and then to Easter have been mailed in recent years, and about 6,000 door to door fliers continue to be delivered in various neighborhoods by Pastor and church members. The Evangelism committee also sees that greeters distribute church information at community events hosted at St. John's including flea markets, dinners, and the Family Fun Fair held in May. Worship life at St. John's conforms to the Lutheran Service Book which was adopted 3 years ago (painlessly, to the surprise of some). For 2009, the pastor is currently preaching on the 38 saints' days traditionally observed by Lutherans found in LSB. Dr. Richard Zeile, Senior Pastor/Headmaster

St. Paul, Trenton - In June of 2007, Nick Koschmann was installed as Associate Pastor of Youth & Young Adults. He has added numerous programs for our middle and high school students. We commissioned short- term missionary teams in 2007 and 2008 that went to Anapra, Mexico, and Navsi, Czech Republic, where they taught Vacation Bible School and ESL. Our Christian Preschool continues to offer an excellent education to children ages three and four to prepare them for Kindergarten. A Young Fives program is also offered. In September of 2008, additional classes were added to meet the request of the community; this brings our current enrollment to 187 with twelve Preschool staff. The St. Paul Concert Series offers many forms of worship through music; one of which is the Palm Sunday drama which transforms the sanctuary into a marketplace in Jerusalem where the people welcome Jesus with their songs and praises of Hosanna. The drama is comprised of 85 people-members of the Concert Choir, children's choir and volunteer actors. A Seder Meal was held to acquaint us with the Jewish Passover customs. Adult Bible Fellowship groups are meeting and plans for additional groups are in process. Vacation Bible School welcomed 450 children to our campus where 100 volunteers shared the Word of God through Bible stories, music, crafts and recreation. For the past three years St. Paul family and friends have donated hundreds of bags of groceries as part of our Thanksgiving Eve worship experience. In 2008 the bags were divided between the Spirit of Hope and the Helping Hands Community Pantry housed at Community Lutheran Church in Flat Rock. St. Paul of Trenton is humbled as we reflect on what God has accomplished through us; we know He has more plans for this congregation and we pray we will remain faithful in our service to Him and to His people.

Trinity, Wyandotte - Over the last three years since the last Michigan District Convention we have: Worked with Rev. Galan Walther and Natural Church Development (Phase 1) to: Write and implement a Three Year Plan, Write revised Call and Job Descriptions for Staff, Write revised Board Chair functional expectations, Write revised board descriptions, Write a job description for every task in the church. We have submitted questionnaires for processing to begin phase 2. We are in the process of revising our Three Year Plan. Air conditioning in both the Church Sanctuary and Community Building Fellowship Hall was installed. We also installed a Phone Tree for instant congregational information and a digital sound system in the sanctuary. The Lutheran Service Books were purchased to replace The Lutheran Hymnals. A Food Pantry was created and operated with a Voucher System for both member and non-member referrals. Also, a Clothing Bank for children ages 12 and down for both member and non-member referrals is operational. An Equipment Bank for an older population in need of special devices was also created and now operating.

As a result of this process, we have developed and are implementing the first stages of a five-year strategic plan that will, by God's grace, result in increasing our community presence and member invigoration. We remain committed to our mission of bringing our neighbors into Christ's chosen family. In addition, we also maintain strong and active ties with the local Hudson Ministerial Association, and through that help provide emergency financial assistance as well as a muchneeded food pantry for those in our community that have been hit hard by the failing economy.

Redeemer, Jackson has experienced some significant changes in the past few years, including the recent efforts to restructure its policy-based governance to include a Leadership Board and beginning the call process to fill the pastoral role with the approaching retirement of its present pastor in 2010. New ministry teams have been formed to effectively support the Leadership Board in communication, worship planning, and worship area planning for the future. With this focus, the church website is in the process of being restructured as well. Redeemer's ministry focus is based on Christian Education and Prayer. Its outreach focus supports the surrounding community, and in this time of economic challenges, partners with the Backpack food program through the Public School System and Together, We Can Make A Difference House in Jackson. These mission fields allow congregational members to reach out to the community and experience the joy of mission work first hand. By so doing, Redeemer hopes to have a more significant impact in the Jackson area and more fully practice its new mission statement of Loving People to Christ. In October of 2007, Don Ritter was ordained and installed at St. Matthew, Mancelona upon completion of his colloquy requirements. In January of 2009, Rev. Chad Hoover was installed as Pastor of St. Paul, Kalkaska, following the retirement of Rev. Ted Turanski at the end of June 2008.

Circuit #32 – Traverse City Circuit Rev. Larry Matro, Counselor

The Traverse City Circuit stretches across some of the most beautiful scenery in all of Michigan, if not even the USA and the world! The eight congregations that make up Circuit # 32 are located in Antrim, Benzie, Grand Traverse and Leelanau counties. The beauty of the area is in stark contrast to the spiritual health of the region as 50-70% of the population remains un-churched! But, it is the privilege of the eight congregations of Circuit # 32 to reach out with the beautiful message of God's grace and forgiveness and salvation in Jesus Christ!

Here is a brief summary of what is going on in each of the congregations in the Circuit:

Bethlehem, Glen Arbor – Pastor Dan Krause has served as Bethlehem's pastor since November 2006. Of his ministry here he writes, "The Word has been proclaimed and the Sacraments administered according to Christ's institution. We continue to see the work of the Spirit as we celebrate an Adult Baptism and two Confirmations this year. We have added a monthly fellowship event and continue our weekly Bible Study on Wednesday mornings."

Grace, Elk Rapids – Rev. Walt Teske came out of retirement and is serving as the Interim Pastor at Grace. The congregation has been blessed by Pastor Teske's faithfulness and pastoral presence. Circuit # 32 is also blessed by his zeal, experience and pastoral heart!

Immanuel, Leland – Pastor Larry Matro has served at Immanuel since leaving the mission field (Papua New Guinea) in 1993. In the past few years the congregation has gone through a number of building programs to bring the building up to "code" and for necessary and cost-cutting renovations. A recent challenge it faces is not having a full-time organist. Its strengths are a youth program that reaches many of the local youth (many who are un-churched), a number of Bible studies (including a growing men's study) and traditional worship that includes plenty of singing. In addition, Immanuel has been blessed with both the resources and the desire to be financially generous towards missions. We plan on adding a "mission trip" to our mission efforts in 2009.

In June of 2007, the congregation Shepherd in the Pines

Our Savior, Benzonia – Rev. Robert Bennett faithfully served - District Reports Page 26 - here until taking a Call to Trinity, Reese, MI in 2009. Soon after his leaving the congregation made steps to apply for a Seminary graduate for their next pastor. During the interim, Rev. C. Jay Koehler is serving as their Vacancy Pastor.

Redeemer, Interlochen – Redeemer was deeply saddened when their pastor, Tim Mowry, died unexpectedly while on vacation in 2008. Pastor Tim Brand was asked by Redeemer to serve them while they recovered from the loss and prepared to call and receive a new pastor. The Call process began in early 2009. In addition to what Pastor Brand is doing, the congregation is served by their DCE and SMP Candidate Jason Bauer.

St. Michael's and All Angels, Traverse City – Pastor Jim Nihiser was installed at St. Michael's in July of 2008. As he summarized what is happening there he mentioned the "1st Annual Men's and Women's Retreat" held on-site with 42 in attendance studying the topic "Faith Under Fire." He also mentioned that a weekly Food Pantry serves 40+ individuals or families. Events in the "planning stages" include an evening Christian Coffee House, a visit from David Paul Britton in June 2009 and a trip to the Creation Museum in Cincinnati, OH.

St. Paul's, Good Harbor (Cedar) – Pastor Robert Wurst, Jr. has been serving at St. Paul's since 2002. About the ministry there he reports, "St. Paul's, Good Harbor, has received the dew of God's grace for 132 years. We pray that the Lord Jesus Christ continue to bless His little rural parish with His Word and Spirit."

Trinity, Traverse City - Pastor Robert Zagore has served Trinity since 2001. He is assisted by Medical Missionary Rev. Dr. Charles Webb, M.D. Pastor Chad Hoover was also an Assistant Pastor there until he accepted the Call to St. Paul, Kalkaska early in 2009. Pastor Zagore writes, "Trinity continues her mission of reaching up to the Lord who first reached to us with salvation and using this as our motivation to reach out in love to our fellow Christians and our neighbors. Trinity has added a Monday Night Service this year and it has been a big success. In addition, the members of our congregation were nationally recognized by "Service Nation" for a project of helping our neighbors with housing needs. The congregation continues reaching out locally, nationally and internationally with mission projects. Our school continues to show an increase in the number of students and is studying adding grades."

In addition to the men listed above, we are privileged to have the pastoral assistance and counsel of three retirees in our circuit. They are Pastor Charles Pool and Pastor Ted Staudacher, members of St. Paul, Good Harbor and Pastor Bernie Filbert, member of St. Michael's, Traverse City.

Circuit #34 – Big Rapids Circuit Rev. Robert Baerwolf, Counselor

Our Circuit consists of six congregations. They are: Grace, Baldwin (Rev. Stephen King); St. Peter's, Big Rapids (Rev. John Bookshaw and Rev. Daniel Lochner); Redeemer, Fremont (Rev. James Schouweiler); Chapel of the Lakes, Mecosta (Rev. Paul Schneider); Trinity, Reed City (Rev. Dean Davenport); Christ, White Cloud (Rev. Richard Hoogerhyde).

Grace, Baldwin – The year 2008 was one of transition and downsizing. Pastor King is now our half-time pastor and, in addition, is working outside the congregation in two different teaching positions. The hard work of our new stewardship committee has brought a measure of financial stability to our congregation. The two- fold mission of Grace Lutheran Church is 1) to provide the community members of Baldwin with traditional Lutheran worship and congregational opportunities, and 2) to offer a traditional Lutheran worship haven for vacationers and tourists as they spend time in the area. Our new evangelism focus, which calls upon the efforts of all of our congregation members, has moved in the direction of the second part of our mission. As people have retired and relocated to Baldwin, our congregation's evangelism efforts while they were visitors has borne fruit. Eight out of twelve of our planning council members were brought into membership under these circumstances, resulting in a "renewal of our roles."

St. Peter's, Big Rapids - St. Peter's, Big Rapids has developed and implemented some exciting new ministries in the last three years. In September 2007, we began to offer a new worship service called Video Café. This service runs at the same time as our 11:00 a.m. sanctuary service. The sermon is televised live on a big screen to Video Café from the sanctuary. This service was designed to offer a new worship experience for the students at Ferris State University. Many of the younger members of St. Peter's have also grown an adult Bible study ministry. Currently, there are over two hundred members in one of the weekly Bible studies. These studies are having a powerful impact on the ministry of St. Peter's. St. Peter's rejoices in celebrating its history. In September 2006, the congregation began hosting Germanfest. It is the celebration of the German heritage of the congregation. The night is filled with German food, German music and a fun night for all. The community is encouraged to come and last September, over 600 attended. Many in the community look forward to Germanfest. In the past three years, Two full-time staff positions, an Associate Pastor of Family Life, Youth and Chaplain at Ferris State University along with the Director of Worship and Technology, were added to the staff. The preschool and elementary school are doing extremely well. The teaching staff is excellent and they provide all students with a great education and a powerful witness of Jesus Christ in the classrooms. The school and its ministry are very strong. The school adds a tremendous amount to the ministry of the congregation. The congregation, the leadership and the staff look forward to many exciting years of ministry.

Redeemer, Fremont – In the last three years, God has performed wonders in our congregation. By His grace, we have completed construction on our church which expanded the Narthex, added classrooms, created an elevator which runs from basement to the sanctuary level, and created a great deal of storage. Although this was an expensive project, God has provided the money to accomplish this task and by His blessing, we have come close to paying it all off! Since that project, we have taken on the task of creating walking trails and gardens in the tract of land behind our church building. Our hope is to retain the ownership of this land while connecting it to the city park system. In this way, we can provide a spiritual influence for those who enjoy walking the nature trails around our small lake. To God be the Glory for these great blessings.

Chapel of the Lakes, Mecosta – As God continues to grow the congregation at Chapel of the Lakes, members have sought to keep pace with the growth by taking the following steps: the addition of a third weekend service (one on Saturday

evening and two on Sunday morning), the addition of two more children's Sunday School classes, and the addition of two more home Bible Study groups. Participation in the Ablaze! Program and the designation of Thursday night as a weekly Bible Study evening at church along with various Bible Studies in six-week sessions throughout the year have begun. The congregation also purchased a 26-passenger bus for transporting children to Sunday School/VBS and for youth activities. Several maintenance items have taken place including landscaping the grounds, expansion of the parking lot and playground and upgrading equipment. Updating of technology in the sanctuary, fellowship hall and classrooms along with the installation of automated calling program for contacting members has also been a blessing.

Trinity, Reed City – Much has gone on in Reed City in three short years! Under God's leading and direction, our congregation underwent the relocation of our sanctuary to a new site located on US 10, just east of Reed City. We have been worshipping in our new facility since June 11, 2006. It is our prayer that in the not too distant future, we will be able to unite the ministries of our church and school together on our new site. Until then, our school continues to operate, by God's grace, at our current facility in town. We continue to grow in our faith through relevant worship opportunities, Bible studies and by meeting God's people wherever they are. We continue to be a friendly and loving congregation – serving others with the love of Christ! To God alone be the glory!

Christ, White Cloud - The past few years here at Christ Lutheran have been one of blessing after blessing. Our congregation continues to grow in Christ and His mission. A few of the highlights would include our 75th Anniversary as a congregation in 2006, the purchase and installation of a new organ in 2006, the resurfacing of our parking lot in 2006, and the purchase and implementation of the Lutheran Service Book in 2007. In 2008, a new roof was installed on the sanctuary, three new Bible Studies began in 2008 and our Ladies Fellowship refurbished our parish hall kitchen in 2008-2009 (new flooring, gas range, and serving window closure). Our congregation at this time is also debt-free. Our good and gracious God continues to bless this congregation with members who are dedicated to His mission here and beyond. Our preschool continues to operate and our giving to the Circuit Mission Council and Michigan District are very important to us. This year, we added a new mission work - we are sponsoring a monthly food bank through West Michigan Gleaners. On the 1st Friday of each month, our congregation supplies money, leadership and other volunteer help to provide 150 people with 50 pounds of produce. Other churches in White Cloud are asked to supply volunteers to help with the distribution of the food. But the most wonderful of all the blessings we receive and pass on is that of Word and Ministry - proclaiming Christ and His Gospel. Daily, we thank and praise God in Christ for our opportunity to be in service to Him. We also thank and praise God for our Circuit, District and Synod organizations and the ministry they provide.

Circuit #35 – Capitol Circuit Rev. Richard P. Laeder, Counselor

Circuit 35 - Capitol Circuit is blessed with the following congregations and pastors: St. Luke, Haslett - Rev. David Davis; Ascension, East Lansing - Rev. David Winningham; Our Savior, Lansing - Rev. David Maier and Rev. Roy Olsen; First, Charlotte - Rev. Timothy Olson; St. Matthew, Holt -Rev. Dean Poellet; Messiah, Holt - Rev. Stephen Grafe; Rev. Galen Grulke - Heart of the Shepherd, Howell; Living Word, Lansing; Trinity, Lansing; and Grace, Leslie.

Two circuit pastors have recently entered emeritus status: Rev. James Keat, Grace, Leslie; and Rev. Richard Laeder, Trinity, Lansing. These two pastors have joined four other emeriti included in Circuit 35: Rev. Eldor Bickel; Rev. William Hill; Rev. Dr. Roy Schroeder; and Rev. David Voorhees.

In the triennium since 2006, Circuit 35 has undergone several changes of ministry:

Ascension, East Lansing called Rev. David Winningham as their pastor.

Messiah, Holt called Rev. Stephen Grafe as their pastor. St Luke, Haslett dedicated a new worship center on their property.

