



Keynote Speakers



Rev. Dr. Jeffrey J. Kloha

Dr. Jeffrey Kloha joined the Museum of the Bible in the summer of 2017. He manages the Museum of the Bible Education, Scholars Initiative, Exhibits, Curatorial, and Collections departments. Kloha previously served 18 years as professor of New Testament as well as provost/chief academic officer at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of Leeds. Kloha is co-editor of *Texts and Traditions: Essays in Honour of J. K. Elliott* (Brill, 2014) and *The Press of the Text: Biblical Studies in Honor of James W. Voelz* (Pickwick, 2017). He is a frequent conference presenter, radio guest, and television documentary commentator.



Dr. Thad A. Polk

Dr. Thad A. Polk is the Samuel D. Epstein Collegiate Professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of Michigan. His research combines functional imaging of the human brain with computational modeling and behavioral methods to investigate the neural architecture underlying cognition. Prof. Polk regularly teaches large lecture courses as well as small seminars on topics ranging from The Human Mind and Brain to Cognitive Psychology to Computational Modeling of Cognition. He has also produced several lecture series on neuroscience and psychology for the general public through *The Great Courses* company.



Rev. Dr. Mark R. Hoehner

Pastor Hoehner grew up primarily in Michigan and Wisconsin, the son of a Lutheran pastor. He is an avid Detroit and Michigan fan. He graduated from Concordia Wisconsin in 1996 with a degree in Secondary Education-History. He graduated from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo. with his M.Div. in 2000 and continued graduate work in Old Testament. In 2003 he was called to Chapel of the Cross Lutheran Church in St. Peters, Mo. where he is still serving. He has taught in Lutheran High School classrooms and at the Seminary, primarily in Biblical and Old Testament Studies. In 2011 he completed his Ph.D. in Old Testament and has since published four books on how to read the Old Testament in a series called *Knowing God Knowing Me*. Pastor Hoehner is married to Erin, who serves Chapel of the Cross as Preschool Director and Teacher. They have three sons.



Bible Reading and Biblical Expertise: Lessons from Psychology and Neuroscience

Dr. Thad Polk

How would reading the Bible consistently over a long period of time change your brain? In this talk, we will discuss several scientific studies that are relevant to that question. We will begin by reviewing the extraordinary, sometimes unbelievable, effects that long-term consistent practice can have on behavior. We will then turn to studies exploring how consistent practice changes the mind and brain and the implications of those findings for regular Bible reading. Finally, we will discuss a few specific strategies that have been scientifically demonstrated to help promote the formation of positive habits like Bible reading.

- 1. The power of practice
 - Consistent practice can lead to amazing abilities
 - Even mental abilities like how much information you remember can change dramatically after consistent practice
- 2. How consistent practice changes the mind and brain
 - Practice leads to rich long-term memory structures & frees up working memory
 - Makes it possible to see a bigger picture, draw more connections, and leads to relevant associations springing to mind quickly and automatically
- 3. How to promote positive habits like Bible reading
 - Read the Bible in the same way every day for many days in a row
 - Read in the same place and after the same habitual event (e.g., coffee)
 - Make an explicit plan for what, when, and how you will read and for how you will deal with obstacles and setbacks
 - Enlist the social support of friends and colleagues
 - Adopt some fun, personal gimmick that works for you
