Description: The focus of this session is on the importance of pastors and other church workers developing a referral network of mental health professionals in their community or region to whom they can refer individuals, couples, and families for care that may be beyond the scope of the training, competency, availability, experience, vocation, or comfort-level of the pastor or other church professional. Special attention will be paid to issues such as boundaries, the person of the caregiver, avoiding compassion fatigue and burnout, dual relationships, mandated reporting, and ethics in caregiving.