Our Savior, Lansing relocated to a new campus.

First, Charlotte completed a major fund drive and have expanded their facilities and ministry to include preschool and a new mission start in Eaton Rapids.

Trinity, Lansing, hosted three new mission starts at their downtown facilities - Living Word Lutheran Church, Trinity Sudanese Lutheran Ministry, and Rehoboth Evangelical Lutheran

Rev. Travis Downs serves in the position of Outreach Director for Trinity, Lansing

Rev. Martin Schroeder is serving as Vacancy Pastor for Grace, Leslie on a part-time basis

The next triennium is expected to bring more opportunities to serve as God's people faithfully gather around Word and Sacrament in our churches. They will continue to devote their energy, resources, and time to keep Circuit 35 focused toward the cross of Christ and His never-failing love and support for all people.

God has been very gracious with us. Though difficulties arise, God is good and the message of the cross of Jesus Christ in Word and Sacrament ministry has been upheld faithfully. God be praised!

Circuit #36 – St. Johns Circuit Rev. Jeffrey Heimsoth, Counselor

The congregations of the St. Johns Circuit give thanks to God for his many blessings.

Calvary, Carson City – Pastor Kenneth Williamson Calvary continues to develop its sense of identity in the community and have used their fairly new facilities to become more accessible to the community. God is blessing those efforts.

Good Shepherd, Lansing – Pastor Roger Straub As Good Shepherd continues to minister to the northwestern edge of Lansing they have recently completed a building project which improved their narthex and office area.

Hope, DeWitt - Pastor E. Anthony Sikora

The members of Hope have welcomed Pastor Sikora as pastor and have been blessed by God in strengthening Word and Sacrament ministry. God has blessed them with a strong music ministry and with the opportunity to plan for future building expansion.

St. Paul, Fowler – Pastor Paul Clark

The past years have seen more emphasis and much blessing thru involvement in Right to Life issues. God has blessed the congregation with several new families and growth in the Sunday School.

St. Andrew, Portland – Pastor Edward Filter St. Andrew celebrated its 25th anniversary of ministry giving thanks for the blessings God has provided. The preschool ministry continues to flourish. The congregation has prepared for providing ministry working together with families.

St. Peter, St. Johns (Riley Township) – Pastor Jeffrey Heimsoth The past triennium has seen a re-focusing on ministering to families at St. Peter. The Christian Day School enjoys its largest enrollment ever with the addition of a fourth teacher. Current efforts are now to clearly define ministry goals to make the best use of resources to attain them.

St. Johns, St. Johns – Pastor George Brinley God has blessed St. Johns in the addition of a staff person to oversee the Sunday School/education ministry. They have also established an endowment fund with the designed purpose of helping to fund new ministries.

Circuit #37 – Tri River Circuit Rev. Fred C. Krause, Counselor

The Tri River Circuit meets together on the second Tuesday of each month beginning with September and ending with June, except during the months of October and February because of the larger pastoral conferences. Our monthly routine includes a worship service in which the Lord's Supper is shared, an hour for bible study, lunch and then time for sharing, questions, etc. We meet at a different congregation each month; the host pastor conducts the service, and the previous month's pastor leads the bible study. One of our regulars is the English District pastor from Holy Trinity in Lakeview. He is also the pastor of Hope of Stanton, one of our Michigan District congregations. Our December meeting is always held at Mt. Calvary of Greenville with lunch at a local restaurant hosted by the District CEF representative. For our bible study material we have recently begun use of the Synod material.

Bethel, Howard City is served by Pastor Alsen Wenzel. These last three years have been an up and down time for $P_{2\alpha\rho}$.

Bethel Lutheran Church, as have all the churches faced in this troubling economy. Our Precious Gifts Childcare Center continues to be a blessing for Bethel's ministry to the community. We continue to have our laid-back contemporary Saturday evening service and our Sunday morning worship with a variety of worship styles being used. We have a Visioning Committee that has been working hard in setting various goals for the congregation. Bethel has also become a part of the "Family Friendly Partners Network." Our network is made up of six or seven churches in which we are changing the way we are doing and looking at ministry as well as strengthening families. As a part of the network, we participated in a survey conducted by "Family Life" in which the results were quite startling for us. In the months and years to come, we pray to use the information gathered to become a light for Jesus Christ in our community.

Good Shepherd, Lowell is served by Pastor Joe Fremer, who recently marked the 25th anniversary of his ordination in 2007. During the last triennium, net growth has been small, but significant, with nine infant baptisms and three adult baptisms. Good Shepherd has adopted Lutheran Service Book and brands itself as offering "traditional, authentic Lutheran worship and teaching." Since 2008, they have been assisted by licensed Deacon Ed Van Cott, who helps with catechesis, worship and preaching.

Holy Cross, Belding - After serving Holy Cross for over four years, Pastor Jacobson moved out of the area and Pastor Joe Fremer became the vacancy pastor. Pastor Mark Jurgensen was installed as the new pastor in March, 2007. After Pastor Jurgensen resigned from Holy Cross, Pastor Timothy Loewe served as vacancy pastor until October 2008. Currently, Pastor Dean Mues is serving as their vacancy pastor.

Hope, Stanton is being served by Pastor Steven Voelker, English District pastor of Holy Trinity, Lakeview. Both congregations share a dual-parish arrangement. According to Pastor Voelker, Hope runs a food pantry at the worship site. During 2008, they served 243 families from the area. Usage doubled from 2007. As the needs keep increasing, Hope will depend greatly on organizations from the area and various individuals to help support the pantry.

Mt. Calvary, Greenville is served by Pastor Jeff Wilhelm who is also a Lt. Colonel in the Air Force which takes him away from the congregation periodically. After 25 years of service to the community, he reports that the preschool has expanded its service to the community through a year-round Christian Childcare ministry. The congregation is also reaching out to the community through its relatively new Fellowship Hall. Many congregational and community events are being held at Mt. Calvary, including a "Trunk or Treat," winter clothing giveaway, Youth and Family nights, Lions Club dinner meetings, Girl Scouts, Habitat for Humanity/Thrivent outreach, Walk For Warmth, and a number of concerts, including the West Michigan Lutheran Chorale. He indicates that most importantly, Sunday School, Bible Study and Small Group involvement reflects a growing commitment to study God's Word together.

Resurrection, Sand Lake is a very small refocusing congregation served by Pastor Fred Krause. They have consistently conducted a successful Preschool and summer Vacation Bible School. Recently, they began to conduct a Tuesday morning Bible Class. Sunday morning worship is at 10:00 a.m. during the fall, winter and spring. During the summer, the time is changed to begin at 9:15 a.m. Attendance has consistently been around 25 people each Sunday.

St. John, Ionia is currently being served by Pastor David Bogda. The congregation is still experiencing new life and hope in mission and ministry. Worship is traditional. Besides the Sunday service, they conduct a Wednesday evening service. Pastor Bogda reports that since the last convention, they have started a Preschool. It began in 2008 with nine children (4 three-year olds and 5 four-year olds). The year, there are 5 three-year olds and 10 four-year olds. The congregation is beginning to think about starting a Kindergarten.

Circuit # 38 – Muskegon Circuit Rev. Dennis Lassanske, Counselor

The 38th circuit is made up of the congregations on the western side of the state near the shores of Lake Michigan from Conklin, Nunica and Muskegon north to Whitehall, Montague and Shelby. We have been blessed with faithful pastors and congregational leaders during the past triennium. The following is a summary of God's work among His people in our area.

Faith Lutheran - Whitehall - The Lord has truly blessed us over the past triennium. He has enabled us to work together to reach into the community with His message of saving love. In the last year, we have started an annual car rally/pig roast for the community, coupled with our already established "Steak and Blues Night." These events continue to bring in members of the community who wouldn't normally think of attending here. Our Youth and Family Life ministry received a substantial boost with the calling of a Lay Minister for this ministry from Mequon. He has now also entered the S.M.P. program. We have also started a Wednesday Night fellowship/education time followed by a Wednesday night worship service.

Our Redeemer - Muskegon - Our Redeemer licensed Deacon Alexander J. Koppel to work in the areas of Worship, Visitation and Evangelism. Redeemer completed a new kitchen and fellowship room and Sunday school-Bible class addition. They continue to reach out with the Gospel through evening VBS and adult ministries. They have been active in community projects including "monthly food ingathering" for food pantries; LFL "Diaper Shower"; "Christmas Angel Tree" supplying gifts for Rescue Mission; "Mitten Tree" collection for those in need; and well as "Food and Folly" fellowship events for the membership and a traditional Passover Seder meal and hosting various dinners. The congregation successfully participated in the "Unity – A Ministry of Meditation". The church has added a web site and formed a task force to set long term goals for the congregation.

St. James - Montague - The people of God at St. James Lutheran Church, Montague, have undergone some growth transitions during these last three years. Our Director of Christian Education accepted a call leaving us with a ministry staff position to fill. After much prayerful research and consideration, we have decided to pursue a Deaconess Intern from Concordia Seminary, Fort Wayne in the near future. We are excited about the ministry potential a Deaconess can fulfill. We have sent a mission team to Guatemala, began using the new Lutheran Service Book hymnal, and have had continued growth in our Men's Outdoor Ministry with annual Men's Generational Canoe Trips to the wilderness of the Boundary Waters of Minnesota. We have also continued to refine and improve our media ministry within worship and to highlight other church activities and ministries. We are thankful that God continues to bless us as we serve Him and His people in the White Lake area.

St. Luke – Nunica - St. Luke congregation has ministered to this community and surrounding area for 107 years. Located in a small community with members in seven different school districts has presented many challenges to the ministry. A plan of action has been established with focuses on the theme, "Guided by God, Hand in Hand, We Can" to help redirect us in keeping our focus on Christ. Under this plan, St. Luke is undergoing a major refurbishing and additional building project during these difficult times of recession. For 107 years we have been trusting in God to guide us into the work that He will have us to do and we will continue into the future to bring glory to His name.

St. Mark - Muskegon - St. Mark has continued to experience the blessings of God in its programs and ministries over the past triennium. The congregation has been blessed with a full staff of dedicated and committed servants that use their many skills and talents. The Stephen Ministry program gives added spiritual and emotional support to members and friends of the congregation. The newly renovated office space, library and lounge, as well as newly renovated Activity Center and newly constructed Fellowship Hall provides much needed space for effective outreach ministries, congregational events and variety of ways to reach into the community. Spiritual growth opportunities through Bible study and children midweek program WOW (Witness on Wednesday) continues to flourish. The congregation continues to be blessed with numerical growth and has finished the budget year with a surplus. They look forward to God's continual blessing, protection and guidance as He has in the past.

St. Stephens – Shelby - St Stephens continue to serve faithfully to the Shelby area. They completed in 2008 an intentional ministry site analysis under the leadership Rev. Robert Bearwolf. This process provided stability, insight and guidance for their ministry development following the loss of a full time pastor. The Intentional Ministry program also helped to clarify the goals and objects of the congregation ministry. Under an agreement with Faith, Whitehall, they continue to be served and their programs are supported through SMP Vicar Blaine Jorg under the supervision of Rev. Michael Kroll. St. Stephens congregation continues to serve depending of the Lord's guidance as they continue to witness to their community.

Trinity - Conklin - Missions, Christian education, and families have been important areas of focus for Trinity, Conklin, over the past three years. In addition to our regular mission offerings to District and Synod, each year we establish a special mission project for the year. The most recent of those have been Family of Christ Lutheran Church, Alpine Township; Bethania Kids in India; and the International Lutheran Church in Grand Rapids. Our Youth Group also was involved in outreach and took a mission trip to the Rosebud Indian Reservation in South Dakota. Christian education has always been a vital part of Trinity's ministry and this year we celebrated the 140th anniversary of our Day School, which now offers a strong academic and spiritual education beginning with preschool and going through fifth grade. We have also begun sponsorship of a MOPS (Mothers of Preschoolers) group which meets once a month in our facilities. Family ministry remains a key aspect of Trinity and we were part of the District's initial "Family Friendly Partners Network," in an attempt to continue to develop more and better ways to reach our families with the saving Gospel message and help families to be teachers of the faith in their homes.

Trinity - Muskegon - Trinity continues to prioritize our ministry around our five core values: Worship, Discipleship, Fellowship, Outreach and Service. Our ministry over the past triennium continues to partner with West Shore Lutheran School and have coordinated our programs with an emphasis on the "Family Friendly Partners Network". The position of Youth and Family Life has been expanded with addition of an Associate Pastor. The congregation has expanded styles of worship on Sunday morning to include both liturgical and blended worship and an alternate worship beginning on Monday evenings in the summer. Bible Study on Sunday morning and small groups during the week continue to a source of spiritual growth. Various fellowship leagues and congregational gatherings provide great opportunities for fellowship and outreach. The re-start of the Stephen ministry program has added an excellent caring program to our ministry. Hands On Mission Teams have served in Guatemala and Biloxi, MS transforming individual members and our congregation into a mission minded congregation that is focused on outreach and service. Many have been blessed through service at the MAP Supper House and involvement with many community projects of God's love in action. The congregation looks forward to God's continual blessing and guidance as they activate the next five year plan "Lift Our Vision".

Circuit #39 - Holland Circuit Rev. John Westra, Counselor

As Paul writes to the Thessalonians: "We always thank God for all of you, mentioning you in our prayers. We continually remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Thessalonians 1:2-3. The work of the District is truly a blessing to many and we of the 39th Circuit from Holland north along the coast to Ferrysburg, are blessed to be a part of it. Paul is right when he says work by faith, labor in love, enduring through hope, for our Lord Jesus has blessed us these last three years.

For Christ Our Savior (under the leadership of Pastor John Schleicher) on the north side of Holland, they continue to minister using Matthew 11:28 as their purpose statement -"Sharing the love of Christ in word and deed with open arms for all people." They have experienced a growth in adult Christian Education attendance, more volunteer groups serving in the worship arts, Care Closet outreach, mission awareness and F.A.C.E. to face with Christ program. (F.A.C.E. is an acronym for "Faith and Celebration Expressions.")

Grace, Coopersville (with Pastor Joel Hoyer leading) continues to grow as it is maturing as an independent congregation. They were blessed with a D.C.E. intern, Mr. Andy Audette, from Concordia - St. Paul, MN. He has helped them grow in their youth ministry both Junior and Senior, developed a small group Bible Study on the Grand Valley State University campus, along with a midweek program for K through 5 called "Grace Camp." Grace is responding to the growing "evangelistic atheism" by providing classes for its members using the Focus on the Family's "Truth Project" materials. They want to prepare their members to be better disciples of our Lord Jesus and to be able to give answers "as to the reason for the hope that they have ..."

Lakeshore Fellowship, Ferrysburg experienced its first vacancy in the pastoral office as its founding pastor, Rev. Glenn Shelton, took a call to California after 19 years of ministry. They are now served by Pastor Mark Pflug, an Intentional Interim Pastor who is helping them to work through the transition as they prepare to call a new Pastor. They have been very busy these last three years, reaching out beyond their walls in many mission projects from student ministry in the local schools to foreign orphans in Honduras, and continuing to make mission trips to serve people in need wherever the Lord leads. Not only have they gone beyond their walls but also rebuilding and expanding their walls, they have added a new Worship Center and improved facilities. To help them to be more efficient in their administration, they have adopted a policy based governance polity which increases their effectiveness in serving new opportunities for mission.

St. John, Grand Haven (with Pastor Dieter Haupt as Senior Pastor) experienced a transition when Associate Pastor, Rev. Phillip Baerwolf, accepted a call to Dundee, IL in December 2006. A call was sent to the Seminary for a candidate and the Rev. Philip DeVries was ordained and installed at St. John on July 8, 2007. St. John continues to forge ahead in its mission to see its children's, children's, children in eternity together with them through its family-friendly ministry. With the help of Rev. Galan Walther and Professor Ben Freudenburg as a part of the District Pilot Project, they are fulfilling the directive of Martin Luther who said "As the head of the family should teach it (Christian doctrine) in a simple way to his household." Also, they continue to promote and encourage mission outreach with special speakers and trips, and growing in their giving to be a tithing congregation to District and Synod. This has been a fifteen-year goal now finally accomplished. The challenge they are facing for the future is a declining enrollment in their day school.

