


God the Father Almighty is why we can Connect with Others with Hope



The Neighborhood Stabilization Paradigm Shift

Dr. Rachel Ferguson

As painful as it can be to admit it, some of our charitable efforts can actually do harm. This talk explores how that happens, and the practical changes we can make to care for our neighbors with both our hearts and our minds.



Marvin Olasky's The Tragedy of American Compassion, 1994.

In this classic work, the former editor of *World Magazine* covers the historic Christian philosophy of charity, which emphasized honoring the dignity of the person by prayerfully considering what help would be best for them as an individual and offering them opportunities for exchange. He then describes the deterioration of charitable approaches due to the rise of the social gospel and state crowd-out of private charitable efforts. Olasky presents his "7 Marks of Compassion": A for Affiliation, B for Bonding, C for Compassion, D for Discernment, E for Employment/Exchange, F for Freedom, and G for God. This book influenced 90's welfare reform.

John M. Perkins' With Justice for All: A Strategy for Community Development, 2011.

Baptist minister and founder of the Christian Community Development Association, John M. Perkins argues for his "Three R's of Community Development": Relocation, Reconciliation, and Redistribution. He believes that neighborhoods can be transformed when those called to the work move into the neighborhood, break down racial and economic barriers, and bring the personal skills and networks of those better off to bear on those that need to develop their human and material capital.

Robert Woodson's Lessons From the Least of These: The Woodson Principles, 2020.

The director of the Woodson Center in Washington, D.C. argues that the greatest asset in neighborhood stabilization are particular neighbors themselves, who he refers to as "Josephs." Because of their local knowledge and neighborhood credibility, Josephs can be effective in a way that no outsider can. But they ought to be paired with "Pharaohs" who invest in their highly effective but decentralized efforts.

Brian Fikkert's When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor... And Yourself. The founder of the Chalmers Center places effective poverty alleviation in the context of our philosophy of human nature. With a full view of who we are as creatures made in the image of God, we see that poverty is much more than mere material lack. Simply supplying someone's immediate material need may actually be directly harmful if it treats them like a 'number,' divides them from their own abilities, or from their communities.


Robert Lupton's *Toxic Charity: How Churches and Charities Hurt Those They Help, and How to Reverse It.* The founder of Focused Community Strategies in Atlanta tells the story of how he awoke to the way his efforts in the neighborhood were undermining people's dignity and making them even more dependent on others. He also presents a block-by-block approach that requires deep personal presence, a longterm commitment, and dignifying assistance that encourages ownership and work. This is his "Oath for Compassionate Helpers":

I will never do for others what they have the capacity to do for themselves.
I will limit one-way giving to crises and seek always to find ways for legitimate exchange.
I will seek ways to empower by hiring, lending, and investing and offer gifts as incentives to celebrate achievements.
I will put the interests of those experiencing poverty above my own even when it means setting aside my own agenda or the agenda of my organization.
I will listen carefully, even to not what is being said knowing that unspoken feelings may contain essential clues to healthy engagement.
And, above all, to the best of my ability,

I WILL DO NO HARM.
