Praising God for a Successful Campaign

The Here We Stand campaign began in ▲ 2015 with a lofty goal of \$10 million to fund Michigan District ministry. On April 4, 2022 the campaign reached its goal-and it is still growing.

Ray Zavada, Assistant to the President -Development, is the driving force behind the campaign, but he humbly chooses to highlight all the additional people who made it happen-

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the 2015 Convention delegates who voted in favor of starting a new campaign, the Blueprint and Steering Committee members who put their heads together and helped shape the campaign and its goals, the thousands of donors who contributed (and are still contributing), and the Church Extension Fund, our faithful ministry partner.

The four initiatives of *Here We Stand* are: Professional Church Worker Scholarships, Innovative Missional Ministries, Endowment Fund, and International Ministries. One of the great things about this campaign is the fact that you can choose where you want your money to go. Zavada says that "having that ability to determine where you want your dollars to go is important to donors. They could support one, two, three, or all four of the initiatives as they chose. And I promise you, as they indicated how they wanted their dollars to be given and then eventually spent, it was done that way."

Zavada says that support for Professional Church Workers "has always been a priority for those in our district but, as it turned out, the second category— Innovative Missional Ministry-ended up being the area that our membership and our congregations gravitated towards." The Endowment fund makes sure fundings are always available for future ministry, and the donors' response to that initiative was about what the committee had expected. But what really surprised everyone was the International Ministries Initiative, which got a tremendous level of support. Reflecting on the success of all four initiatives, Zavada concludes: "All of those things came together because people put their heads together and prayed and asked, 'What is going to make an impact for future ministry here and beyond the Michigan District?'"

Four and a half million dollars has already been raised for Innovative Missional Ministries. Those dollars serve to fund initiatives under Acts 2 Enterprise or A2E an urban ministry initiative umbrella serving Detroit, Flint, Pontiac, Benton Harbor, and Grand Rapids. The A2E ministries have already received some funds from the campaign, and there is money allocated for the next 5-8 years to provide for ministry in those urban areas. Regarding the work carried out by pastors Christopher Bodley (Detroit), Christian Jones (Flint), Chris Jung (Pontiac) and others, Zavada says, "We call the category Innovative Missional Ministry, but they take it to the next level and implement those within their communities. So whatever they need financial support for, we're here to try to provide so they can carry out their vision for their ministries."

The generosity of Michigan District donors has been outstanding. Zavada said that at one point during the pandemic he was really worried, wondering if and how congregations and individuals would be able to respond and continue to fund the campaign at a level that would take it to the goal and hopefully exceed it. He concludes: "But they did. The donors of the Michigan District are generous, generous people. They respond when there's a need to respond and they respond at high levels."

Michigan District President, Rev. Dr. David P. E. Maier adds, "When you start and you realize that this campaign is coming on the heels of a previous campaign, you wonder how successful it's going to be ... and then Covid hits! That did lengthen the campaign a bit, but Ray Zavada is a gem. He loves the Lord, and I know he and [his wife] Cindy have prayed for this campaign, but to see some of the larger gifts come in that enabled us to get past the \$10 million dollar mark is amazing. And the fact that the Church Extension Fund is a part of that—every million dollar we collect, they give us \$100,000—what a generous, God-blessed ministry they are."

The support from Church Extension Fund (CEF) was trifold. Not only did it provide the 10% match in donations, but it also gave the District a grant of \$350,000 to cover campaign expenses so that every dollar donated would go towards its intended goal. Additionally, CEF covered all expenses of the 2017 celebratory worship service held at the Breslin Center in Lansing to mark the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation—a memorable event that had over 13,000 people in attendance.

During the upcoming Michigan District Convention, Zavada will give a final report on the campaign, in what he calls a "soft closing"—the real closing will happen when people no longer donate. So the campaign continues, and you may still contribute. To donate online, go

President Maier concludes, "With the congregations that were involved* and the individual donors who were excited about the various goals, to cross the finish line of \$10 million and to still reach for more is a tremendous blessing of the Lord, and I think it's a benediction upon the ministries that the Michigan District is conducting. We did not seek God's blessing upon what we were doing—we wanted to seek God first and do what He wanted to bless. And I really believe that is what has been taking place here. May God be praised for His goodness and generosity through His people."