St. Matthew, Spring Lake (under the leadership of its new Pastor since summer of 2006, Pastor Michael Goers) has moved ahead in its mission of sharing their blessing in Christ's love by serving others, bringing glory to God. They have established a relationship with a congregation in Novokuznetsk, Siberia providing support as needed. Their preschool, St. Matthew Footsteps has grown to 90 children. Now the challenge is to involve the many non-member families in St. Matthew's ministry. The congregation is growing and now looks to add future staff in the area of music.

The members of United, West Olive, in the area south of Grand Haven and north of Holland, continue to receive pastoral services from many retired pastors. The congregation has become very self-sufficient in supplying its care for members and continuing to reach to its neighbors. They continue to celebrate their mission to "Bring, Develop and Share" increasing their attendance, improving their facility and praying for a Pastor someday when the Lord blesses.

Finishing the congregations in the Holland Circuit, we come to Zion, Holland which continues to be the place "Where God Meets You." Being guided by Pastor Westra, it continues to challenge each member to grow in discipleship and to reach to their neighbors as God leads. The members continue to be very generous in supporting many missions locally, domestically and throughout the world. Mr. Joseph Byrd, Director of Celebration Ministries continues to share an exciting, historically Lutheran and truly uplifting worship experience which has attracted many from the community to seek his skill and expertise. Zion, as it looks to the future, is extending a call to the Seminary for an Associate Pastor to focus on Youth and Education Ministry to help it grow in family life and discipleship.

The congregations of the 39^{th} Circuit continue to work by faith, labor in love, and endure in the ministry of our Lord with the hope He provides. I pray His continued blessings on each of you as you continue to do the same.

All Nations, served by Rev. Afzal Masih, is an ethic mission serving the Middle Eastern community in the Grand Rapids area. This mission is currently located at Redeemer, Grand Rapids as they seek to reach out to the various Middle Eastern ethnic communities of Grand Rapids through English classes and other means.

Currently, in Grand Rapids North Circuit, there are two Lutheran elementary schools. One is operated jointly by Immanuel and St. James Lutheran Churches and is currently housed solely at St. James. The other is operated independently by Our Savior Lutheran Church. The same congregations are also part of the West Michigan Lutheran High School Association. Preschools are operated at Immanuel, Messiah, Our Savior, St. James, St. Matthew, and St. Peter congregations. A number of parishes without Lutheran Day Schools offer weekday religious instruction. Several of the congregations of the circuit are getting involved with the development and work of the Koina Center whose purpose is to assist all the preschools and schools in working together jointly on outreach, spiritual growth, funding, and much more.

The circuit rejoiced with Mr. Barry Blomquist, principal of Our Savior Lutheran School as he was named "Principal of the Year" in the state of Michigan.

The circuit was saddened at the passing of a dear sister, Mrs. Lou Garchow, wife of the late Rev. Alvin Garchow. She was a great blessing to her home congregation of Messiah, Grand Rapids, the circuit, LWML, and other mission work. We rejoice that the Lord blessed us with her and that our gracious Lord has called Lou to her eternal rest this past year.

The pastors of the circuit meet regularly with the Grand Rapids South Circuit for worship and study. This joint meeting and joint leadership of Rev. Tom Meyer, Circuit Counselor of the Grand Rapids South Circuit, is a great blessing to the Grand Rapids North Circuit as we walk together in the mission and ministry of our congregations. During this past triennium, we have jointly studied Walther's Law and Gospel, and have just begun a study of Walther's Church and Ministry. Zion Lutheran Church, Marshall – Rev. Their average worship attendance between their two Sunday morning services remains healthy with about 240 while at the same time they are addressing some concerns about diminishing attendance in Sunday School. While the congregation dates back to 1848, their website is state of the art, complete with sermon podcasts.

St. Paul Lutheran Church, Battle Creek – Rev. Gary Siefert, pastor

St. Paul recently completed construction of a small but much needed addition to their building that includes an elevator and additional restrooms on the same floor as the sanctuary. They are benefiting from their new found mission to internationals, including ESL and Bible classes, as well as regular international worship service, thanks to their POBLO missionary, Vincent Iqbal. Vincent has recently completed his academic requirements and colloquy such that he will be on the LC-MS pastoral roster as soon as he receives a call from the congregation.

St. Mark Lutheran Church, Battle Creek – Rev. Carl Schneider, senior pastor

Located in suburban west side of Battle Creek, remains one of the most visionary churches in our Circuit. About a year ago Rev. Rob Nelson took a call to St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Walled Lake. Their pre-school/day care, "Our World for Children," continues a vital ministry to unchurched families (including some Japanese auto workers). Their "Cross Creek Christian School" continues to provide Lutheran education through the 4th grade for 2006-2007 but they have yet to begun construction on their Beckley Road property. Redemption Lutheran is located on the far northwest side of Battle Creek in an old suburban part of town. Commendably, Pastor Strenge will celebrate this summer the sixth anniversary of both his ordination and his installation as pastor at Redemption. In this time the congregation has greatly enhanced their visibility on M-89 with the addition of a much needed new sign, put a new roof on the building, and got new carpeting, all within a balanced budget.

Zion Lutheran Church, Kalamazoo – Rev. Tim Seeber, senior pastor; Rev. Mark Couch, WMU

Zion has recently undergone an extensive renovation of their beautiful facilities on a wooded hill near downtown Kalamazoo that included a vastly expanded narthex and air conditioning in the sanctuary. Their music minister, Pete Prochnow, recently took a call to be on the faculty at Concordia University Nebraska in Seward. Pastor Seeber, who in 2008 celebrated 20 years at Zion, enjoys the longest tenure of any of the active pastors in our circuit. Immanuel has also experienced some traumatic losses of key members due to death in this past year, but they continue to bring in new members, are very supportive of St. Michael Lutheran School in Portage, and maintain their outreach to the deaf community in Kalamazoo.

St. Michael Lutheran Church, Portage – Rev. Dr. Paul Naumann, senior pastor; Jon Forster, DCE

Next year, St. Michael will celebrate 50 years of ministry in the greater Kalamazoo area. Saint Michael Lutheran School, with its 223 students, will also have its first 8th grade class in the 2009-2010 school year. Last fall, a capital campaign entitled "Mission Forward" raised nearly \$700,000 in pledges, 10% of which has been pledged to the Michigan District's 125th anniversary thank offering, "The Future Is Now." The congregation has recently authorized exploration into adding an infant/toddler program to go with their existing senior day program, Covenant, which also now has a new administrator and vision for inclusion into St. Michael's "cradle to grave" ministry.

Trinity Lutheran Church, Paw Paw – Rev. Mark Whittaker, senior pastor; Kevin Otrhalik, DCE

Trinity is the only LC-MS church in Van Buren County and maintains the oldest Lutheran Day School in our Circuit. Unfortunately, Pastor Whittaker has been very busy with funerals in the past year but continues to serve faithfully and tirelessly at Trinity, even in the context of serious illness in his family. Trinity has been blessed by some significant financial contributions in the last year and was able to sell their Mattawan property that they had been intended for the former mission congregation Family of Christ. They plan to raise funds for renovating their parking lot, and to make a sizeable contribution to "The Future Is Now/Fan Into Flame."

St. Peter Lutheran Church, Three Rivers – Rev. Alan Stadelman St. Peter remains a visible source of Christ's love in Three Rivers. In 2008, St. Peter's celebrated its 50th year in their current church building on a highway 131 just north of town. Since accepting the Call in 2006, Rev. Alan R. Stadelman has provided Confessional and compassionate leadership. As regional Pastoral Counselor for the Gateway Zone of the Michigan LWML, Pastor Stadelman has seen the ladies of St. Peter's produce hundreds of quilts, health kits and school kits for Lutheran World Relief. Intentional Mission Development

Under the Gospel Imperative of the Great Commission, the Michigan District values the planting and development of new congregations and mission societies which result in the generation of a new audience for the Gospel by bringing the message of Jesus Christ to the unchurched and dechurched populations within the State of Michigan. This core value will summon the District to give priority to such activities as:

- A. Planting new mission congregations
- B. Partnering with mission societies and RSOs
- C. Assisting local congregations and RSOs to call missionary personnel
- D. Calling and deploying missionary personnel to specific mission fields
- E. Multiplying, equipping (through appropriate agencies), certifying and placing lay missionary personnel
- F. Providing support for existing urban, ethnic and transcultural ministries, and church planting
- G. Continual environmental scanning (demographics) and interpretation of the Michigan mission harvest field
- H. Encouraging every district congregation to be mission minded and culturally relevant so as to honor Christ and reach the lost.
- I. Encouraging and assisting congregations to support and be involved in the world mission efforts of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Mission Services Department

The Mission Services Department is primarily responsible for the first of the Four Major Outcomes of the Michigan District. Outcome 1 is "Outreach Mindset". To accomplish this outcome, the Mission Services Department is focused on several key areas:

- New Mission Starts
- Specialized Ministries
- Evangelism/Apologetics
- Alternate Paths to Ordination
- World Missions



The Michigan District wants all congregations to be sensitive to those without Christ, within their communities and beyond, and actively share Christ's love with them.

The Mission Services Department takes this seriously as it works to equip and enable people to give a clear forthright witness of their faith, and establish new missions where believers can plant their feet while they reach out with Christ's love to non-believers in their communities.

New Missions

Under the Gospel Imperative of the Great Commission, a focus of the Mission Services Department has been on Intentional Mission Development, and exciting things are happening.

A new congregation, referred to as a New Church Start or Mission, is: 1) an intentionally organized gathering which; 2) comes together on a regular basis for worship and/or Bible study, and; 3) is intended to grow into a member LCMS congregation.

The following are steps taken to develop a new mission:

- 1. Identify cities and communities where a new mission would bring new people into the kingdom.
- 2. Contact Circuit(s) and discuss the need for a mission in those communities.
- 3. Receive Circuit approval for the formation of a mission.
- 4. Identify the appropriate method for starting a mission:
 - a.) District calls and deploys a Missionary-at-large

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- b.) Local congregation starts a daughter congregation
- c.) District partners with a Mission Society such as POBLO, Lutheran City Ministries, Ephphatha, LATINO, etc.

Every year the goal is to establish at least two new mission starts in the Michigan District, and God has been faithful. Since the 2006 Convention, seven new mission endeavors have celebrated their first worship service, and twelve others are in the process of being established.

Since the 2006 Convention, the Michigan District has called Rev. Bertram Lewis as a Missionary Pastor to be instrumental in the

development of our new mission in Romulus. Calls were also extended to two men to lead the mission endeavor in Detroit, but both calls were declined. The District is still seeking a Mission Planter for this site.

The District continues to study every circuit in the State of Michigan for emerging opportunities in mission planting. Within the next three years, the Michigan District looks to call or partner with congregations to plant six or more new missions in specific communities in the state. We seek your help and partnership in this endeavor in identifying possible sites for new mission starts.

Conversion and new member statistics still show that starting new mission congregations is one of the most effective methods for accomplishing the work of the Lord's Great Commission. As America grows numerically, may our passion and desire grow as well for those who do not know Christ as Savior, for it is our God's desire that all may be saved and come to the knowledge of His Son, the Savior of the world.

District Subsidy

The Michigan District is pleased to be able to financially assist new missions and specialized ministries, that they may have the means to accomplish the work of reaching out to the unchurched, building relationships in their communities, and more. Subsidies are made possible through the generous offerings of the congregations of the Michigan District who support the work of the District and the church-at-large.

In this 2009 year, through the budget of the Mission Services Department, the Michigan District will subsidize our existing missions financially with \$672,800.00. The Department has also allocated nearly \$500,000 towards new mission planting. The total 2009 mission budget to assist and facilitate the work of the Great Commission in mission planting is over \$1,000,000. Thanks and praise to God for the congregations of the Michigan District and their gifts of prayer and financial support for the Lord's work in His harvest field; Matthew 9:25-28.

The District is intentionally serving many ethnic groups as part of our mission endeavor to disciple the nations. There are over eight specific ethnic groups served and supported by the District and our mission societies in becoming member congregations of the LCMS. The District is seeking partnerships with local congregations and mission societies to reach and disciple new ethnic immigrants. One such group is 20,000 plus Bengalis living in the Hamtramck and Detroit communities.

The goal of the Joint Urban Ministry Project is to revitalize existing urban ministries, start new missions in urban areas, and to provide assistance to those who work in the urban mission field.

What a great joy it is for the Michigan District and its congregations to serve our Lord in such a variety of ways. Surely God's call is for us to serve all people, wherever and whatever area of life we find them. Jesus served people from all walks of life and we seek to follow in His example. Praise and thanks to God for congregations and their desire to fulfill the great commission in loving and serving others through Specialized Ministries.

World Missions

Though not as easy to see and be a part of, work to advance the Kingdom of God continues to go on beyond our shores. Primarily through the use of *Michigan in Touch* and the District's website, the Mission Services Department shares with constituents the work done overseas by missionaries from our District. The work is varied, from being a West Africa Area Facilitator for LCMS World Mission to a Communication Specialist in Panama, yet each missionary has been placed by God to reach out those who don't know Him. The Mission Services Department holds all missionaries in prayer that God would provide for and encourage them as they go about the important task of sharing the Gospel.

Ablaze! Report

During the last triennium the Michigan District has continued its involvement in the Synodical *Ablaze!* movement. The goals of *Ablaze!* are that by 2017, the 500th Anniversary of the 95 Theses, our church body will have

- Shared the Gospel with 100,000,000 people
- Started 2,000 new congregations
- Revitalized 2,000 existing congregations.

with Christ's Love

A total of 102 congregations from the Michigan District have registered as *Ablaze!* partners and reported 11,914 Gospel contacts as of February, 2009. Five new congregations have been planted. Four congregations have gotten involved in revitalization.

Numerous workshops and presentations have been conducted to stimulate involvement in the *Ablaze!* movement. The workshops have accented how congregations can organize to count/report Gospel contacts and how individuals can get more "fired-up" through spiritual disciplines. Specifically people have been encouraged to:

- Read through the Bible annually
- Spend half and hour a day in prayer
- Commit to tithing
- Intentionally build relationships with at least four unbelievers
- Find six others to make the same commitment

Congregations throughout the District have also been involved with *Ablaze!* by taking advantage of programmatic materials available through the LCMS *Ablaze!* web site.

Two *Ablaze!* Torch Relays have been held. The Relays included 19 evangelism rallies, over 150 runners and a total of 2,500 participants. In 2007 the *Ablaze!* Torch Relay traveled from Hell to Paradise. The 2008 event traveled from Coast to Coast, the Detroit River to Lake Michigan. The Relays provided multiple opportunities for the sharing of the Gospel. Over \$70,000 was raised to support the event, church planting and church worker training in coordination with the 125th District thank offering, The Future is Now.

The 2009 *Ablaze!* Torch Relay: For the Heart of Michigan is planned to conclude at the District Convention and have over 3,000 people involved.

Rev. David Davis, Pastor of St. Luke, Haslett, serves as the *Ablaze!* Coordinator. Rev. Roosevelt Gray coordinates church planting, and Rev. Galan Walther coordinates the revitalization of congregations.

Committee on Mental Illness

The mission of the Michigan District Continuing Committee on Mental Illness is to support pastors and congregations in ministering to members who have mental illness and their families, involving them as much as possible in the life and work of the congregation. The Committee has operated since 1992 and is the only District sponsored group in Synod dealing with the needs of members who are mentally ill and their families. Synod's Human Care Department looks to this committee for leadership in this area. The Committee meets twice a year



at the Michigan District Office for planning, budget review and reports from members of the committee as well as communication and updates from the Lutheran Network on Mental Illness/Brain Disorders. The Committee has collected, authored and distributed information on serious mental illness at District Conventions, Pastors Conferences and Synodical Conventions. The Rev. Barton Gray is currently serving as Chairperson and Laura, his wife, as corresponding secretary and Linda LaTulip as recording secretary.

