

Michigan District Annual Report

For the fiscal year ending January 31, 2023

2022 was a year of transition in Michigan District leadership, but ministry continued under the four critical targets: Great Commission, Great Compassion, Healthy Congregations, and Healthy Church Workers. Here are a few ways that your financial contributions made a difference in the Michigan District.

Year in Review



Following the tragic shooting at the local highschool, **Journey**, **Oxford** has set up a fund, "Caring for Oxford," to help provide counseling services to anyone in the community that needs them.



Bethany, Detroit started a sewing center in partnership with POBLO to provide job training, employment, and an overall presence for community development to both Detroit residents and internationals.



20+ conferences for enrichment/continuing education of professional church workers were held during the 2022 fiscal year.



Trinity, Warren's warming center opened in December after a much-needed renovation of its HVAC system as well as flooring and plumbing. They hosted several guests through April. You can learn more here: michigandistrict.org/compassion/broadened-horizons/.

Messiah, Midland opened a medical clinic to serve those who are uninsured or underinsured. They charge no more than \$40 for an office visit, which includes all tests needed. The staff offers to pray with every patient. The clinic also secures donors to help fund these services, engaging them in relationship to bring them closer to Christ.





During the 2022 fiscal year, 18 church workers received financial assistance from the Sower's Fund. Additionally, the Mental Health Case Manager provided over 100 consultations that did not need a referral and gave 45 church workers referrals to counseling services.



Creator's Praise

Ministry is a church plant in Mendon, Mich. that uses a storefront building for their worship gatherings. Financial support from the district helped them renovate their gathering space and continue their ministry to the community. 

Summary of Financial Activities

For the fiscal year ending January 31, 2023



Information is taken from the audited financial statements of the Michigan District, LCMS. Copies of the audit report, which include all integral parts of the financial statements, are available from the District Office.

*The Michigan District sent 33.8% of its unrestricted cash receipts from congregations to national Synod during the fiscal year and 1.2% to Concordia University Ann Arbor. The numbers on the financial statements reflect adjustments based on pledges from congregations and to the Synod as required by Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

Support for National and International Ministries

For the fiscal year ending January 31, 2023, the Michigan District remitted \$1,466,368 to Corporate (national) Synod, which represents 33.8% of the District's unrestricted gifts from congregations. The

35 districts of the Synod contribute approximately \$12.6 million of undesignated revenue to Corporate Synod annually in support of national and international mission and ministry. The balance of the \$81.4 million 2022/23 budget of Corporate Synod was expected to come primarily from restricted gifts and sales of materials and services.