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Following the Leader

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life'" (John 8:12).

July 4 is a day of national celebration, where we praise the work of our nation's forefathers who relieved our ancestors from the oppression of the tyranny in Great Britain. As we enjoy barbecues, fires, and fireworks, we revel in the collective pride we take in our freedoms. Yet these days, as our thoughts turn to current leaders, this pride can seem soured or even misplaced. More now than ever, citizens see the flaws in leaders, justified or otherwise. And this makes it hard for some to follow any leader at all.

This got me thinking about what it means to follow, both as citizens and as Christians. As a kid, I often played the game "follow the leader" with some of my elementary school friends. The rules of the game were simple. One person-the leader-would start off on a journey, and everyone else-the followers-would have to do exactly as the leader did. If the leader went down a slide, so did the followers. No matter where the leader went, the followers had to, well, follow. And if you didn't follow, or couldn't follow, you would lose and have to wait until the next game started. If you can't picture my elementary school days, go and watch Disney's Peter Pan where John Darling leads the lost boys in a game of "follow the leader" while singing. They walk through thick jungle, over fallen trees, and even underwater! But none of them break stride; they all follow their leader to the letter throughout the whole journey.

As adults, we see many problems with translating this mindset into maturity. For children, following a leader is easy. No child will lead their friend into any real danger. On top of that, children need someone to lead them, since they are still learning about the world around them. But adults are much more wary. We see the darker side of this world and we raise our defenses. We become more self-reliant, more independent, and as such it becomes difficult to follow anyone blindly. There is so much mistrust of others that we're tempted (and sometimes encouraged) to blaze our own trail and disregard leaders, especially if their character is in question. We know it's foolish to follow any person blindly. "Follow the leader" doesn't translate well into adulthood.

Yet it needs to translate into the Christian life. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus calls His disciples from all different situations to drop what they are doing and follow Him. No hesitation, no delay, and no questions asked. Any after-school special would place this scenario under "stranger danger" and warn kids to avoid such a man. In truth, this is how many people view the call to follow Jesus. To follow any person blindly can have disastrous consequences, as history has shown us.

He is the *perfect leader*, the One who will never lead you astray into darkness but will lead you into the *light of life everlasting*.

But we Christians must be the voice that reminds the world that Jesus is not just any person. He is not just any man. John 8 tells us who Jesus is: He is the light of the world, the light shining in the darkness. He is not selfish like earthly leaders, nor is He driven by greed or any vice. Jesus stepped into the darkness of sin in our world for our sake, not His own. He suffered the pain and mockery of the crowds and willingly suffered death on the cross so that we could be forgiven of sins. And He rose again and ascended into heaven that He might prepare a place for us, so that when He returns He can take us to be with Him forever. Jesus is not like an earthly leader; He is the perfect leader, the One who will never lead you astray into darkness but will lead you into the light of life everlasting.

It's easy to mistrust people who ask you to follow them blindly. We know from experience how nasty and evil people can be. But even as we remain wary of the world, may we never be wary of Christ's call to follow. He is the only One worthy of our full devotion, and all who follow Him can be certain that He will always lead them on the right path.

POBLO International has not only been able to speak to the needs of the hearts of God's people but also to answer the needs of their earthly lives.

The refugee families and individuals that POBLO International is privileged to assist have missed many comforts that are common to us here in the United States. In addition to lacking basic education, being able to live in a bustling yet peaceful neighborhood, or even being able to make

• The instruction to us is clear: we are to be the hands and feet of Jesus, reaching out to share the Gospel of hope and salvation and stretching forth to meet the physical needs of His people. a quick department store run for toilet paper or baby food, these families also miss the chance to maintain basic health care, such as the annual doctors' visits or dental appointments that we often dread.

POBLO International's efforts were blessed when a medical and dental care clinic reached out from an article they had read in a local community paper. The clinic's lead doctor and the executive director, both sisters in Christ as we came to learn, exclaimed that they had been looking for a way to bless those in the community who lacked the financial resources to provide much needed medical or dental care for themselves. Going without this care could mean aggravated or worsening medical conditions that could even progress to the point of hindering the refugees' ability to work and provide for their households.