At the 2006 District Convention a manual for pastors and congregations in working with people who are mentally ill was made available. It was also placed on the Convention CD which went to all congregations. Currently being revised and updated it will continue to be available for ministering to the mentally ill. A Recognized Service Organization in another District has requested permission to use it. Copies are available at the Committee booth during the convention or through Christian Care at the District Office.

During the past triennium the October/November issue of Michigan In Touch issue was devoted to the subject of ministering to those who are mentally ill. Articles were chiefly written by members of the committee. It proved to be a popular issue and the articles are still available on the District website www.michigandistrict.org/m3d.html.

Several regional workshops were held to aid the committee in fulfilling its mission of supporting pastors and congregations in this ministry. The DVD based workshop "You Are Not Alone" is especially helpful in providing accurate information about mental illness and connecting people to help. People from outside our church have consulted with Rev. Paulson based on mental illness information on the District web page and other publicity. Family members who have phoned seeking help have been referred to local agencies which could assist them.

The Committee encourages Pastors to:

- Pray for all people affected by mental illness during October (Mental Illness Awareness Month)
- Become familiar with the resources of Pathways to Promise, (www.pathways2promise.org) and support its outreach to clergy.
- Acknowledge as a treatable brain disorder and give people permission to seek appropriate medical help.
- Refer people to NAMI (www.NAMI.org) and competent medical care.

As Lutherans, our Faith in our Savior Jesus Christ

- Does not depend on how we feel, but on what the Word of God says and the Means of Grace do (forgive and save us).
- Helps us to understand that mental illness is not divine punishment for sin or a lack of faith or the result of poor parenting.
- Empowers us to reach out to people who need our help. Our God promises us he will bless that work. In fact He has already prepared it for us to do (Ephesians 2:10).

Communications



The Communications Office of the District continues to provide information to all of our congregations, professional church workers, and laity. The weekly E-bulletin is emailed to all of our congregations, 1,660 professional church workers, and over 100 laity. It contains timely announcements of prayer concerns, District/RSO/Congregational ministries, and News and Events. A bi-monthly magazine, Michigan In Touch, is the official publication of the Michigan District and works to network congregational ministry. The magazine's feature articles focus on ministry within congregations, District, and Synod. An extensive website links professional church workers and congregations to resources, events, ministries, and directories of the Michigan District and beyond.

The Communications Office continues to assist other departments of the District as well as committees and task forces with their publicity strategies, design, printing, and distribution needs for events, seminars, workshops, and conferences.

Because of the rapid pace of technology innovation and emerging ministry challenges, the District's Communications has undergone an extensive evaluation of its procedures and policies as it continues to seek out the best ways of sharing information with congregations and professional church workers. Changes have taken and will take place with prayerful consideration and with the aid of reports, surveys, and expert advice from those in the communications and public relations field. The Communication Office's foundational efforts are towards the ultimate goal of extending the Kingdom of God through its congregations and church workers and sharing the Good News of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ our Lord.

The District Ministry Cabinet, composed of the President and the Director of each department, meets monthly to coordinate the mission and ministry of the District. The departments meet as needed, while the District and Church Extension Fund Executive Staff meet monthly for staff in-service and Bible study. In addition, the entire District Staff meets quarterly for updates and department reports.

Lending Library

The 4th Outcome of the Michigan District states that "congregations recognize, use and share innovative, effective resources the Spirit grants to His church for service to Christ and to people."

One such resource is the Michigan District Lending Library including religious books and videos on a wide range of topics such as: Assimilation, Church Health, Witnessing, Stewardship, Interim Ministry, and Community Outreach to name a few. The library also has Bible study and youth materials, resources on marriage, parenting, careers, and more.

Since the start of 2009, the District's library has been undergoing reorganization. New cataloging software allows the library to be searchable through the District website. Now, anyone can browse what is in the library inventory, and easily email a request to check out materials.

The library is constantly changing as new materials are acquired and older resources are being updated. What will not change is the District's desire to provide congregations with the best resources to help them do ministry. The Michigan District looks forward to resourcing congregations through the Lending Library for years to come.

Lutheran Witness

The Lutheran Witness is the official periodical of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Published 11 times a year, it provides Missouri Synod church workers and laypeople with stories and information that complement congregational life, foster personal growth in faith, and help interpret the contemporary world from a Lutheran Christian perspective.

The Lutheran Witness is an important tool for congregations and their members and supports the Michigan District's fourth desired outcome; Resourced Congregations. The District recognizes the wonderful publication The Lutheran Witness is and encourages all congregations to offer subscriptions to their members.

Features of The Lutheran Witness include:

- Stories on current events or society trends and how they affect the church.
- Doctrinal, theological, and confessional stories.
- "How-to" stories on ways Christians can serve Christ or articles highlighting the Christian's walk with God.
- Bible studies involving reader participation...and so much more!

Unfortunately, in recent years, it seems fewer people are requesting subscriptions to this publication. Subscriptions have steadily declined at an average of 230 subscriptions each year. Coming into 2009, however, the most dramatic change was seen. As of February 2009, our District's order was down almost 1,400 subscriptions over the previous year. The reasons for this are unknown, though the current economic situation is certainly playing a factor. Fewer churches are ordering bulk subscriptions for their members. The age of our District's membership also plays a part. Younger members are less likely to order a subscription to something they can read online, and The Lutheran Witness is available online at www.lcms.org/pages/witness.asp.

The Lutheran Witness is a wonderful resource and a voice for the Gospel in each home. The District's prayer is that congregations can continue to recognize the value of this publication, and share it with their members for years to come.

Note: We thank God for Mrs. Barbara Prough who was coordinator of The Lutheran Witness subscriptions for the Michigan District for nearly 30 years. After retiring in October 2008, Barbara looked forward to spending more time with her children and grandchildren. But, unexpectedly, God called Barbara home on January 29, 2009. Though we mourn her passing, we rejoice with the fellowship of believers that she has been made new in Christ. And together we say, "Well done, good and faithful servant!"

Archival Mission Statement

Our archival mission is to collect, preserve, and make available institutional records about the history, administration, congregations and people of the Michigan District, Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. The Lutheran church in Michigan has a rich history to preserve; what a blessing that our district finds its preservation an important task.

To accomplish our mission, the archive maintains a collection of historical materials aimed at preserving the history of the Michigan District for future reference and research. This collection includes proceedings from past district conventions, minutes of district board meetings, financial reports, personal papers and correspondence, past issues of the Michigan Lutheran & Michigan in Touch, photographs, and files on significant events in Michigan congregations.

Archive Location, Access and Use

The archive is located in a secured room in the Zimmerman Library on the campus of Concordia University in Ann Arbor. Access is by appointment only. Congregational historians sometimes use the archive to find information for anniversary booklets or celebrations. In 2006, the district 125th anniversary committee found material in the archive useful in planning the festivities for the 125th Anniversary Convention.

The Michigan District Archive does not maintain family history records, or congregational records of official acts. These records may be found in other locations:

- Baptismal, Marriage, or Burial records can usually be found at the appropriate congregation, or in the case of disbanded congregations, at the Concordia Historical Institute in St. Louis http://chi.lcms.org.
- Michigan District school records, including transcripts from Lutheran High East, can be found at Lutheran High Northwest. Their phone number is 248.852.6677.

Use of the archive for historical research about Michigan District history is welcomed and encouraged. Access is possible by contacting the district archivist, Barbara Laughlin Adler; she can assist congregations in preparing to celebrate a major anniversary, or in finding information on Michigan district history.

A booklet of guidelines for congregational archivists is available on request; we ask that each congregation designate an archivist/historian who will be responsible for maintaining the proper environment for congregational records. See the return form at the end of this report.

Report on Improvements

Below are some of the goals for 2007-2009, and their current status:

1. Congregational records processed in order to transfer them to The Concordia Historical Institute in St. Louis, where they can be preserved in an ideal environment. The official acts books from St. Johannes Lutheran, now disbanded, were transferred in 2007. CHI's website allows access to Michigan records in their holdings. Go to chi.lcms.org for the website.

2. We continue to make progress creating a more "user-friendly" space for researchers who might visit the archive. During the past two years, additional shelving and cabinet space was cleared.

3. Weekly phone or email inquiries are handled. Most are interested in obtaining baptismal or graduation information.

4. A major goal was the re-organization of district records and the "winnowing" of unnecessary collections; great progress has been made.

5. Since the 2006 report, assistant archivist Mrs. Graham, has continued to improve the look and orderliness of the archive room and its collections. She has organized, labeled, and cleaned out many files and boxes of previously unidentified and un-cataloged materials. She has secured a longer life for many documents by replacing old folders and boxes with acid-free containers. Listed here are a few of the more significant improvements:

- Books and periodical collections have been sorted and indexed
- Files and periodicals have been inventoried, labeled more clearly, and transferred to acid-free folders and boxes

- Excel spreadsheets have been created to catalog and manage the inventories of our archival materials.
- Duplicate materials have been discarded, creating much needed space.
- Michigan records included in a collection from Pastor Alfred J. Freitaq (California), were acquired from a Southwest District transferal in 2008.
- Michigan's "Deaf Lutheran" periodicals were inventoried and organized on shelf space.
- Staff development has centered on participation in archive workshops and conferences. Barbara Adler attended the CHI Archival Conference in St. Louis, October 2007. Both staff members plan to attend the Midwest Archive Conference in St. Louis in May 2009.

Affiliations

The district archive is affiliated with The Concordia Historical Institute, which holds a biennial Conference on Archive and History. This conference is designed especially for district and LWML archivists, but congregational archivists and historians would certainly benefit from attending. Individuals and congregations are encouraged to become supporting members of CHI. They may subscribe to CHI Quarterly which publishes a broad assortment of articles dealing with Lutheranism in America.

We are also affiliated with and maintain files for each congregation of the district. A brochure titled A Handbook for Church Archivists is available to congregations. The brochure offers helpful tips to congregational archivists who are charged with collecting and maintaining church records. A copy of the brochure may be obtained by sending an email to adlerb@cuaa.edu and asking for the handbook.

Congregations are strongly encouraged to submit to the district archive the following types of materials: congregational histories, special installations, dedications, anniversary booklets, worship folders, pastoral biographies, and any significant press clippings. These materials may be sent directly to the archive at the address below, or they can be sent in care of the archive, to the district office.

Congregations that permanently disband are required by Synodical Bylaws (Handbook, 3.207j) to transfer all records (registers of official acts, minutes, and other historical materials) to the district office. From there essential records will be transferred to Concordia Historical Institute. If you know of any such records, please contact us with the information. Your Congregational Archive

- We strongly recommend that each congregation of the district have its own archivist/historian who is charged with preserving the history of the congregation.
- We would like to maintain a listing of all congregational archivists and historians throughout the district, so that we can assist them whenever possible. If this individual is just getting started, we can provide them with some initial training resources.

Parish Nursing/Health Ministry

Parish Nursing/Health Ministry is committed to promoting and supporting physical, emotional, and mental health and well-being. as part of the Christian stewardship of the whole person. There are over 60 congregations with active health ministries in the Michigan District.

Functions of parish nurse/health ministry:

- Integrator of faith and health. Health is not the absence of disease. Health is a holistic way of living that includes healthy spiritual, physical, emotional and relational life. The parish nurse seeks to promote an understanding of the relationship between faith and health by lifting up lifestyle practices as a matter of stewardship and faith.
- Health educator. Provides opportunities for individuals and groups to learn about health issues.
- Health counselor. Discusses health concerns, answers questions, encourages healthy lifestyle.
- Referral advisor/liaison. Provides referrals to health-care and social services resources in the community.
- Health advocate. Helps members of the congregation or community obtain needed health-related services. Empowers people with information/resources to make wise healthcare decisions.
- Home health visitation. Provides home-health visitation upon request to offer support and encourage safety, adherence to healthy lifestyle behaviors. Does not replace home health care services which are ordered by a physician.
- Developer of support groups. Facilitates the development of support groups for the church and community.
- Volunteer coordinator. Recruits, prepares and oversees congregational volunteers who help those in need.

Qualifications for a parish nurse:

- Registered nurse, licensed in Michigan, functioning under the American Nurses Association Scope and Standards of Practice for Parish Nursing.
- Member in good standing of the congregation.
- Person of spiritual maturity.
- Two or more years of nursing experience.
- Completion of a recognized parish nurse preparation program, which consists of 35 contact hours.

Unity Ministry

In 2007, the District launched a new ministry entitled UNITY: A Ministry of Mediation. Its purpose was to aid congregations and church workers in dispute who have been unable to reach solutions on their own.



Mediation employs one of two processes depending on the need. One process deals with dispute involving two or three clearly

defined disputants. These might be two workers, a worker and a board, two boards, or the like. The other process is employed when the dispute is congregation wide and involves many issues. The goals of both processes are to come to an Agreement that defines how ministry will be conducted in the future and to heal relationships as much as possible. The emphasis is strongly on the future and is action oriented.

Unity employs co-mediators. Dr. Peter Larsen is the Director and is involved in all mediations. His partner is Brian Young, retired Lutheran principal from Immanuel, Bay City if the dispute involves a church with a school and Bill Young, a retired Lutheran banker if the congregation does not have a school.

As of the spring of 2009, six mediations have involved two party mediation and five have been all congregation mediations.

Providing and Supporting Professional Church Workers

The Michigan District values assisting congregations and professional church workers and to this end will provide quality staff support services such as:

- A. Coaching for staff configuration and/or expansion
- B. Development of relevant and appropriate ministry descriptions
- C. Assisting congregations to identify staff candidates
- D. Church worker support, health and encouragement
- E. Assisting in the management of conflict

Chaplaincy

Michigan District Chaplaincy flows from the Good News in Christ Jesus and Christian compassion to those who are hurting. In most instances our chaplains are on staff and serving as Director of Pastoral Care at the institutions where they are serving, with endorsement and ecclesiastical supervision through the District.

We have a goal of one new chaplaincy each triennium. Although during the past three years we lost one chaplaincy we gained three new ones surpassing our goal. The new ones are John Schinkel at Monroe Lutheran Home, Jeffrey Wollberg at the VA Medical Center in Battle Creek, and David McNeil, Oncology Chaplain at St. Joseph Medical Center in Ypsilanti. He is at one of only four centers in the United States with oncology chaplain programs. As such he ministers to both in and out patients, their families and staff. This chaplaincy initially was made possible through a special grant from the Leona M. Geyer Trust and Christ Our King congregation of Saline, and this year a domestic grant of Synod's Human Care Department.

A grant through the Family Advisory Committee from the Leona M. Geyer Trust provides tuition for the first quarter of Clinical Pastoral Education for those considering chaplaincy, as well as for pastors, deaconesses and others who would like to increase their pastoral care skills. Providing disaster, Civil Air Patrol, FBI, police or fire chaplaincies are Roger Stauffer, Steve Eggers, Carl Bassett, Pete Nichol, Paul Theiss, Michael Wentzel and Deacon Bill Storm. In addition individuals from other congregations are providing volunteer jail and prison ministries.

Emeriti chaplains, are Edward Einem, Dwain Gade, Carl DeMeritt, Donald Neiswender, Ray Thomas, and David Voorhees.

Warren Paulson, Emeritus, serves part time as District Executive Chaplain with Christian Care responsibilities, as well as Deacon and Intentional Interim Ministries.

Commission on Deacon Qualification

The Commission on Deacon Qualifications (CDQ) functions under the direct supervision of the District President. The mission of the CDQ is to "recommend candidates for the Office of the Ministry to the District President, who then issues a license so that those candidates might serve a congregation." To fulfill this mission, the CDQ conducts the following activities.

For a man to become a candidate for the Office of Deacon, he must be appropriately equipped. To this end, the CDQ established the Deacon Training and Paraprofessional Program. The program is designed to offer thirteen seminars (courses), each requiring a minimum of 24 contact hours with the instructor as well as homework and/or fieldwork, and when the candidate completes all the work required, he receives a "pass." These seminars are presented at two levels. The first level is for "deacon students," and they study Old Testament, New Testament, Doctrine I, Doctrine II, and Office of the Deacon. The second level is for "deacon interns," and because of seminar requirement of practical experience, are often mentored. These seminars are: Care-giving, Leadership Skills, Lutheran History and Polity, Marketing, Teaching the Faith, Worship, Greek, and Homiletics. The main instructors are: the Rev. Dr. Robert J. Schultz, Dr. Ron Jahnke, and Dr. Jim Boldt. Presently about 75 men are in the training program.

Note that seven of the courses may be used to prepare for the Pastor Specific Ministry Program.

It should be further noted that this program will also train those who want serve in the church as paraprofessionals but not as deacons. The courses are open to everyone who desires to take them.

When a man has completed his education toward becoming a deacon he presents his "ministry description" and the CDQ interviews him. The CDQ then recommends him for the Office of Deacon. Unless unusual circumstances apply, the District President grants him the license after his commencement from the program. He must have a situation in which to serve and a supervising pastor to provide oversight and guidance. The 26 deacons of the district are presently serving in small rural churches, as church planters, in ethnic ministries, as assistants to pastors, and in inner city ministries.

To support deacons in their ministry, the CDQ offers a yearly conference for encouragement and spiritual growth. Supervising pastors and deacons further have a yearly conference to strengthen their team ministry. The CDQ members - Rev. Dr. Robert J. Schultz, Dr. Ron Jahnke, Dr. Jim Boldt, Rev. Ted Beiderwieden, Deacon Bill Storm, Ms. Chris Brown, Rev. Warren Paulson and liaison district secretary Dawn Marone - are honored to serve God in this way.

Commission on Ministerial Growth and Support

The mission of the Commission on Ministerial Growth and Support is to enrich the whole person health (emotional, spiritual, physical, financial and relational) of Professional Church Workers through promotion, education, referral assistance and advocacy. Our on-going efforts include sponsoring of Health Advocates and conducting pre-seminary interviews. New and current projects of the Commission include:

- Conducting a Family Life Survey of all Professional Church Workers and their spouses in an effort to make future plans for the Commission based on their needs.
- Hosting Retirement planning workshops for both Commissioned and Ordained workers.
- Continuing work on a program to help with the needs of Veterans of the Cross.
- Collaborating with Grace Place Lutheran Retreats to help raise funds to support wholistic health retreats in Michigan as well as encouraging our workers to participate in the retreats.
- Providing counselor resources and counseling for Professional Church Workers through the District website.
- Working with District staff to produce Sabbatical Guidelines that are posted on the District website.
- Securing a grant to fund a program "First Manage Yourself Well" a wellness conference series for church workers and spouses to implement good spiritual and physical health for all workers in their ministry.

Intentional Interim Ministry

Interim refers to a time between. It is the time between what has been and what will be. In congregations it is the time between resident pastors. It is a time following saying good-bye to a pastor who no longer serves the congregation, leaving go of his ministry and getting ready to say hello to another pastor. It is a time of uncertainty between the past and an unknown future. It is a time of anxiety, anticipation and hope.

The good news is that rather than just maintaining itself and urgently seeking a new pastor, this in-between time provides an opportunity for renewal, congregational development and spiritual growth. It is a period when a congregation can come to a better understanding of its ministry, grow in effectiveness and commit to faithfulness in mission with the new pastor it calls under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Further, when a congregation becomes vacant the entire church rises to assist it. The circuit counselor coordinates ministry, the congregational ministry facilitator assists with the self study and the District president prepares the call list. All are available for consultation. In addition, dozens of congregations during the past three years have chosen the option of an intentional interim pastor for the time between resident pastors.

Forty five District pastors have received District sponsored introductory training for serving congregations with intentionality during an interim and are involved in continuing education events twice a year. In addition, most of them have taken 60 hours of education currently conducted by the National Association of Lutheran Interim Pastors through the Continuing Education Department at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis or similar recognized education. In addition they completed six months of monitored field work, being recognized as having completed basic education according to national standards. This is in accordance with the Guidelines of Synod's Council of Presidents. The Michigan District and Indiana District jointly conduct training of Intentional Interim Pastors and Continuing Education Contact Hours are given to participants by Concordia University, Ann Arbor. Because of the recognized need for providing greater assistance to congregations during vacancies and seeing that it is a prime time for renewal there is an increasing use of specially trained intentional interim ministers throughout Synod.

Rev. Warren Paulson, Michigan District Director of Intentional Interim Ministry, is recognized in our Synod and beyond for his experience and special training in this area. Retired pastors and principals, or other pastors of the Michigan District who may be available and who would like to know more about this ministry or participate in it should contact Rev. Paulson at the District Office. Michigan District Student Aid Program

The Michigan District LCMS Student Aid program is designed to provide financial assistance in the form of scholarships to

- members of Michigan District LCMS congregations,
- preparing for and intending to enter full time church work (as defined as any position available through the Board of Assignments of the Synod),
- at one of the seminaries of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod or one of the colleges or universities of the Concordia University System.

Annual distributions are based on the available funds for the year and the number of eligible students. A three tier system is used. Students attending one of the two seminaries receive aid at the highest rate, students attending Concordia University Ann Arbor receive aid at the middle rate, and students attending one of the other nine CUS schools will receive aid at the base rate.

The Student Aid Program administration falls under the Member Services Department of the District with the guidelines being approved by the Endowment Advisory Council. More detailed guidelines and the required forms can be found at www.michigandistrict.org under Resources.

Thanks to the 125th Anniversary Thank Offering, The Future is Now, the amount of aid distributed to all students has dramatically increased. The amount of aid approximately doubled from the 2007-2008 school year to the 2008-2009 school year.

Support for Families

The Michigan District values ministry to Christian and non-Christian families, recognizing that the family is the central unit of Christian nurture. The District will provide resources to congregations designed to establish, support and strengthen the family in Christ and will facilitate events to complement the role of families.

Family Life

Most would say that ministry to families is important. It's hard not to say that about something so fundamental. And, when you consider the current statistics, demographics, trends and circumstances, it becomes abundantly clear that families – husbands and wives, parents and children, younger and older, single and divorced, widow and widower – need ministry more than ever. Strengthening the Christian family according to God's design in Holy Scripture continues to be a significant challenge in ministry. Gathering Christian families of all shapes and sizes around Word and Sacrament where they receive the tremendous blessings God has for His people in His Son, Jesus Christ, continues to be the goal toward which the Michigan District strives in the area of family life, that District congregations may be resourced for ministry so that the lives of many be blessed both now and in eternity.

Ministry opportunities and resources with individual congregations seeking to give support for families have been provided by the Congregation Ministry Facilitators as they have worked with their assigned congregations. In addition, several task forces, standing committees and volunteers at events, involving over 100 professional church workers and laity, have provided more formal opportunities for both professional church workers and congregation leaders and members to be better equipped to carry out family ministry in their local congregations.

In the past triennium, many opportunities under the broad heading of "Family Life" were sponsored or supported by the Michigan District:

In the area of Family Ministry, the initial Family Friendly Partners

Network process was completed and the second training is currently underway. The *Special Friends Camp* was offered annually for mentally impaired youth and adults, as well as the first *Special Friends Winter Weekend*. Events in partnership with Concordia University – Ann Arbor, included, quarterly *Family Connections* gatherings of family, youth and/or children's ministry workers and students in the Family Ministry study program, as well as *Forums and Symposiums* and other family ministry training opportunities.

In the area of **Children's Ministry**, print and web-based *resources*, as well as *workshops*, for those involved in children's ministry were provided to the congregations of the District. In addition, five trained *Children's Ministry Consultants* are available to assist congregations in evaluating and refocusing their ministry to children and their families.

In the area of **Youth Ministry**, the annual *Junior High Youth Gathering* held on the campus of Concordia University, Ann Arbor, provided opportunities for youth in grades 6-8 to grow in and live their faith. The triennial *Senior High Youth Gathering* at Mackinac Island provided the opportunity for youth in grades 9-12 to grow in and live their faith. A *workshop* for youth workers was held at Loon Lake Lutheran Retreat Center in Hale, and training opportunities were included at the Junior and Senior High Gatherings. Coordinated and encouraged Michigan District congregations participating in "C+H+O+S+E+N," the *LCMS National Youth Gathering* in Orlando, Florida. Four youth and adults received peer ministry training at the annual Council of Lutheran Youth Fellowship Representatives, and they in turn



trained the District *Lutheran Youth Fellowship* board, who are available to lead peer ministry youth events in congregations or circuits.

In the area of **Adult Ministry**, the triennial *Lutheran Adult Gathering* on Mackinac Island provided opportunities for fellowship and growth.

Families, as they always have, come in all sizes, shapes and configurations. The Church, God's Family, gathered around Word and Sacrament, has the unique opportunity to provide support for all families. In the next triennium, the Michigan District will continue to provide resources for congregational use and encouragement for professional and lay leaders providing support for families within congregations and opportunities for celebrating support for families, through...

- ... The on-going service of Congregation Ministry Facilitators.
- ... Print and audio-visual resources available through the Michigan District library.
- ... Resources and links on the Michigan District web site.
- ... On-going Family Friendly Partners Network opportunities.
- ... Training opportunities for those involved in children's, youth and family ministry.
- ... Consultants equipped to assist congregations in the areas of Children's Ministry and Youth Ministry.
- ... *"We Believe"* LCMS National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, Louisiana.
- ... *"Serving in His Presence*" Lutheran Adult Gathering, on Mackinac Island.
- ... District Junior High and Senior High Youth Gatherings.

Lutheran Schools, Preschools, and Child Care Centers


The Michigan District values the discipling of children through Lutheran schools and preschool/child care centers in the spiritual formation and local mission outreach. To this end, such educational agencies will be supported through quality support services which include such activities as:

- A. Professional growth through in-service workshops and conferences
- B. Accreditation and State certification
- C. Encouragement and on-site support visits
- D Conflict intervention
- E. Liaison with State and/or private educational agencies

Lutheran Schools. Preschools and Child Care Centers

"And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?" Esther 4:14

Lutheran Education in the Michigan District is often centered on answering critical questions. The question posed in Esther came at a critical time in the life of the God's chosen people. Esther was chosen by God to lead during this critical time. Michigan is currently facing challenging times that refocus us on the need for Christian Education. An education that teaches about grace, forgiveness and hope on certain things not rooted in the economy but instead in fulfilled lives as God's people. An education that desires us to teach and practice scriptural stewardship that differentiates between the "abundant life" and living excessively in 2009. Our schools are ministries of congregations that focus on daily sharing Christ with children from a variety of faith backgrounds. (51% non-Lutheran, 17% unchurched.) This congregational ministry was blessed by the Holy Spirit to include 351 new members baptized or confirmed in 2007/08 and 233 school children baptized during the same period.



Lutheran Schools in Service

The girls from Lutheran Westland captured second place in the Class "D" 2008 MHSAA State Tournament. More importantly these girls, and students in other Lutheran Schools, impacted their community through acts of Christian service. Saginaw Valley Lutheran students and students from the surrounding Lutheran Community packed rice bags for world relief. Students from LHNW in Rochester loaded box cars for Lutheran World Relief. Lutheran grade schools support food banks, crisis pregnancy centers and raised over \$56,000 for an orphanage in Manila.

Lutheran Schools of Excellence

Lutheran Schools have a two-fold mission to educate not only the heart but also the head. Many Lutheran schools are well known for promoting and nurturing students who desire to reach their God-given potential. St. John's Lutheran School in Rochester won the State of Michigan 2008 "Future City Competition" under coach Jon Pfund. Christ Stevensville sent 7th grader Lauren LaBaumbard to Washington D.C. to compete in the national Spelling Bee. St. Michael in Wayne has maintained an amazing string of victories in their local "Bible Quiz League" competition. Lutheran educators like Mark Koschmann, St. John Midland, have been recognized for excellence in teaching science. Bev Feldkamp (pictured to the right) was chosen for the National Council of



Geographic Education's annual High School Distinguished Teacher award. Dr. John Brandt, Executive Director of Valley Lutheran, was awarded the Christus Magister Award, LEA'S highest recognition, in 2008.

Lutheran Schools Support Families



Judy Williams, Director of Children's Ministry at Trinity Lutheran in Clinton Township, is the Chairperson of the Early Childhood Cabinet. The cabinet tries to emphasize the mission of the congregation in assisting parents in the spiritual development of young children. The cabinet believes our purpose is explained in the following section from a book by George Barna. Barna states: "A series of studies we conducted regarding the age at which people accept Christ as their Savior highlights the importance of having people invite Jesus into their hearts as their Savior when they are young. We discovered the probability of someone embracing Jesus as his or her Savior was 32% for those between

the ages of 5-12; 4% for those between 13-18 and 6% for people 19 or older." <u>Transforming Children into Spiritual</u> <u>Champions</u> by George Barna, Published by Regal Books, page 34.

Statistics

Currently there are 19,163 students in Lutheran classrooms in Michigan. 1,718 students are in eight Lutheran high schools in Michigan communities. 10,013 students attend K-8 classes in 87 schools in the Lower Peninsula and 7432 students are in day care or early childhood facilities operated in 155 different congregations in Michigan. Over 1,311 adults assist families through Lutheran Schools. Lutheran High School North with 628 students is the largest school ministry in Michigan, and Immanuel Bridgman is the most family-like, with 18 students.



Summary

Our Lutheran Schools face many challenges like all educational institutions in our state. In these times we continue to thank God for the people and congregations who daily pray for and financially support the different levels of Lutheran Education in Michigan. In 2006 a task force from Notre Dame University was studying the future of Catholic Education and posed this question: "Will it be said of our generation that we presided over the demise of Catholic schools?" As we focus on answering that question from a Lutheran perspective your prayers are coveted and your support encouraged. The opportunity to market Lutheran Education is no longer just the principals job. Every member has the wonderful opportunity to share the importance of this ministry with those we contact daily. Your prayers and encouragement for more voices telling families about Lutheran Schools "Sharing Christ" are invited.

Locally Supported Ministry to Special Fields

The Michigan District values ministry into special mission fields through congregational and cluster-based outreach. In addition to calling and deploying mission developers for specific and appropriate mission fields, the Michigan District will provide appropriate resources and funding support as local congregations and ministry agencies sponsor such ministries and call ministry staff.

Christian Care

There are many facets to Christian Care as shown in reports on Parish Nurses/Health Ministers and Mental Illness. In addition Synod's Lutheran World Relief and Human Care Department makes available to congregations and groups Domestic Grants for serving communities in their area. Information on Domestic Grants and application forms may be obtained on Synod's web site under Human Care/Ministry Areas/Grants. A number of ministries within the Michigan District have obtained beneficial grants through this program during this triennium and previous ones.

Christian Care Sunday

The Ministries of Recognized Service Organizations of Synod in the Michigan District who are providing compassionate physical and spiritual care to people with special needs will be appropriately celebrated as Christian Care Sunday on or around October 18, St. Luke Sunday.

Please set aside the date for celebration in your congregation. Pastors will be available to preach or teach, as well as others to speak on special topics to Bible classes or particular groups within the congregation, or to give minute man talks at the beginning or end of the services. These service organizations will freely provide the service to heighten awareness of the many and new facets of their ministries, encourage volunteer involvement and seek prayer support.

Brochures and special prayers will be made available on the Michigan District web site, as well as by mail.