After coordinating efforts, POBLO International and its new partner in human care services, Trinity Community Care, hosted their first pop-up clinic at the Dearborn International Friendship Center (IFC) location! Nearly 50 refugee families from Afghanistan were provided free health checkups (blood pressure and glucose), medical information and education, and health maintenance items like toothbrushes and travel hand sanitizer. Not only were refugee individuals able to see healthcare providers free of charge, but they will also have the opportunity for follow-up and additional care—all at no cost.

POBLO is thankful for these opportunities to honor God by serving the 'least of these' and thanks God for you, partners in this appointed Gospel mission. Please know that you are prayed for regularly. We offer thanksgiving to God daily that He sent His provision ahead of this ministry in having you join with us to love His people back to health not only in word, but also in deed. POBLO is so grateful to its dear brothers and sisters in Christ for prayers, for fellowship, and for continued support and partnership in this ministry.

POBLO wants to share the goodness and provision of the Lord as has been humbly provided for the care of others. God bless you!

Meet Julie Burgess, our District's Gift Planning Counselor. CEF, in partnership with the LCMS Foundation, offers you Julie's services in planning how to continue directing your earthly blessings to the people and ministries you love for long after you've passed. "Your lifetime plan for giving is a spiritual journey in stewardship," says Julie. Here she answers some frequently asked questions about creating a Christian gift plan:

Julie, do I truly have the wherewithal to support ministries through my estate?

"Many people don't realize they have enough wealth to bequest a significant amount to a favorite ministry. Today, many assets for most people are 'non-cash'. Whether our wealth is in retirement accounts, life insurance, our homes, or other properties, when we leave this Earth, we often have far greater blessings than we ever thought."

How can I feel sure I'm making the most of my gifts?

"We can structure how you'll leave assets in ways that minimize taxes on your estate. This can enable you to do more with your blessings. For example, using a charitable remainder trust, your gift plan could provide the same amounts to your heirs while also letting you make a substantial gift to the Lutheran ministry or charity of your choice. Since we all have gifts from God, even the humblest bequests can make a difference."

What if I already have a will or a trust?

"Good for you! You've looked ahead. I can review your plan to be sure your bequests to loved ones and ministries are in proper order. This will help to ensure that, when you're called home, what you leave will bless your family and faith well into the future."

What I especially want from my gift plan is peace of mind. Can you help with this?

"Absolutely! And I'll be happy to. We'll plan how to provide for and protect your family while supporting the ministries you've cared most about in life. I can provide a list of qualified attorneys in your area. If you'd like me to join you in your estate meetings with your attorney, I'll do so at no charge."

Mission Work in China and South Korea

Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) has had unique ministry outreach in foreign countries. For example, LHM has never operated a ministry center in China, yet it has been a partner in God's mission and work together with the national China Christian Council (CCC) and Three-Self Patriotic Movement (TSPM) of the national protestant church since 1988.

Faithful LHM donors provided the funds to build the Ai Ji (Love of Christ) printing factory in Shanghai. It was dedicated for God's glory and handed over to the CCC/TSPM in 1997.

China Ministry programs that are supported by LHM include:

- Printed Christian materials such as books, booklets, and tracts;
- MP3 audio Bible players;
- Special events that feature animation DVDs and colorful cartoon books;
- Evangelist training service (ETS) in six provinces (Guangdong, Hebei, Henan, Hubei, Yunnan, JingXi and Inner Mongolia);
- A special evangelist rally; and

Bible distributions to the poor.

Since its reopening in 2003, the LHM center in South Korea, known as



Korea Lutheran Hour (KLH), has been working to spread the Gospel and to create a youthful vibrancy within the church there. The Christian culture resources produced by KLH are valuable evangelistic tools reflecting Korean traditions. KLH carries out LHM's mission of proclaiming, equipping, and engaging through various outreach ministries. Theatre and music events sponsored by KLH provide opportunities for non-Christians to connect with Christians and local Lutheran congregations. Christian "Jazz & Vespers" performances attract attention from the public as well as local media. In addition, KLH ministers to the Korean people through its website, newsletter, videos, and books. KLH is also taking steps to spread the Gospel in North Korea as well as in China.