The Service Organizations involved in Michigan are Lutheran Child and Family Service (LCFS), Lutheran Homes of Michigan (LHM), Project Compassion Ministries (PCM) and Project Compassion Inc (PCI). A key verse for the celebration is "My children, let us not love with word or tongue, but in deed and truth," I John 3:18

District Disaster Response

One of the outcomes of our District Katrina response effort was the development of a District Disaster Response Team. This team is responsible for establishing a general District Disaster Response plan and also to resource congregations / schools as they establish their own plans. Over the last year, this team has worked on the general guidelines and will present them to the Convention Floor. The guidelines will be available on the District website and will be updated as needed.

Specialized Ministries

Many congregations throughout the Michigan District have ongoing specialized outreach efforts. Some of those efforts are directed toward individuals with specific needs, toward college campuses, or toward various ethnic groups. In addition to the formation of a New Mission, existing congregations may expand their mission outreach by establishing a Satellite Worship Site; a place where worship is held other than the main campus of the congregation.



The Mission Services Department has established six categories for the Specialized Ministries within the District: Blind, Campus, Deaf, Ethnic, Urban, and Satellite Site ministries.

The following are the locations where these various ministries are happening, and a note about the importance of each one in advancing the Kingdom of God.

Congregation Satellite Sites:

Though established and supported by the local congregation, Satellite Sites can and have received subsidy from the District to help with staffing, salary, or operating expenses.

Blind Ministry:

In partnership with Lutheran Blind Ministry, the District supports the ministry among the blind and visually impaired through prayer and financial support for the local congregations. Bob Mates is the contact person in the Michigan District for the work among the blind and visually impaired.

Deaf Ministry in the Michigan District is served by the District's called Missionary-at-Large, Pastor Thomas Dunseth. Pastor Dunseth serves as pastor of Our Savior Lutheran Church of the Deaf and also as the deaf ministry facilitator for congregations and circuits. He is available for consultation, leadership development and assisting district congregations to launch local ministries to the deaf. The District is also blessed to be able to partner with Ephphatha Lutheran Mission Society to reach out to the deaf and hearing impaired within our state.

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Financial Development for Congregations, District, and Synodical Ministries

Recognizing that congregational, District, and Synodical ministries will benefit from all legitimate sources of funding support, the Michigan District values financial development through such God-honoring strategies as:

- A. Utilizing the Michigan District development officer(s)
- B. Establishing ministry endowments/foundations
- C. Maintaining fiscal Integrity
- D. Maximizing the use of resources
- E. Determining the spending plan of the District based on Board of Directors' Outcomes

Board of Directors

May the Lord be praised for the blessings poured out upon the Michigan District during these past three years. The Board is thankful for the opportunity to serve the District and convey our appreciation through this report to the 99th Convention of the Michigan District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod. The Policy Based System of Governance has served the District very well. Working with the servant leadership of our District President and the excellent staff has been a joy. Even during these challenging times in Michigan, the work of our Lord continues to be evident in the congregations of the District.

The Board met faithfully five times each calendar year in the past triennium. The Board at each meeting: 1) Heard a report on the state of the District and Synod from the President; 2) Took care of the routine matters of the District in its Consent Agenda; 3) Worked on establishing, reviewing, and interpreting the plans of our District in its Governance Agenda; 4) Monitored the work of the District staff including reviewing all of the policy manual components; 5) Annually reviewed all parts of the Policies on Self Governance; 6) Accepted reports from the Treasurer, Vice President of Development, Secretary, Circuit Counselor Chairman, Church Extension Fund Board, and other active committees of the Board; 7) Heard a major presentation at each meeting on a "Big Issue" affecting our District; 8) Received monthly financial reports and yearly audit reports; 9) Planned for the 2009 District Convention and; 10) Worked on any other business brought before the Board.

Here are a few of the general topics the Board has been involved with during the past triennium:

- We rejoice in the addition of Mr. Ray Zavada to the Michigan District staff in 2007. He serves as Vice President of Development and works closely with the 125th Anniversary Thank Offering *The Future is Now*, which is currently in its congregational phase in partnership with Synod's National Campaign, *Fan into Flame*.
- 2. The Board established the minimum base salary for new educators graduating in 2009 to be set at \$26,500 plus benefits. The beginning pastoral candidate salary to be set at \$37,000 plus benefits and an adequate automobile allowance.
- 3. Approval was given to the new "Welcome to the Michigan District" booklet to be shared with new workers to the District. It was also suggested and approved to expand the use of the booklet for use at conferences, workshops, etc. to introduce District services.
- 4. Three new District Reconcilers, Pastor Terry Hoese, Mr. Duane Nagel, and Mr. Duane Renken, were appointed.
- 5. Rev. Robert Greene, member of the Blue Ribbon Task Force on Synodical Structure and Governance made a presentation to the Board in October 2008.
- 6. Five Overtures were prepared for presentation to the 2009 District Convention:
 - a. To Implement Changes to Future Michigan District Conventions
 - b. To Revise District Convention Nomination and Election Procedures
 - c. To use "Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Congregations and Professional Church Workers"
 - d. To Encourage Participation in National Lutheran School Accreditation
 - e. To Affirm Mission through Lutheran Schools

The Board of Directors continues to operate under four Major Outcomes. Listed here are key items of interest under each area:

I. OUTREACH MINDSET

- A. Two new mission starts, Living Faith, Marine City and Tabernacle of Praise, Romulus, began holding weekly services.
- B. Four new mission sites have been targeted. They are Detroit, Dundee, Trenton, and Grass Lake.
- C. A grant was provided to LATINO Mission Society to purchase the Bethlehem (West), Detroit building to expand ministry to the Detroit Hispanic population.
- D. The University Lutheran Chapel in Ann Arbor was refurbished and a new coffee house (The Common Cup) established for ministry.
- E. St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Big Rapids received funding to provide a video café worship setting as an outreach to Ferris State University.
- F. The number of children baptized after contact with Lutheran Schools increased from 141 in the 2005/06 school year to 193 in the 2006/07 school year.
- G. Witnessing workshops were held at five congregations across Michigan in conjunction with Lutheran Hour Ministries in 2007.
- H. The Board of Directors called Rev. Bertram Lewis to serve as Missionary-at-Large in the Romulus area.

II. PROFESSIONAL CHURCH WORKERS

- A. Church Worker Recruitment Sunday resources shared with congregations.
- B. 125th Anniversary Thank Offering has allowed financial support for future Professional Church Workers to double through the Student Aid.
- C. A new District Ministry, Unity in Mediation, has been developed to provide mediation counsel and support to church workers and congregations struggling through conflict.
- D. Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Congregations and Professional Church Workers has been reviewed and will be presented to the 2009 District Convention for approval.
- E. The District Salary Guidelines have been posted on the Michigan District website for congregations to use and study.
- F. Congregations were encouraged to recognize and express appreciation for the ministries of pastors and other professional church workers.
- G. The All Professional Church Worker's Conference was held in Grand Rapids, Michigan in September of 2007 and attended by over 1,100 Professional Church Workers.
- H. A directory of counselors available to Professional Church Workers is listed on the District website.

III. RELATIONSHIP BUILDING

- A. Two *Ablaze!* Torch Relays have been held across Michigan with over 1,000 people participating each year. A third *Ablaze!* Torch Relay will be held June 2009 ending on the first day of the 2009 District Convention.
- B. In support of national church ministry, a larger percentage (50.5%) of congregation remittances were sent to the National Synod beginning in 2008.
- C. The District provides opportunities for District and Synod ministries to interact with the constituency of the District through exhibition space at conferences and conventions.
- D. The District has also created a more intentional presence at area conferences by setting up a booth to relate the ministry of the District.

IV. RESOURCED CONGREGATIONS

- A. Six congregations attended Board Training Workshops in 2008.
- B. Cooperative Purchasing Agreements have been developed to save congregation's financial resources.
- C. Quarterly gatherings for strengthening/equipping/resourcing those serving in family ministry positions have been held in partnership with Concordia University, Family Connections.
- D. The Stewardship program "Faith Aflame 360 Degrees" has been presented to many congregations through workshops.

- E. Congregation Ministry Facilitators send quarterly emails to congregations with suggested ministry resources.
- F. Support and resources are provided to pastors to help in ministering to the mentally ill by the Committee on Mental Health.
- G. A resource entitled Call Committee Helps was distributed to congregations and call committees as needed.
- H. A District sponsored workshop for those congregations using policy-based governance was presented.
- I. Four Children's Ministry consultants were identified, recruited, and trained in June 2007.
- J. At the Snowtire Conference in 2007, prayer partners were developed between Michigan Lutheran Schools to connect principals to each other and focus prayers for success in ministry.
- K. The Lutheran School Portal is regularly updated by the District.
- L. A unified Michigan Lutheran School Curriculum in core subjects was developed and distributed at the Annual Principals' Conference in 2007.

Church Extension Fund

The Church Extension Fund in the Michigan District continues its 109 year tradition of supporting congregations as they build and expand facilities, hence, enlarging ministry. The downturn in the Michigan economy has impacted the demand for (multi) million dollar loans. New loan disbursements have declined over the past three years:

 $2006 = $22.1 \text{ (million)} \qquad 2007 = $16.5 \qquad 2008 = 13.3 However, churches still have a need to borrow funds for the maintenance of their facilities, i.e. boilers, parking lots, roofs, etc. And, there are new missions to start and fund!

While the national markets experienced unprecedented financial turmoil in 2008, and continue to do so in 2009, the Church Extension Fund in the Michigan District finished the fiscal year on a solid financial footing. We continue to be well positioned to serve the future needs of borrowers, and measured by a strong capital ratio and reserve ratio thereby also assuring investors of CEF's stability.



Capital Ratio: Financial institutions, such as banks and credit unions, operate with capital ratios in a 8 - 10% range, widely

accepted by industry standards. CEF net assets (or equity) at year end stood at \$40.8 million, divided by total assets of \$260.2 million, reveals a healthy capital ratio of 15.68%.

Reserve Ratio: Cash reserves on 12/31/08 were at \$58 million, representing 22% of \$260.2 million in total assets. Such reserve levels are more than adequate to fund future borrower requirements and can handle any unusual investor activity for the redemption of their investment(s).

Decrease in Net Assets: For the year ending 2008, CEF posted a net asset decrease of \$123,651 as compared to an increase in net assets in prior years. Although we would have preferred to show a gain, we are satisfied with our bottom line results considering the rocky times nearly every organization experienced in 2008. The decrease in net assets was the result of an unrealized loss on investments of \$2.7 million for the year. However, the unrealized loss on investments measured against the total investment portfolio represented less than a 5% reduction in value. CEF, by policy, invests the general portion of reserves in only fixed securities which did, indeed, protect the Fund from what could have been significant losses in value in the last quarter of 2008.

Total Assets: Year end 2008 total assets stood at \$260.2 million versus \$260.7 million at year end 2007. Given the current economic climate, we are pleased to report that while CEF did not grow in terms of total assets in 2008, we did not lose any ground either and are thankful to God for His continued blessing!

The financial strength and stability of the Fund gives evidence of (i) our ability to serve the borrowing needs of the congregations and (ii) promotes confidence for the investor who partners by pooling a portion of their invested dollars for the growth of congregations all across the Michigan District.

Development

Since the announcement of the 125th Anniversary Thank Offering *The Future is Now* at the 2006 Michigan District Convention, significant progress has been made towards accomplishing campaign objectives. Many individuals and congregations have accepted the challenge placed before them and have contributed faithfully and generously to help advance the campaign toward its desired outcomes.

With 1 Timothy 6:19 establishing the scriptural foundation of *The Future is Now*, numerous volunteers have accepted the invitation to help share the purposes of the campaign with individual members and entire congregations. In the campaign theme verse, we read, "In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life." These campaign volunteers, both pastors and lay leaders, have given greatly of their time, talents, and resources. They have helped countless others understand that the future of our Church rests with our ability today to build upon the foundation of our Church that was built by those who came before us.

To help strengthen the foundation of our Church for future generations, two objectives of the campaign were initially established. The first objective is to raise \$5 million for the purpose of planting new mission congregations within the Michigan District. The second objective, also with a goal of \$5 million, is to increase scholarship support for Michigan District students who are studying to be professional church workers through the Concordia University System or our two Seminaries. These two objectives remained the focus of the campaign through its initial stages.

In January 2009, a third campaign objective was added. After several months of planning, *The Future is Now* entered into a partnership with *Fan into Flame*, and in doing so, added international ministries as a third campaign objective. We recognize that our responsibility to share the Gospel does not stop at the borders of the Michigan District. A financial goal of \$3 million has been set for the international ministries objective, which raises the total campaign goal to \$13 million.

The campaign progressed through a "quiet phase" in last half of 2007 and in 2008. In 2009 the campaign entered its congregational phase with the initial months of 2009 being utilized as preparation months to train and equip circuit coordinators, pastors, and lay leaders to communicate the processes of the congregational phase to the congregations of the Michigan District. It is our hope and prayer that each congregation of the Michigan District will participate by setting a financial goal and accomplishing it within a five year period. Congregations are asked to determine their goal during the 2009 calendar year (preferably by Advent) and then meet their commitment over the next five years, reaching goal achievement by the conclusion of 2014.

As *The Future is Now* campaign enters your congregation, the Michigan District respectfully asks for your faithful and generous participation by being an encouragement to the campaign through your prayer, by being a positive voice for the campaign through your communications with others, and by being a supporter of the campaign through your personal and congregational financial gifts.

We ask these things in grateful thanksgiving for the blessings our merciful and loving God has given to each of us. Our responsibility to the Great Commission is a GREAT responsibility. Through our partnership much can be accomplished for the sake of the Kingdom as we collectively work to build upon the foundation of our Church that was built by our forefathers. May God grant this for His sake.

The following provides a summary of the objectives of *The Future is Now*:

I. Intentional Mission Development - \$5,000,000 Goal

• Two to three New Mission Starts will be planted each year over the next five years, including one Urban Mission Start. Future plants being considered are Detroit, Eaton Rapids, Grass Lake,

Dundee, Fowlerville/Webberville, Holly, Madison Heights, Marysville, Novi, Okemos/Mason, Ypsilanti Township, and others.

- Target Communities with 60% or higher unchurched populations. Approximately six million people are unchurched in Michigan. Some counties are over 70% unchurched, and one is over 80%.
- The District supports new missions for 5-7 years with financial support totaling \$250,000 to \$500,000 or more for each mission start.
- \$1 million will be endowed for future years.
- Today, about 45 congregations exist that were planted since 1985.
- II. Professional Church Work Students \$5,000,000 Goal
 - The goal of this initiative of the Thank Offering is to increase the level of scholarships given to Michigan District students studying at a Concordia University System (CUS) school or one of our two Seminaries to become church workers.
 - We have an "aging workforce" in the District. We need to encourage more young men and women to consider a career in church work. Increasing aid will open doors for more students to consider this path.

The following chart shows the percentage of active ordained and commissioned workers per age bracket:

(We do not have on record the birth year of the other 9% of our ordained workers. The other 2% of commissioned workers are over the age of 65.)

The following is a breakdown of student aid distributed over the past 3 years. The Thank Offering will allow these amounts to continue to increase.

- A successful Thank Offering will allow the awards to average \$3,500 by 2015.
- \$2 million will be endowed for future PCW scholarships.

III. International Ministries - \$3,000,000 Goal

- 4.5 billion people in the world are unchurched (out of 6.5 billion)
- 66 out of 237 nations place significant restrictions on religious practice
- 1.2 billion Christians (60%) are nominal or non-practicing
- 72 million person population increase in the U.S. between 1970 and 2000.
- During the same time, LCMS membership decreased by 350,000.

Last year, in partnership with Concordia University Ann Arbor, we hosted An Evening of Laughter with Ken Davis, a fundraising event for the campaign. This year, we are hosting LOL - Laughing Out Loud with Taylor Mason. Funds raised from both events will be credited towards the mission planting and student scholarship initiatives of the campaign. As mentioned in the Ablaze report, funds raised through the past two torch relays and this year's torch relay will also go towards *The Future is Now*. Through these events, and the generosity of church groups, VBS children, congregations, RSOs, and many individuals a firm foundation has been laid for a successful campaign.


Financial/Congregation Contributions

Regular congregation unrestricted remittances to the Michigan District (including those designated for District use only) were \$5,673,211 in 2008 (fiscal year ending 1/31/09), \$171,264 down from the prior year. Congregation unrestricted remittances peaked at \$6.4 million in 2001. Congregation intentions for 2009 remain quite strong despite the current economic conditions in Michigan. Congregations also provide various other restricted support to the District, such as support for specific new church plants and contributions to the District's 125th Anniversary Thank Offering.

The Michigan District remitted 50% of the regular contributions from congregations (excluding those designated for District use only) to national Synod since 1999. In 2008, it increased that percentage to 50.5% in response to the decreasing national Synod budget.

From a historical perspective, congregation remittances have returned to the levels of giving in the late 1980s. Since 1987, the Consumer Price Index has risen 83%, cutting the purchasing power of the dollars remitted nearly in half. That equates to a shortfall of approximately \$4,600,000 in today's dollars which is not available from Michigan District congregations for Synodical and District Mission and Ministry. The accompanying chart compares the actual congregational remittances for national and District ministries compared to the 1987 receipts adjusted by the Consumer Price Index.

The District recognizes that congregations fund a number of mission and ministry opportunities in their own communities and worldwide, including direct funding of various Synodical ministries such as the seminaries, Concordia Universities, and World Missions. The District is thankful for the continued ministry it is able to do on behalf of the congregations of the District with the funds that are provided through the unrestricted District/Synod gift.

Michigan District Endowment

The Michigan District Board of Directors authorized the creation of an Endowment Fund to receive gifts to assist in the fulfillment of the Vision and Mission of the District. The Endowment is designed to support the key ministries of the District through unrestricted and restricted fund gifts. The unrestricted portion is for general projects in the District that align with the core values of the District. Additionally, there are two restricted funds. One is for the support of Intentional Mission Development within the Michigan District. The other is to provide scholarship opportunities for Michigan District students preparing for full time church work.

The Endowment Advisory Council (formerly the President's Advisory Council on Endowments) oversees the Michigan District Endowment. This seven member committee provides consultation in areas of investment, marketing, and distribution of the fund. Current growth of the endowment is primarily through the District's 125th Anniversary Thank Offering, The Future is Now. The council reviews the assets according to an investment policy. A portion of the Endowment is held at Church Extension Fund and the remainder is managed by professional money managers.

As a perpetual endowment of the Michigan District, this fund is prepared to receive gifts during your lifetime or at your death to fulfill the purposes named above. Those gifts may include but are not limited to:

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District Stewardship Leaders Conference - The Michigan District participates in the annual District Stewardship Leaders Conference held in Tempe, Arizona each February. The Conference is made up of the stewardship leaders of the various LCMS districts, along with Synodical and Seminary personnel to create and implement Stewardship strategies for the LCMS. Two representatives of our Committee attend each year. Rick Wolfram, the Michigan District's Stewardship Executive, serves on the steering committee for the DSLC, and has helped bring many biblically and doctrinally sound stewardship materials to our Michigan District.

Faith Aflame - Resolution 4-01 of the 2004 Synodical Convention instructed the LCMS to "…promote a unified stewardship education initiative entitled "Stewardship Ablaze" in 2006 to raise the awareness of faithful stewardship in all of the congregations…" The past three years has seen the DSLC, and our own Michigan District Stewardship Committee, make impressive strides in the work of reaching this goal. A five year stewardship initiative called "Faith Aflame" began in 2007, and was presented to our District through a series of eight regional training events in 2007 and 2008. Approximately 60 Michigan District congregations have participated in "Faith Aflame Year One". The "Year One" training events will continue in 2009, and "Year Two" training events are planned for 2010. The District Stewardship Committee encourages each congregation of the Michigan District to take advantage of this doctrinally sound, Lutheran approach to Christian Stewardship.



Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Congregations

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I. THEOLOGICAL RATIONALE

All baptized Christians are members of "The Body of Christ" and, therefore, also members of one another (Romans 12:5). As we gather in congregations around His Word and Sacraments, God gives each of us particular gifts to benefit all the members of His Body (Romans 12:6-8) and to bring the Gospel to the lost (Matthew 28:19-20).

To carry out this ministry of Word and Sacraments among us, God established the Office of the Holy Ministry. By extension, God also establishes, through the church, other offices as necessary to enable our congregations and schools to further this ministry (Acts 6:1-7). We read in Ephesians 4:11-12, *"[God] gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists and some to be pastors and teachers to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up."* Through congregations, God calls individuals to serve in these various offices (Pastors, Teachers, DCEs, Deaconesses, etc), that people may be strengthened in the faith and equipped to live out that faith in their daily lives. We believe that the Holy Spirit is actively involved in the call process. Therefore, in thankful response to God, and in fulfillment of Christ's will that we love one another, even as He loved us (John 13:34), members show their support for these church workers through respect, encouragement, gifts, and prayers, recognizing in them God's blessings to us (Philippians 4:14-19; Hebrews 13:17).

The purpose of this document is to help congregations understand and relate to their professional church workers and other staff and to sister congregations in the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod in ways that are healthy, God-pleasing, and beneficial to everyone, so that the work of the church may prosper to the glory of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Conduct and relations within the church reflect the "already-not yet" existence of the church on earth – already justified by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, but not yet free of the influence of sin and the power of the devil. Under the cross of Christ, both forgiven and forgiving, congregations and their professional church workers are called to live lives controlled by the Spirit (Romans 8:1-17). "Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Congregations" is written in the present tense, depicting the lives of congregations and professional church workers controlled by the Spirit as sanctified servants of Jesus Christ.

II. SEEKING A CHURCH WORKER

Ethical standards for congregations when calling or hiring a worker.

A. THE POSITION

Congregations prepare and provide a specific position description that fully and completely explains the position, qualifications required, expected results, to whom the worker will report, salary and benefits details, etc. This process assists candidates in considering the position and confirms why the congregation desires to fill the position to enhance its ministry or operations.

B. CANDIDATES

Congregations establish and follow a consistent policy when seeking or soliciting applicants. For ecclesiastical workers, this includes following District guidelines and working with appropriate District representatives when obtaining call lists or submitting names for inclusion on a call list. For all other workers, this includes using consistent procedures when hiring to ensure fairness (e.g., posting of openings, advertising, interview process, criminal background checks, etc.).

C. RECEIPT OF CANDIDATE INFORMATION

Congregations carefully guard all information and materials received from or about an applicant and hold this information in strict confidence. This includes information obtained at any phase of the process (e.g., application, references, criminal background checks, interview notes, performance reviews from prior employers or from District, etc.).

D. INTERVIEW PROCESS

Congregations conduct any interview process consistently and professionally, remembering it is the candidate's discretion to submit to an interview. When interviewing more than one candidate, congregations apply the same guidelines throughout the interview process to promote fairness (e.g., consistent length of interview, same questions, similar settings, etc.). Inquiries and visits outside of the authorized review process do not occur. Congregations establish policies in advance of a vacancy to facilitate consistency and fairness when a vacancy occurs.

E. HONEST AND FORTHRIGHT COMMUNICATION

Congregations provide honest and forthright information and responses about the position and general matters relating to a congregation. This means providing information about the anticipated term of the position, the requirement for additional training, work environment, how the position will enhance the congregation's ministry, impending departures or changes relating to other staff, why the last person in this position left (if applicable), and any other general issues or problems affecting the congregation (membership, personnel, or financial). Congregations fully explain the review process and timetable to be followed in issuing a call or hiring a worker and promptly respond to a candidate's inquiries during his/her deliberations.

F. TIMING AND PROXIMITY CONSIDERATIONS

Congregations are mindful of the effects of calling or hiring a worker from another congregation as it relates to (i) geographical proximity (e.g., a nearby church where members might "follow" a worker because of an established relationship) and (ii) timing (e.g., another congregation that is in a vacancy period that risks the loss of additional staff). Congregations promptly inform a candidate if he/she is no longer being considered.

G. DISCLOSING CANDIDATE INFORMATION

During and after the process, congregations hold all information obtained from or about candidates in strict confidence. Candidate information is not discussed or disclosed to outside entities (e.g., other congregations) or the congregation's membership except in established settings when candidates are being reviewed by committees or voters assemblies. Information is not discussed or disclosed with individual congregation members (i.e., gossip) other than as part of a legitimate review function. When the process is complete, information obtained about all candidates is shredded or disposed of in a manner that ensures this confidentiality.

H. CALL OR OFFER ACCEPTED

Upon acceptance of a call or offer, congregations assist the new worker in all phases of his/ her relocation. Congregations consider forming a welcoming committee, covering moving expenses, providing insight and assistance relating to the housing market and schools, assisting with family needs such as employment for a spouse to ensure a smooth transition and make the church worker and his/her family feel welcome.

I. PRAYER

Congregations prayerfully consider applicants and workers during all phases of a call or hiring process.

III. LIFE TOGETHER: PART I - CARE FOR WORKERS

Congregations work to enhance the environment of their professional church workers and all other staff, for this benefits the whole congregation (Hebrews 13:17b).

A. WORK ENVIRONMENT

To promote a healthy and pleasing atmosphere for all workers, the congregation:

- 1. Treats all staff members equally and fairly, considering their duties, expectations, and responsibilities in recognizing each of them as God's unique creation, with special gifts and needs.
- 2. Takes timely and appropriate action when necessary to help maintain staff morale.
- 3. Periodically reviews office environment and equipment to make sure everything is up to date, safe, clean, and operational.
- 4. Has a workable plan to provide substitutes to assume the duties of any staff member in an emergency without disruption of the congregation's ministry.
- 5. Analyze the effects of placing spouses of staff members in situations involving a "conflict of interest" through placement in elected/appointed positions of authority within a congregation's structure.

B. PROFESSIONAL GROWTH

To aid the church worker's growth in his/her respective duties, the congregation:

- 1. Authorizes the appropriate person to evaluate the worker's performance at regular intervals.
- 2. Conducts these evaluations in an objective and orderly fashion, in order to help the worker understand and fulfill his/her duties.
- 3. Periodically reviews and/or updates job descriptions for each position to accurately reflect the needs and expectations of the congregation.
- 4. Invites the current worker's input in any reworking of his/her job description.
- 5. Reissues the call or contract as the congregation's needs or expectations for the position change from the original call or contract.
- 6. Allows sufficient budget and in-service days to enable workers to ensure professional growth.
- 7. Makes use of the latest training tools available.
- 8. Reviews individual training needs with the worker at least annually.
- 9. Encourages its professional church workers to regularly meet with their respective peer groups for learning, support, and the exchange of ideas.

C. RESOURCES

To ensure that adequate resources are available to do the work of ministry, the congregation:

- 1. Is in agreement with the staff on the ministry plan and the resources required, and provides sufficient funds in the budget to support it.
- 2. Regularly reviews ministry plans and needs, and adequately prepares for future budget requirements.
- 3. Communicates to its members and staff, in a timely manner, any changes in ministry plans and the impact of those changes.
- 4. Includes a contingency line item in the budget, allocating a specific amount annually.
- 5. Provides adequate liability coverage for the church and staff to cover counseling and other activities.
- 6. Provides resources for workers to stay current with the ever-changing legal aspects of society.

D. COMPENSATION

The congregation has an established Compensation Policy covering all workers by:

- 1. Following published District compensation guidelines for all professional church workers.
- 2. Utilizing local pay scales and paying fair wages for all other workers, for "the laborer is worthy of his hire."
- 3. Establishing compensation guidelines for work required above and beyond normal duties or job expectations.
- 4. Budgeting funds to cover counseling or other professional help for the professional church worker.
- 5. Establishing compensation guidelines for situations in which a worker leaves his/her position.
- 6. Providing sufficient vacation time and appropriate work schedules for each worker, depending on his/her work status and level of experience.
- 7. Professional church worker compensation decisions should always include discussions related to retirement planning and pension programs.

IV. LIFE TOGETHER: PART II - SUPPORT FOR WORKERS

A. SPIRITUAL GROWTH

To allow for the spiritual growth of church workers, the congregation:

- 1. Encourages all workers to take time each day for prayer and devotions.
- 2. Provides funding to all workers for the purchase of resources to aid in their personal study of God's Word and growth in their relationship to the Lord.
- 3. Expects workers to be regularly involved in corporate worship and Bible study.

B. SUPPORT FOR HEALTHY FAMILY LIFE

To help foster positive and healthy family lives among the workers, the congregation:

- 1. Has a written policy providing adequate vacation time and/or appropriate work schedule for its workers, and encourages the members to respect those times.
- 2. Provides fair and adequate salaries.
- 3. Provide funding for workers and spouses to attend conferences that support healthy family life.
- 4. Prohibits expecting the church worker's spouse or family to be "unpaid employees" of the congregation.
- 5. Shows care and support for workers during times of illness, tragedy, distress, and dysfunction. When appropriate, encourages the worker to seek professional help, and provides the means to do so.
- 6. Shows appreciation for workers and has a uniform policy concerning congregationwide celebrations of significant anniversaries for years of service, etc.
- 7. Encourages workers to balance their family life with their professional responsibilities.

C. EMPLOYING MORE THAN ONE FAMILY MEMBER ON STAFF

To avoid potential misunderstandings or conflicts, the congregation:

- 1. Has clear job descriptions and lines of accountability in place for each worker.
- 2. Is above board in the calling or hiring process to avoid the appearance of manipulation by the worker to get a family member on staff.
- 3. Pays the same wage and benefit package to the spouse or family member that it would anyone else in that same position.
- 4. Uses caution in placing family members in staff positions which give the appearance of nepotism or monopolizing control of the ministry.
- D. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

When disputes involving staff members arise, the congregation:

- 1. Follows our Lord's direction in Matthew 18 in a spirit of love and humility, with individuals first speaking with the church worker directly rather than complaining to other members of the congregation.
- 2. Involves those overseeing the worker, with the worker present, if the conflict remains unresolved.
- 3. Seeks, in the case of professional church workers, additional help from the Circuit Counselor, Congregation Ministry Facilitators and, lastly, the District President, to resolve the conflict. With other hired staff, the congregation's constitution or hiring policies manual is followed. The congregation deals fairly and in Christian love with all workers.
- 4. Absolutely avoids holding secret meetings or telephone or anonymous letter-writing and petition campaigns against the worker in question.
- 5. Refers, in cases of severe disputes between a professional church worker and the congregation, to the Synod's Handbook (Bylaw 1.10), which provides guidance on the proper procedures for resolving such disputes.

E. CONFIDENTIALITY

Because church workers may deal with information of a confidential nature, the congregation:

- 1. Avoids divulging confidential or personal information shared by the worker to individuals or boards without the worker's permission.
- 2. Does not demand that workers divulge information shared with them confidentially.
- 3. Protects the worker's personnel files and other private information from unauthorized access.

F. COMMUNITY LIFE

The worker's involvement in the larger community can have positive effects for the worker and congregation. Therefore, the congregation:

- 1. Supports its workers' involvement in the community, as long as it does not compromise God's Word and the work of the church.
- 2. Addresses negative comments from members who feel that the worker should be involved only in congregational life.
- 3. Is willing to resolve with the worker any real problems arising from his/her involvement in the community that cause their work or witness in the congregation to suffer.