Guardian, Dearborn Celebrates its 75th Anniversary

Guardian, Dearborn will celebrate its 75th Anniversary on Sunday, September 18, at a 10 a.m. worship service with a dinner to follow at noon.

Pastor Gregory Seltz, a son of the congregation who serves as the Director of the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty in Washington, D.C. will be the guest preacher for the service.



Dr. John Boonenberg of Concordia University Ann Arbor, former Music Director of the congregation, will be the guest organist and Music Director for the service.

The congregation was founded in 1947 and met at a local school until the original chapel, located on Cherry Hill Street in West Dearborn, was dedicated in 1948. Rev. Theophil H. Voss founded the congregation and served Guardian as its pastor from 1947 to 1974. A Parish Hall (Gym) was built in 1954 and the congregation worshiped in the dual use space until the current sanctuary was completed in 1969. A mid-century modern structure, Guardian's unique cross with rays suspended over the altar is a striking feature of the sanctuary and quite bold for its time.

The congregation began a Christian day school 1959 with 33 students in grades one through four. Today, there are over 250 children enrolled in Preschool through 8th Grade.

Update on Supreme Court Leak on Abortion Decision

While those who are pro-life have yearned for the day when *Roe v. Wade* is overturned, we must be cautious and wait until the Supreme Court officially releases any decision on the Dobbs case. Even though a draft opinion has been leaked to the public showing that, as of February, the Court was poised to overturn Roe, this is *not* the final decision, and votes can still be changed. The leak could be a pro-abortion staff member's last-ditched effort to save *Roe v. Wade*. An investigation has ensued.

While the draft sounds hopeful, we will need to wait for the final decision by the court to be released. If *Roe v. Wade* is indeed overturned, then the issue will be returned to the states and to the voters. In Michigan, we already have a law that would go into effect banning abortion except to save the life of the mother. Of course, this will be challenged by those who wish to defend he "right to kill" babies in the womb. There is already a petition drive underway in Michigan to enshrine abortion in the State Constitution. If this petition comes to you, **please do not sign it**, and advise others not to sign it either. If passed, it would even strike down any and all restrictions that we have been able to put in place, including parental consent laws.

As God's people, we must stand fast in defense of innocent human life and be the voice for the voiceless. The battle for Life will not end even if and when *Roe v. Wade* is overturned. We need to continue to pray—for the Justices, for the nation, for our State leaders, for women facing a crisis pregnancy, and of course, for the unborn babies who are such helpless victims in the plague of abortion. *Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer!*

Immanuel, Frankentrost Celebrates 175 Years

Immanuel (Frankentrost), Saginaw celebrates 175 years of God's blessings in 2022.

The colony of Frankentrost, which means the comfort, or consolation, of the Franconians was formed by Rev. Wilhelm Loehe of Neuendettelsau, Bavaria, Germany, to establish German Lutheran settlements in America and as centers of mission activity to Native Americans. Settled in 1847, Frankentrost is the second of the four Franconian Colonies established in Michigan's Saginaw Valley.

Rev. Loehe chose candidate Johann Heinrich Phillip Graebner to be the pastor of 22 families of colonists and lead them to their new home. The first years came with many hardships as they settled in the primeval forest with roaming wild animals including wolves, bears, and deer. There were also illnesses and death, especially of children, that made those first years difficult.

The first church services were held in a member's primitive log home until a log church was built in 1848. Quickly outgrowing that first building, a larger church was built in 1852, and in 1869 a beautiful white frame church was completed. Sadly, this church was

destroyed by fire on January 6, 1951. On October 12, 1952, Immanuel's present church was dedicated. The congregation began instructing their children in 1847 and continues to share the love of the Savior in their Preschool–8th grade Christian day school, as well as in their childcare program.

Amid all the Frankentrost colonist's tribulations, they never lost faith or became discouraged, as they always had God's Word by which they were comforted. The theme for this anniversary year is Isaiah 40:1 "Comfort, comfort my people, says your God."