V. WHEN A CHURCH WORKER LEAVES

Congregations conduct themselves in an ethical manner when a church worker leaves. The congregation:

- A. Publicly announces the departure of a worker in a timely and appropriate manner.
- B. Appropriately recognizes the worker's service and gives proper honor to his/her family.
- C. Keeps confidential any sensitive matters and issues surrounding the worker's departure, disclosing only what is necessary, remembering the Biblical injunction to speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15). In obedience to the Eighth Commandment, we do not "slander him or hurt his reputation . . . but put the best construction on everything."
- D. Meets any appropriate obligations to the family of the worker (in cases such as the death of the worker, disability, or divorce).
- E. Gives adequate and proper compensation to the worker who is asked to leave, leaves due to a disabling illness or injury, or leaves as a result of reduction of staff.
- F. Gives adequate advance notice to the worker in cases of reduction of staff to allow him/her sufficient time to seek a position elsewhere. The truthful reasons for the reduction in staff are communicated to the worker.
- G. Creates appropriate procedures to respond to the departure of a worker (such as retirement, removal, accepting a call, disability, or death).

VI. RELATING TO CONGREGATIONS, DISTRICT, AND SYNOD

"Synod" implies a coming together of groups of people. Because the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod has a rich tradition of "walking together," Michigan District congregations show love, concern, and respect for one another, District, and Synod.

The congregation:

- A. Prays for leaders of Synod, District, and neighboring congregations during worship services.
- B. Follows the Eighth Commandment when talking about church leaders at the local, District, and Synodical level.
- C. Communicates and works with neighboring congregational leaders about opportunities and challenges to Kingdom growth in the circuit.
- D. Celebrates in prayer, word, and actions the successes of neighboring congregations and their leaders.
- E. Provides financial support for the mission and ministry of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, channeling gifts for the mission and ministry of Synod through the District Office.
- F. Avoids calling workers from neighboring congregations.
- G. Considers the impact and uses caution before calling more than one professional worker from any one congregation.
- H. Does not pursue members from neighboring sister congregations, and considers the impact and uses caution before granting or accepting transfers.
- I. Honors the church discipline exercised by sister congregations.
- J. Seeks assistance from District officials with expertise in areas of congregational interest.

Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Professional Church Workers

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INTRODUCTION

The Christian's ethic is to live by faith in Christ even as Christ lives in us. We repent daily and believe the Gospel, trusting in its sure promises: through Baptism God makes us His holy people; in the Lord's Supper God feeds us with the holy food of heaven for life on earth. God's Word has been fulfilled: *"I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy"* (Exodus 33:19, RSV).

"Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Professional Church Workers" is not about what we do for God, but about what God has done on the cross and how that applies to us. The death of Jesus on the cross transforms our lives, and the Holy Spirit makes Jesus' death applicable for holy living. As Christians, then, we are holy people living holy lives.¹

The central principle of Lutheran ethics is identical with the central principle of Lutheran theology: justification by grace through faith on account of Christ.²

Conduct and relations within the church reflect the "already-not yet" existence of the church on earth – already justified by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, but not yet free of the influence of sin and the power of the devil. Under the cross of Christ, both forgiven and forgiving, congregations and their professional church workers are called to live lives controlled by the Spirit (Romans 8:1-17). "Partners in Ministry: Ethical Conduct for Professional Church Workers" is written in the present tense, depicting the lives of congregations and professional church workers controlled by the Spirit as sanctified servants of Jesus Christ.

St. Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "So then, men ought to regard us as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the secret things of God. Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:1-2, NIV). Following St. Paul's dictum, the purpose of this document is to guide professional church workers in remaining faithful to the trust given to them by God and the people who have called them by defining an ethics policy for professional church workers in the Michigan District of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod. While the intent of this document is to provide ethical guidelines for all professional church workers it also will, God willing, have application for all congregation workers.

I. PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

The purpose of this document is not to be a moralistic code or to be used to force submission by those in authority. Rather it is intended as a helpful look at our commitments as shepherds and servants of God's flock with the following purposes:

- A. An examination and reminder of biblically mandated principles for pastors and other professional church workers.
- B. A tool for personal evaluation, examination, and reflection.
- C. An opportunity for encouragement of continuing dialogue and mutual ministry among professional workers.
- D. A vehicle for reaffirming one's dependence on the grace and power of God.
- E. A way of examining new possibilities for growth in the conduct of one's ministry.
- F. A way for professional church workers to grow by the Gospel's power into more principled, committed, and grace-filled servants of Christ for the sake of the Gospel, the Church, and its Mission.

II. BASIC FOUNDATIONS FOR ETHICAL CONDUCT

- A. The professional church worker remains faithful to the Triune God and His baptismal covenant. According to Luther's Small Catechism, "The Old Adam in us should, by daily contrition and repentance, be drowned and die with all sins and evil lusts and, again, a new man daily come forth and arise, who shall live before God in righteousness and purity forever."³
- B. The professional church worker honors his Confirmation commitment "to conform all (his/ her) life to the divine Word, to be faithful in the use of God's Word and sacraments, which are His means of grace, and in faith, word, and action to remain true to God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, even to death."ⁱ
- C. The professional church worker honors his/her installation vows "to be faithful to the canoni cal books of the Old and New Testaments as the inspired Word of God and the only infallible rule of faith and practice and to be faithful to the three Ecumenical Creeds and the Lutheran Confessions."⁵
- D. The professional church worker honors the specific duties of the particular call that the Holy Spirit has led him/her to accept.

III. PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCT

A. The professional church worker is committed to **personal and corporate spiritual life**.

- 1. He/she spends time in personal Bible study, Catechism study, and prayer.
- 2. He/she expresses commitment to Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions.
- 3. He/she is faithful in corporate worship and Bible study.
- 4. He/she models the servant role, following Jesus' example (John 13:1-17).
- B. The professional church worker is committed to his/her **spouse and family**.
 - 1. The worker may remain single and fill his/her life with commitments to parents, brothers, sisters, and other close relatives and friends within the congregation or without. Whether single or married, he/she is be above reproach, which means his/ her life and conduct are shaped by his/her commitment to Christ.
 - 2. A married church worker views his/her marriage as a blessing and responsibility. His/her conduct in marriage is an example to the congregation.
 - 3. For the sake of his/her family, the professional church worker blessed with children is a responsible, loving, Gospel-centered, caring parent.
 - 4. The professional church worker views his/her family as a God-given responsibility and allocates his/her time accordingly.
 - 5. The church worker seeks personal, spiritual, and professional help when encountering problems in his/her marriage or family life, using appropriate resources. Church workers are aware of the implications of the Council of Presidents document, Guidelines for Dealing with Marital Crisis Involving Separation and Divorce.⁶ (See District Website for counseling resources)
- C. The professional church worker is committed to relationships within the congregation.
 - 1. Professional church workers understand the role of the pastor as spiritual leader of the congregation and support and encourage the work of the pastor and all other professional staff members.
 - 2. Professional church workers support the role of the laity, encouraging the development of lay leadership.
 - 3. When dealing with those entrusted to his/her care, the professional church worker will assume the role of servant.
 - 4. The professional church worker shows respect for all cultures, recognizing each member of the congregation as a baptized and valued child of God and seeking to understand the diversity that is present.

5. Professional church workers engage in direct and mutual conversation and support with colleagues and, for the sake of reconciliation and growth, speak the Word of the Lord directly to one another. (Matthew 18; Ephesians 4:2; 2 Timothy 3:16,17; Colossians 3)

6. Disagreements among professional church workers are resolved in a manner that demonstrates an understanding of Confession and Absolution as a model for reconciliation in the Body of Christ.

7. The professional church worker respects and protects confidential information shared by colleagues in the course of personal and professional relationships and transactions. When disclosure of confidential information is legally required, the professional church worker does so to the proper civil authorities, attempting first to inform the colleague of this action. If you have questions or concerns regarding confidentiality, contact the District Office for guidance.

- 8. When a professional church worker has direct knowledge of a colleague's incompetence, impairment, false teaching, immoral or unethical behavior, he/she offers assistance to the individual in the spirit of Christian fellowship as presented in Matthew 18. Situations are disclosed or reported to civil and/or synodical authorities as required by law or synodical guidelines.
- 9. The professional church worker defends, supports, and assists colleagues who are unjustly charged.
- D. The professional church worker is committed to relationships in the **community and the** wider church.
 - 1. The professional church worker is in a special relationship with his/her fellow church workers in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. He/she makes every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace (Ephesians 4:3).
 - 2. The professional church worker consults with his/her fellow church workers in their congregation, circuit, and District when making difficult decisions or decisions that affect the public witness and practice of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.
 - 3. The professional church worker recognizes that he/she is called to his/her congregation and to no other. He/she does not counsel members of other congregations or perform pastoral functions for them without their pastor's permission. He/she does not criticize other congregations or their staff.
 - 4. Professional church workers who have moved from a congregation or retired from active ministry avoid exercising influence or offering opinions of a professional nature where they have no call.
 - 5. Professional church workers, in "walking together" in our Synod, honor commitments corporately made through the conventions of the District and Synod, especially those expressed in the constitution and by-laws.
 - 6. The professional church worker respects those who have been placed above him/her and honors their authority as ecclesiastical supervisors. Each professional church worker serves as part of the public ministry of the Church under the doctrinal oversight of the Pastoral Office and within the administrative structure of the congregation.
 - 7. The professional church worker is involved in his/her community, weighing this involvement's effect on his/her ministry. He/she examines the time commitments involved as they affect his/her family. He/she seeks the advice and counsel of congregational leadership and avoids activity that will lead to a compromise of his/ her ministry and calling.
- E. The professional church worker is committed to appropriate social behavior.
 - 1. The professional church worker honors the sixth commandment and its meaning as he/she recognizes his/her own sexuality, remembering that the ultimate gift of sexual expression is found only in marriage.
 - 2. The professional church worker avoids pornography and impure speech and refrains from inappropriate physical contact.
 - 3. The professional church worker uses common sense and care lest he/she give offense when dealing with members of the opposite sex and with children.
 - 4. The professional church worker recognizes that the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod considers homosexual propensity to be a result of our fallen nature and has refused to sanction for ministry those who are practicing homosexuals.

- 5. The professional church worker recognizes that there are times when church professionals may engage in behavior that, although not sin, may cause offense to the weak Christian or misunderstanding to the unbeliever. He/she is aware that his/her public behavior is representative of their position and as such he/she is never a "private citizen."
- F. The professional church worker is committed to appropriate speech and actions.
 - 1. The professional church worker does not divulge confidential information. He/she does not identify names when discussing a case with his/her peers nor share these confidences with his/her spouse or staff. He/she carries out his/her legal responsibilities concerning confidentiality.
 - 2. The professional church worker honors the spirit of the Second Commandment. He/she avoids the use of profanity, vulgar words and phrases, and off-color jokes and stories.
 - 3. The professional church worker avoids losing his/her temper and exploding with rage.
 - 4. The professional church worker avoids language that stereotypes people by economic or social class, sex, race, age, or religion. He/she avoids racial slurs, jokes, and stories that are degrading and dehumanizing. In conversation with the opposite sex, he/she avoids terms of endearment that should properly be reserved for his/her spouse.
 - 5. The professional church worker speaks truthfully and avoids deceit of all kinds. He/ she does not let his/her silence on a matter be a means of deception.
 - 6. The professional church worker puts the best construction on the actions of fellow church workers, always being careful to avoid breaking the Eighth Commandment.
 - 7. The professional church worker speaks well of congregation members and continually prays to the Lord on their behalf.
- G. The professional church worker is committed to the **stewardship of his/her own body**.
 - 1. The professional church worker seeks to practice proper hygiene and wear proper attire that does not give offense in the specific context of ministry.
 - 2. The professional church worker is aware of the dangers of substance abuse and avoids using legal substances in excess. He/she always avoids illegal drugs.
 - 3. The professional church worker does not allow any activity to progress to the point of excess and the neglect of his/her calling. He/she carefully weighs his/her activities based on comments from family, peers, and congregational leaders.
 - 4. The professional church worker avoids becoming a "workaholic." He/she schedules time with family, for vacations, for physical exercise, for hobbies and avocations.

5. The professional church worker avoids addictive and abusive behavior that will hurt self or others while giving offense to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and always seeks support for the healing process.

- H. The professional church worker is committed to faithful **stewardship of time, talent, and treasures**.
 - 1. The professional church worker avoids undue and offensive dependence on material possessions.
 - 2. The professional church worker avoids inaccurate and unscrupulous reporting of income for the purposes of taxation.

- 3. The professional church worker avoids indifference and neglect toward personal obligations and debts.
- 4. The professional church worker avoids inappropriate use of another's property, including borrowing money from congregational members, not returning borrowed objects, and considering the church's property his/her own.
- 5. The professional church worker avoids unnecessarily handling church funds and the funds of others.
- 6. The professional church worker manages his/her own household finances in such a way as to model Biblical stewardship and to demonstrate sound fiscal management.
- 7. The professional church worker strives to maintain faithfulness to the observance of a healthy stewardship of work and life as addressed in the Third and Seventh Commandments.
- I. The professional church worker is committed to **competency in ministry**.
 - 1. The professional church worker continues to study and pursue his/her education for the sake of ministry.
 - 2. The professional church worker manages his/her time properly. He/she performs in a self-directed manner.
 - 3. The professional church worker welcomes an assessment of his/her ministry. He/ she asks for help in this assessment from his/her peers, selected members of his/her congregation, and the District President or staff.
 - 4. The professional church worker tries to maintain a realistic view of his/her skills and training and their limitations. He/she refers people to other professionals (psycholo gists, counselors, etc.) when helpful and necessary. He/she seeks written permission from a congregational member to disclose information when a referral is made to another professional.
 - 5. The professional church worker takes the time and effort necessary to prepare adequately for the daily tasks of his/her ministry.
 - 6. The professional church worker prayerfully and enthusiastically does the whole ministry to which he/she has been called and accepts responsibility for any activity that directly or indirectly relates to his/her job description.
 - 7. The professional church worker is alert to and seeks to prevent conflicts of interest that interfere with the exercise of professional discretion, impartial judgment, and a full teaching of the Word of God. He/she informs the parishioner when a real or potential conflict of personal, political, or business interests arises and, if necessary, refers the parishioner to another professional staff member.
 - 8. The professional church worker is intellectually honest, observing copyright laws, avoiding any hint of plagiarism, and giving credit where credit is due.

IV. ADDITIONAL SPECIFIC GUIDELINES FOR ORDAINED MINISTERS OF THE GOSPEL

- A. The pastor honors his ordination and installation vows to be faithful to the canonical books of the Old and New Testaments as "the inspired Word of God and the only infallible rule of faith and practice, to be faithful to the three Ecumenical Creeds and the Lutheran Confessions, to instruct young and old, to forgive sins of those who repent, to never divulge the sins confessed, to minister faithfully to the sick and dying, to admonish the people to a lively confidence in Christ and holy living and to adorn the office of the public ministry with a holy life."
- B. The pastor proclaims the whole will and counsel of God.

V. ADDITIONAL SPECIFIC GUIDELINES FOR LUTHERAN TEACHING MINISTERS

- A. In his/her **personal conduct**, the Lutheran teacher:
 - 1. Demonstrates the gift of teaching.
 - 2. Uses Christ-centered teaching styles.
 - 3. Intentionally and deliberately integrates faith into all areas of the curriculum.
 - 4. Nurtures the faith development of all children.
 - 5. Reaches out to those families who are not yet disciples.
 - 6. Maintains proper credentials/certification and licensure.
- B. In his/her relationship with students, the Lutheran teacher:
 - 1. Works in the best interest of the child.
 - 2. Demonstrates fair and impartial grading.
 - 3. Shows no favoritism, but demonstrates love and concern for all students.
 - 4. Creates a positive and safe learning environment.
 - 5. Respects the integrity of all students.
 - 6. Reports any suspected abuse to proper authorities.
 - 7. Fosters positive and respectful interaction with students.
 - 8. Disciplines in God-pleasing ways.
 - 9. Avoids the acceptance of money for additional tutoring of own students unless Board policy allows otherwise.
- C. In his/her relationship with parents, the Lutheran teacher:
 - 1. Treats all parents with respect.
 - 2. Is approachable and accessible.
 - 3. Communicates appropriate concerns.
 - 4. Assists with training each child.
